RENAMING OF MOTHER TERESA CATHOLIC ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In September 2005, Mother Teresa Catholic Elementary School joined the family of Catholic elementary schools in St. Cathorines and was registered with the Ministry of Education. The Niagara Catholic District School Board named Mother Teresa Catholic Elementary School after Mother Teresa of Calcutta.

Mother Teresa was canonized St. Teresa of Calcutta by Pope Francis in a ceremony at St. Peter's Basilica in Vatican City on September 4th, 2016. Born Gonxha Agnes Bojaxhiu on 26 August 1910, she was a woman of small of stature, and deep faith. At the age of eighteen Gonxha left her home to join the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary, known as the Sisters of Loreto. She made final vows in 1937 and from that time on was known as Mother Teresa.

During the train ride from Calcutta to Darjeeling for her annual retreat in 1946, Mother Teresa received her call from God to establish a religious community dedicated to serving the poorest of the poor. In August 1948, she dressed for the first time in a white, blue-bordered sari and passed through the gates of her beloved Loreto convent to enter the world of the poor. Today the order she founded, the Missionaries of Charity, number over 4,000 worldwide and continue to provide care and support to those most in need. She died on September 5th, 1997 and on the day of her funeral nearly a million people lined the streets of Calcutta to pay their respects to a life which bore witness to the joy of loving, the greatness and dignity of every human person, and the value of little things done faithfully with great love.

The Niagara Catholic District School Board *Naming of a Board Facility, Designated Area or Chapel,* Policy No. 100.15, outlines in its Administrative Procedures, the criteria and process to follow for requests for the naming or renaming of a Board facility, designated area or Chapel, in whole or in part.

The Policy and Administrative Procedures outline a process for "renaming of an existing Board facility if the individual is canonized by the Holy Father. In this circumstance, following consultation with the Family of Schools' Superintendent of Education, the school Principal, the Student Council President, where it is in place, and the Chair of the Catholic School Council, the Director of Education will bring a report to the Board of Trustees for consideration." (Administrative Procedures – Policy 100.15)

As we begin a new school year, consultation will take place with the Mother Teresa Catholic Elementary School community of students, staff, Parish Priest and Catholic School Council on a proposal to rename Mother Teresa Catholic Elementary School to reflect the canonization of Mother Teresa by the Holy Father.

If recommended and approved by the Board, the Ministry of Education has indicated that the name can be changed in the Ontario School Information System (OnSIS) and will be recognized by the Ministry of Education as the official name of the school.

If recommended and approved by the Board, a ceremony will take place at the school, the school signs will be changed, the official crest will be modified, school stationery, documentation, spirit wear and all current references to Mother Teresa Catholic will be grandfathered and changed to the new name of the school.

In accordance with the Board Policy 100.15 – *Naming of a Board Facility, Designated Area or Chapel*, a report and recommendation will be made to the October 11th, 2016 Committee of the Whole Meeting.

The Director of Education will bring an Ad Hoc Committee report to the Board for the naming or renaming of a Board facility. The report will include the Terms of Reference and include the criteria as noted within this Policy and Administrative Procedures, the Ad Hoc Committee Membership and the timeline for the recommendation of the Ad Hoc Committee for the consideration of the Board

Terms of Reference

The Terms of Reference for the Ad Hoc Committee will be to consider the request to name the former Saint John Valley Centre, the Saint Kateri Tekakwitha Centre and to bring a report to the September 27, 2016 Board Meeting.

Ad Hoc Committee

The Ad Hoc Committee consists of the Superintendent of Education – Program, the Student Success Lead, the Indigenous classroom teacher and a student at the centre along with a representative from the Niagara Regional Native Centre.

Recommendation to the Ad Hoc Committee

It has been recommended by the Superintendent of Education – Program, the Student Success Lead, students and staff at the centre and supported by the Niagara Peninsula Conservation Authority that the former village of St. John in Thorold be named after Saint Kateri Tekekwitha.

Kateri Tekakwitha, known as the "Lily of the Mohawks" was born in 1656 of an Algonquin mother and (Kanienke'ha) Mohawk father in Ossernenon in the Mohawk Valley, now known as Auriesville, New York. She dedicated her life to God and was declared "Venerable" in 1943 by Pope Pius XII. On June 22, 1980, Kateri Tekakwitha was beatified by Pope John Paul II and declared "BLESSED KATERI TEKAKWITHA". On December 19, 2011 Pope Benedict XVI announced the canonization of Kateri Tekakwitha.

