PRESENTATION BACKGROUND

Committee of the Whole Meeting December 5, 2023

NIAGARA CATHOLIC ANNUAL PILGRIMAGE 2023

Every fall the Niagara Catholic community looks forward to its Annual Pilgrimage. This year Niagara Catholic continued to have the month of October designated as Pilgrimage month to allow schools more flexibility when scheduling their walks. This year marked the 48th anniversary of the Annual Pilgrimage, which Fr. Jim Mulligan C.S.C. began at Notre Dame College School in 1975.

Over the years, it has grown to include all Niagara Catholic secondary schools. Often students from our Catholic elementary schools, staff, parents, trustees, alumni and community members join in to help raise money for various causes. Schools continued to incorporate some of the creativity they used in previous years to raise funds to support missions and projects around the world and in their communities. Through the use of school social media pages, the Pilgrimage and the organizations they supported were highlighted to the broader community. Our Student Senate page also showcased each high school's Pilgrimage on their social media site. The in person walks throughout the community showcased how our staff and students live their Catholic Social Teachings which aligns with our Board's mission, vision and values as well as showcased their tremendous school pride. The dedication students and staff showed to raising funds for their causes is something that we should be proud of. Over \$98,000 has been raised so far this year, with many schools still collecting pledges.

SUMMARIES PROVIDED BY THE SCHOOLS

Saint Paul

In the heart of Saint Paul Catholic High School lies an event of great importance, one that resonates with the spirit of community, compassion, and dedication to social justice. This year, we celebrated our 41st annual Pilgrimage walk. This remarkable event has been a cornerstone of Saint Paul's commitment to making a difference, particularly in supporting the underprivileged school community of Ste. Croix de Milot in the northern reaches of Haiti. Saint Paul Catholic School proudly embarked on a pilgrimage that symbolizes their commitment to social justice and the preferential option for the poor. The pilgrimage isn't just a tradition; it's a testament to our school's core values and dedication to serving those in need. This year's pilgrimage was held on Wednesday, October 25th and it was an event filled with both solemnity and spirited determination. The pilgrimage began with a moving Mass celebrated by Father Daniel Corso. The solemnity of the occasion was palpable as students and staff members gathered to seek blessings and reflect on their mission. With over 300 hearts filled with hope, they set off on a walk through their neighborhood, a symbolic act that mirrored their walk in solidarity with those less fortunate.

In close proximity, the grade 7 and 8 students of our feeder school, St. Vincent de Paul, undertook their own pilgrimage to rally behind Saint Paul's social justice cause. Upon Saint Paul's return to the school, the participants of the pilgrimage enjoyed pizza. This simple act of breaking bread together was a celebration of unity, community, and the triumph of collective effort. It's a moment when everyone could feel the warmth of coming together for a common cause. The energy and enthusiasm of the students were evident throughout the pilgrimage. Our determination to 'make a change', to stand up for social justice, and to support the school of Ste. Croix de Milot in Haiti were unwavering. Their commitment to the cause yielded tangible results, as we surpassed our goal and raised over \$15,000 during this year's pilgrimage.

Saint Michael

Since 1998, Saint Michael Catholic High School has supported charities involved with offering relief to the survivors of the Rwandan Genocide. They currently support the charity "Hope For Rwanda's Children Foundation". This foundation works to support the 500,000 orphans left behind after the genocide (and their families as they have grown up). A group of Canadian teachers first established the charity in 1999, after visiting Rwanda and seeing firsthand the devastation left behind by the genocide. They established the Hope for Rwanda's Children Fund and the Tumurere Foundation to help support Rwandan students with school fees and tuition, books, uniforms, and basic medical care. To date, St. Michael's has raised over \$200,000 for this important cause. The theme of this year's pilgrimage was "We walk by Faith". To walk by faith requires courage and strength. It means to stand up for the hurting, the broken-hearted, and the downtrodden, even when we are confused by the events happening around us. The staff and students of St. Michael's trust in God's love and they work to improve the lives of others around them because they know they are called to do so. The pilgrimage was promoted by having a student-run Pilgrimage kick-off assembly, where students showcased their talents in Art, Music, and public speaking to raise awareness and promote the upcoming Pilgrimage. The students encourage every grade to get involved. Using a mix of social media, music, and announcements, the Pilgrimage is promoted in all classes each day. The school chaplain worked with the Grade 9 teachers to share the story of the Rwandan genocide so that students could better understand the history behind this event. Community partners donated small prizes which were used as incentives to students. This year, on October 25th, nearly 400 Mustangs walked in the Pilgrimage, raising just over \$13,000 for their brothers and sisters in Rwanda. They walked within their community carrying their Pilgrimage banner and proudly wearing Mustang colours to help this great cause.