Many people share their personal miracles with Kateri, how their family members were cured, how a special favour was granted. Their faith in her and their thankfulness for her intercession needs no words, their faces say it all. Her name, Kateri, is the Mohawk form of Catherine, which she took from St. Catherine of Siena. She is the patroness of ecology and the environment, people in exile and Native Americans.

We are requesting our new Indigenous Alternative Education Site located in the former Village of St. John be named after Saint Kateri Tekakwitha. The program being delivered at this location exemplifies

Saint Kateri's conviction to working with those less fortunate as their advocate and also embraces our Outdoor Education Program which also operates from this site as she is the patroness of ecology and the environment. This Centre is utilized to provide our indigenous youth an opportunity to return to school to complete their education.

In accordance with Board Policy and the Administrative Procedures an Ad Hoc Committee must be formed to consider the request and to make a recommendation to the Board.

The Ad Hoc Committee will consult with:

- a) the Bishop of the Diocese of St. Catharines;
- b) the local Trustee(s);
- c) the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board;
- d) the Director of Education;
- e) the Board Chaplaincy Leader;
- f) where possible, staff of the facility;
- g) where possible, the local Student Council(s);
- h) where possible, the local Catholic School Council(s);
- i) where possible, the local Catholic school community.

It is anticipated that the Ad Hoc Committee will meet within the next few weeks to consider the recommendation as presented and to bring a recommendation to the September 27, 2016 Board Meeting for the consideration of the Board.





COMPLAINANT AND THE EMPLOYEE'S IMMEDIATE SUPERVISOR

The complainant will be referred to the employee's immediate supervisor to discuss the concern and attempt to resolve the matter. If not satisfactorily resolved, then;

COMPLAINANT AND SUPERINTENDENT/CONTROLLER OF PLANT

The complainant will be referred to the appropriate Superintendent or Controller of Plant to

discuss the concern and attempt to resolve the matter. If not satisfactorily resolved, then; COMPLAINANT AND DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION

The complainant will be referred to the Director of Education for consideration of the complaint

and the decisions made by supervisory staff of the Board. If not satisfactorily resolved, then; APPEAL TO THE BOARD

A complainant may submit a written request to the Chairperson of the Board to delegate to the

In-Camera Meeting of the Board if not satisfied with the decision of the Director of Education. The delegation request will follow Board By-Law Section 14 subsection B through J. The complainant will be advised in writing, unless otherwise advised by Board legal counsel, of any decisions taken by the Board in relation to the complaint.

2016-2017 Annual Budget Approved

After months of working diligently to ensure Niagara Catholic's cost structure is aligned with the Board's estimated 2016-2017 Ministry revenue, on May 24, Trustees approved the 2016-2017 Annual Budget, which is balanced without the use of prior year surplus funds.

The 2016-2017 Annual Budget, which was approved at a Special Board Meeting on June 14 following the June Committee of the Whole Meeting, is set at \$254,053,854, an increase of \$211,000 over 2015-2016.

In March, the Ministry of Education announced funding for the 2016-2017 school year. This includes a 1.25 per cent increase for salaries, a result of the central labour agreements within the province.

Keeping this, an estimated decline in enrollment of 426 students for 2016-2017, and the two per cent benchmark for School Operations Allocation in mind, Senior Administrative Council presented a budget which addresses these issues and accomplishes the expectations of the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan.

The Report on the 2016-2017 Balanced Board Budget is available in the June 14 Special Board Meeting agenda. The complete 2016-2017 Budget Book will be made available online shortly.

During the June 21 Board Meeting, Niagara Catholic celebrated its 18-year partnership with the Niagara Children's Centre. Trustees Approve Final Long Term Accommodation Report

At the April 26 Board Meeting, Trustees approved the third phase of the Board's Long-Range Accommodations Plan for Niagara Catholic's 57 Catholic elementary and secondary schools. This phase focused on potential boundary changes, closings, amalgamations and potential space-sharing with outside agencies.

During the May 10 Committee of the whole Meeting, Trustees reviewed the complete Long-Term Accommodations Plan, which included a number of updates. Among the options being discussed is examining the potential of a joint venture with the French

Catholic District School Board to build a new joint-use Catholic elementary school in downtown St. Catharines that would be occupied by St. Nicholas Catholic Elementary School and Ecole Immaculee Conception.

Following that meeting, copies of the Long Term Accommodation Plan were provided to all administrators, Catholic School Council Chairs, the Chairs of Niagara Catholic's SEAC Committee and Niagara Catholic Parent Involvement Council, Alliance Committee, Mayors and municipalities throughout Niagara.

During the May 24 Board Meeting, Trustees endorsed all three phases of Niagara Catholic's Long Term Accommodation Plan. All information, agendas and minutes related to Long Term Accommodation Planning will be posted on the Board website. Read the approved report here.

Policies Approved

During the May 24 Board Whole Meeting, Trustees approved two updated policies. Reimbursement of Travel Expenses Policy (201.4) and Establishment and Cyclical Review of Policies Policy (100.5) were updated following a vetting process. A third policy - Access to Board Premises - Safe Schools Policy (302.6.3) - was sent back to Policy Committee for further review. The Board regularly reviews policies to ensure that they continue to comply with Ministry of Education requirements and meet the needs of the system.

Team Canada'72 partners with Catholic board

Canada's most iconic hockey team is still finding ways to inspire.

Members of Team Canada '72, who captivated the country 44 years ago, were in Niagara Falls Thursday to announce a partnership with Niagara Catholic District School Board and Brock University's Goodman School of Business.

Titled 28,800 Seconds: The Power of Teamwork, the program will see team members share their stories with students and school administrators. The legendary Summit Series, which Team Canada won in eight dramatic games, will be taught as part of social studies and Canadian history for Niagara Catholic students in grades 4 to 6.

"You hear the stories of passion and teamwork and resiliency," says Niagara Catholic education director John Crocco. "They really came together as a team once they left Canada. I'm thinking, "This is about leadership."

As part of the program, team members will return this fall to speak with about 300 elementary and high school students who show leadership skills. Crocco says the program was a year in the plan-

ning, and will be available to public and Catholic school boards across the country.

The 28,800 Seconds in the title refers to the length of time to play all eight games of the Summit Series in September 1972. After falling behind 3-1-1, Canada rallied to win the final three games of the series in Moscow.

Team members have been sharing stories of it ever since, and as shown Thursday, still savour reliving it. With Goodman School of Business dean Barry Wright acting as host, the players joked and told anecdotes from all eight games to a crowd at the Americana Re-

sort. Attending were coach Harry Sinden and players Phil Esposito, Dennis Hull, Brad Park and Pat Stapleton.

Sinden says it was the Soviets who wanted the series, to prove they could beat NHL players as easily as they could Canada's amateur teams. It required prompting players to give up part of their summer, unpaid.

Heading into the series, players didn't appear to take it seriously. As Sinden recalls, they thought they'd "see Moscow and have a decent time." But the political overtones of the series soon became apparent, as was the skill of the Soviet

team when they trounced Canada 7-3 in Game 1 in Montreal.

After Canada lost Game 4 in Vancouver 5-3, Esposito blasted fans for booing the Canadians. He felt fans "were deserting us." It became a rallying point as they boarded a plane to finish the series in the Soviet Union.

Canada lost the fifth game 5-4, but the tide had turned. Esposito says Canada had forced the Soviets to play their game, and it was just a matter of time.

Sinden never wavered in his belief Canada would take the series if they played shift to shift.

"During this whole time, Harry

never put doubt in the troops," re-calls Stapleton.

As always, Esposito was a crowd favourite with his tales: "I can remember things in '72, but I can't remember what I did yesterday."

At one point, he said players would do "anything to win" back then, including break an opponent's leg. "I'm not sure you can take that into the classroom, Phil," cracks Park.

Team Canada '72 is now a corporate entity touring the country with speaking engagements. Thursday was also the kickoff to the '72 Summit Series Tour, which will stop in all four Canadian cities which hosted games during the series — Montreal, Winnipeg, Toronto and Vancouver.


Crocco, who recalls watching the final game huddled with classmates, says the team's ability to adapt can inspire both staff and students.

"The kids will learn this history of Canada," he says. "What was the world like back in 1972? How do we see that world compared to today?

"The players have said 'We want to share our stories.' But it's not (just) about 'This is what we did! It's about their life experience... how they came together as individuals and bonded together." **HOCKEY**

Team Canada Offers Lessons for the Future, From 1972

The members of Team Canada 1972 are among the few hockey squads in the history of the country to have both a deep, emotional connection to their citizens and a legacy that stretches beyond their borders. But until recently, the surviving players had lacked a platform to share their story.

Anyone who watched their series against the powerful Soviet Union team can clearly recall the moment when Paul Henderson scored with 34 seconds left in Game 8, giving Canada a 6-5 victory in Moscow and the series title. But the team's legacy was fading away, like a yellowed newspaper clipping or a piece of grainy television footage. Forty-four years ago seems like ancient history to a hockey-loving nation that has produced other international stars like Wayne Gretzky, Mario Lemieux and Sidney Crosby.