Denis Morris

The 2023 Denis Morris Pilgrimage theme was based on the words of St. Oscar Romaro who said "Peace is the product of justice and love and students and staff were asked to bring peace to our broken world. DM was honoured to have former Chaplaincy Leader Kelly Stephen speak at the kick-off assembly and motivate the school to break out of their comfort zone to meet the needs of their brothers and sisters in the global south. On October 25th, DM participated in the 29th annual Pilgrimage walk, with a sea of red flooding the streets around the streets of St Catharines. Pilgrimage donations almost \$13,000 were raised to support the Wells of Hope project in the Halapa region of Guatemala, and to their sister school L'Ecole Immaculee Conception in Pilate, Haiti. This annual event is a great experience and helps bond the DM family together while simultaneously highlighting and living Catholic Social teaching to those around the community.

Saint Francis

On Friday, October 27, 2023 the Saint Francis Phoenix held their annual Pilgrimage. This year's theme was "*It's Time*." Pilgrimage began with Mass in our school gym celebrated by Fr. Richard Kowalchuk, Pastor of Star of the Sea Parish. Afterwards, the school body began their 6 km Pilgrimage walk through our local community. The Phoenix raised over \$16,000.00. The money will help support our sister school Marie Immaculée in Haiti, the Centre for Hope in Guatemala and other local charities.

Holy Cross

For the first time ever the entire Holy Cross community participated in our annual Pilgrimage this year. Through the efforts of the Pilgrimage committee, comprised of both students and staff, they spent the month of October learning about the challenges their Haitian friends face on a daily basis. Inspired by a student-led assembly, announcements, class Powerpoints and posters hung throughout the school, the Angus Army gathered on October 26th as a school community to celebrate Mass and pray for the students and staff of Sainte-Croix de Thibodeau school. The Pilgrimage committee student leaders also worked with our feeder schools for the month of October, preparing them to join us for the walk. Student presentations to Grade 8 classrooms discussed the long tradition of our Holy Cross Pilgrimage and the reasons why we walk. Our class activities reminded students that sometimes the world prioritizes things over people. Our Pilgrimage addresses the needs of our sisters and brothers in Haiti, and builds more just and equitable societies. Our future Raiders joined us at Holy Cross for Mass on the day of Pilgrimage. Following Mass at the end of the school day, students set out on their pilgrimage walk around the North End of St. Catharines accompanied by their grade eight students who will join them at Holy Cross for grade 9 next year. The students and staff were able to raise \$5000 to support the students at their sister school.

Blessed Trinity

Blessed Trinity held its 21st Annual Pilgrimage on Friday October 27, 2023 raising over \$7 000 for the Dominican Canadian Community Development Group in support of their work in the community of Las Pajas, Dominican Republic. Projects supported include La Casita Farm Project, Fundebumuni Education Initiative, and the Las Pajas Scholarship program. We kicked off our Pilgrimage Campaign with a student-led Pilgrimage Assembly, where members of our Social Justice League engaged our student body in active learning about the community of Las Pajas and their partnership with the DCCD. Students and staff were able to visualize the inequality in access to services experienced in Las Pajas in comparison to here in West Niagara, and to better understand how the funds from our Pilgrimage are used.

Our school wide Pilgrimage Mass as well as our walk was a message to our community of the importance of using our time, treasure and talent to make our world a more just place for all. Our Pilgrimage was a journey of reflection, solidarity and learning made possible by the hard work of our Social Justice League, and all of the students and staff involved in the planning and organizing of our event. We are grateful for the opportunity to gather as a community in support of our friends in Las Pajas while also celebrating our faith.

Lakeshore

Lakeshore Catholic High Schools annual "Gator Walk Pilgrimage" was a great success. Gators came out in full force to show both their school spirit and their commitment to Social Justice. This year's Gator Walk took place on Friday October 27th and also included the grade 7 and 8 students from our Catholic Elementary family of schools who participated in Gator walk as part of their Journeys Retreat. The entire Gator student body and our feeder school guests began the day in prayer as Lakeshore Catholic came together to participate in a school wide mass, presided over by our honoured celebrant, his Excellency Bishop Bergie. At the conclusion of mass the celebration moved outside, where students and staff were treated to a free pizza lunch, games, face painting and entertainment by the Lakeshore Catholic Jam band. At the conclusion of the "parking lot party" students, staff and our gr 7&8 future gators set out on their pilgrimage walk. This year's route took students through the Port Colborne community where they were visible to the public as they walked in solidarity and social justice for our less fortunate brothers and sisters in Dominica and at home. The theme of this year's walk was "Walk it like you talk it" was inspired by the Drake song " Walk

it...Talk it" and embodied in the logo of this year's pilgrimage t-shirt design by Gr 12 LCHS student Ryan Mullin. The success of this year's pilgrimage is reflected in the overwhelming dedication of this year's student pilgrimage committee, who spent countless hours planning and hosting fundraising activities and most importantly in the participation of the entire LC community and our family of school partners. The funds raised this year, which total just under \$9,000 by the generous donations made, will continue to support our brothers and sisters in the small Caribbean Island nation of Dominica and locally they will support the wonderful work of Casa El Norte in Fort Erie. The Pilgrimage at Lakeshore Catholic is more than just a 1 day event. October is unofficially now Gator Walk month, as many events and fundraisers take place including lunch time activities, colour wars points and concession sales at various school events. It is our goal to have the spirit of Pilgrimage last all year long as we work towards fulfilling the call of Social Justice. The spirit of giving is alive and well at LCHS!

Notre Dame

2023 marked Notre Dame's 48th annual pilgrimage. We are pleased that keeping with tradition, we continue to gather on the last Sunday of October. To prepare for this day, students attend an educational assembly to increase awareness of who we support and the overall meaning and purpose of the pilgrimage. Our theme this year was 'Extinguish Apathy. Ignite Action'. The issues facing the world are many and they are complicated. It is easy to turn away and ignore the cries of those who are suffering. Despite having access to more information than ever, too often, fear or indifference prevents us from doing anything with the information we have. This year we are focusing on the importance of acting against injustice when we see that it is there. On Sunday October 29th, approximately 450 students, along with staff, alumni and family members participated. We began with a brief departure service, including some words of inspiration from former teacher Mr. Paul Turner. The group then walked south along the canal path to the Welland International Flatwater Centre then turned around and returned to the school for Mass celebrated by Fr. Paul MacNeill from St. Alexander's parish. Each year the highlight of our pilgrimage day is the candlelight service at the end of Mass where we are symbolically reminded that the light of Christ overcomes the darkness of human conflict and suffering. As the light spreads throughout the congregation, we experience how goodness can spread when we act together in solidarity. We do not yet have an official total, but so far we have raised \$20,000 for our 3 partners: Development & Peace, DCCD (which is an organization founded by some of our own alumni to address injustices in Dominican Republic) and Yancana Huasy (a centre for children with special needs in Peru founded by the Congregation of Holy Cross).