The World Cup of Hockey, an international hockey series that will begin in Toronto on Sept. 17, has little chance of holding the country's attention the way the Summit Series of 1972 did. Any hockey fans wanting a glimpse of an earlier era of international competition, colored by Cold War politics and cultural differences, should get to Toronto a week earlier and hear from the players who lived it

Over the years, Team Canada's players would speak at golf tournaments, but fewer of them were around to tell the stories and share their lessons in perseverance, resilience and trust.

Five members from 1972 have died: John Ferguson Sr., Richard Martin, Gary Bergman, Bill Goldsworthy and J. P. Parise. Some, like Stan Mikita, 76, and Wayne Cashman, 71, are ill; Henderson, 73, has cancer.

"We had a golf tournament each year that was organized by a marketing company," said Serge Savard, 70, the former Canadiens defenseman. "We had very few things going on beside the golf tournament."

Pat Stapleton, 76, the former Chicago Blackhawks defenseman who was a steady performer for Canada, set out to change that.

During the past three years, under his leadership, the team has turned itself into a corporation in the hope of sustaining its legacy. A new speaking tour has begun in the four Canadian cities where the 1972 games were played before the series shifted to Moscow.

Last Friday, 44 years to the day after hitting the ice to face the Soviets, Savard; Phil Esposito, now 74; Yvan Cournoyer, 72; Bobby Clarke, 67; Peter Mahovlich, 69; and others were in Montreal to relive their memories and take the audience behind the scenes of that historic series.

The tour is tracking, almost to the day, the dates of those four games in 1972: Winnipeg on Tuesday, Vancouver on Thursday and Toronto on Saturday, a week before the World Cup of Hockey begins a few blocks away at Air Canada Centre.

"All this knowledge, if it's not captured, it will go to waste," Stapleton said.

At his home in the farming community of Strathroy, Ontario, Stapleton grew concerned that there was no business model to properly elevate the story of Team Canada.

"Players had passed away, and they had sort of been forgotten," he said.

The turning point came in September 2011, the day before a golf tournament in Toronto. The former players met to discuss plans to commemorate the 40th anniversary in 2012. Around the room, there was concern.

Stapleton asked his teammates if he could approach a business school for advice. Everyone agreed.

Dennis Hull, 71, an alumnus of Brock University in St. Catharines, Ontario, said he would contact the university's business school to explore the idea.

Barry Wright, 61, a faculty member and now interim dean at Brock, was enthusiastic. He and his colleague Wendy Dueck produced a study breaking down Team Canada's values and skills, showing how the team could build on its legacy.

"In Canada we have so few poignant moments," Wright said. "It's a story I think we need to continue to tell."

By 2013, the team created an entity called 1972 Summit Series Hockey Team Inc. The 35 players and their families, along with two coaches, would have equal shares in the private corporation.

The approach is threefold: entertainment, with players taking their message into the community; education, taking their stories and lessons to classrooms; and charity.

The educational program, "28,800 Seconds: The Power of Teamwork," is a reference to the number of seconds it took to play the eight-game series. It will be part of the social studies and Canadian history program this fall for about 6,000 students in Grades 4 to 6 in the Niagara Catholic District School Board.

"There are so many parallels in leadership," said John Crocco, the director of education for the school board, who remembers watching the final game in 1972 as a child huddled with classmates in Thunder Bay, Ontario. "The hockey piece was all about team leadership and perseverance, resiliency and supporting each other and identifying gifts that people had."

Team Canada Inc. has also reached across the country to Calgary for a partnership with Canada's Sports Hall of Fame. A virtual distance learning program is being set up, which will allow for live communication between the players and students.

"This program will survive them," said Mario Siciliano, president and chief executive of the Hall of Fame.

The lessons are intended to be not just about how the players pulled together on the ice, but also about the cultural, socioeconomic and sociopolitical forces then at play between Canada and the Soviet Union.

"As much as they played great hockey games, there was so much more than that," Siciliano said. "It really put Canada on the global map. It also put into perspective what the Soviet Union was about. They were just human beings. They weren't some invincible, unstoppable force."

A pivotal moment in the organization's development came the day before its first board meeting, at a hotel in St. Catharines. Ever the coach, Harry Sinden, 83, suggested a new strategy: Instead of speaking directly to an audience, the players formed a semicircle in a dressing-room setting and exchanged behind-the-scenes stories before a rapt audience of about 400.

Many players were struck by the fact that they, too, were hearing these vignettes for the first time. The event served as the springboard for the cross-Canada tour.

"It's never been done in the hockey world, to have a multimedia event in front of a stage with a giant screen and lighting," said Pierre Marchand, a concert promoter from Quebec who likened his production to a "rock show."

Savard said, "We're on the right foot now."


