- St. Michael Catholic Elementary School will welcome a Program Development and Outreach Officer from the Legislative Assembly of Ontario on January 20, 2026 to deliver a free, 90-minute Grade 5 government program. Students will learn about Parliament, governance, and civic engagement through an interactive presentation and a mock debate with costumes. Local MPP Wayne Gates will stop by to greet students. This visit offers a valuable hands-on learning experience that connects curriculum to real-world civic processes.
- Our Lady of the Holy Rosary Catholic Elementary School is pleased to be hosting international students from Korea from January 10th to the 24th, 2026. In February, students and staff will be welcoming international students from Peru. In partnership with Heart Niagara grade 7 students will be receiving CPR training. Open House for Kindergarten is scheduled for February 5th, 2026.

- Our school communities experienced an extraordinary outpouring of generosity this Christmas season, bringing hope and relief to many families. Thanks to the Niagara Foundation for Catholic Education and the heartfelt efforts of Margaret Moody, 212 grocery gift cards valued at \$100 each from the Niagara Foundation for Catholic Education, 26 gift card valued at \$50 each and 2 gift cards valued at \$60 each from Ms. Moody were distributed to families in need. B. PRESENTATIONS – Gino Pizzoferrato, Superintendent of Education

Superintendent Pizzoferrato presented:

SEAC Responsibilities and Goals Update:

- A pre-meeting information session held with SEAC members with the goal to gather input and feedback from community partners on the committee's long-standing goals.

1. SEAC Core Responsibilities

- Ensuring the rights of students with special needs are met through ongoing dialogue and continuous improvement of services.
- Providing information, assistance, and advice to parents/guardians whose children require additional support. (A Niagara Catholic-specific presentation on this is being considered.)
- Making recommendations to the Board regarding the development of special education programs and services, using the Special Education Guide for Parents as a core document.
- Participating in the board's annual budget process related to special education, which includes a formal, transparent presentation typically held in the spring.

- Conducting an annual review of the Special Education Plan, which is posted on the board's website and guided by a coordinator and ministry reporting requirements.

2. Goal Focus: Improving Transitions

- To improve transitions for all students. This includes transitions:
 - Into school for the first time.
 - From elementary to secondary.
 - From secondary to post-secondary and beyond.
- Several significant strategies (projects) have been undertaken to address this goal:
 - Secondary schools were given funds to host transition events. These events invited not just Grade 8 students, but often intermediate-grade children, to help them anticipate the move to secondary school. Transition activities were also encouraged for students leaving the secondary system (e.g., for employment or community work).
 - A symposium was held for all elementary and secondary Educational Resource Teachers. The focus was on transitions across all stages (JK through post-secondary), emphasizing different student pathways. Community partners were invited to discuss programs available to students and families.
 - The Student Support department made staff available in the last weeks of August to assist children entering the system or transitioning between cohorts. This team helped schools, parents, and students prepare for upcoming transitions.
 - Targeted PD was delivered to elementary and secondary principals regarding the pathways and transitions available to students (mirroring information previously presented at a SEAC meeting).

The floor was opened for feedback from community partners regarding outstanding concerns related to transitions, emphasizing the importance of early connections between elementary feeder schools and secondary schools to facilitate early planning for families. The committee is also open to revisiting the core goals or establishing new ones if necessary.

C. POLICY REVIEW – Superintendent Pizzoferrato

- Policy Review: Expulsion and Exclusion
 - Two policies have been circulated to the committee for review: the Expulsion Policy and the Exclusion from School or Class Policy.
 - The documents presented to the SEAC were in the public vetting stage.
- The policies had already gone through the Committee of the Whole for discussion, and recommended changes (shown in red, with deletions crossed out in black) were made after much consideration by staff and the Board of Trustees.
- The SEAC was asked to apply a "Special Education lens" to the policies, a request initiated by Trustee Burkholder.
- SEAC members and staff were encouraged to provide ongoing feedback

A discussion with the SEAC members took place regarding both the Expulsion Policy and the Exclusion from School or Class Policy on what could potentially be missing from the policies.

- Trustee Burkholder emphasized the importance of receiving feedback from SEAC, NCPIC, and staff, calling it the "most valuable feedback" for policy formation.
- The feedback loop will remain open for both policies, with a deadline to be established soon to ensure the input is included in the regular review cycle.
- The process validates the importance of reviewing these policies at the SEAC table to ensure the special education lens is properly applied.

D. CHAIR'S REPORT-*Chair Somma*

Chair Somma reported:

International Day of Persons with Disabilities, November 5, 2025:

- Theme for 2025: "Fostering disability inclusive societies for advancing social progress across all regions."
- Persons with disabilities and their households face significant barriers to social development, including:
 - Higher likelihood of poverty.
 - Discrimination in employment, resulting in lower wages and overrepresentation in the informal sector.
 - Inadequate and uneven social protection systems that often don't account for extra disability-related costs.
 - Lack of dignity, autonomy, and agency in care and support systems.
- The three interrelated and mutually reinforcing themes are poverty eradication, promotion of full and productive employment/decent work for all, and social integration.
- The inclusion of persons with disabilities as both agents and beneficiaries is indispensable for achieving social development goals across all aspects of life (social, economic, cultural, and political).
- Education's role is to support students with disabilities to help shape a society where they are less likely to experience poverty and discrimination and more likely to attain gainful employment.

1. Learning Disabilities Association of Niagara Region – *Aishah Sonekan*

2. Niagara Children's Centre – Kylee Daley

Kylee Daley reported:

- January Transitions: They are currently working on the transition to school for children who participated in the fall program and will be entering school in the second term (January).
- Next Year's Transitions: They are also starting the transition process for all children born in 2022 who will be entering Junior Kindergarten next year.

3. Pathstone Mental Health – Michelle Toy

No report.

4. Community Living (Port Colborne/Wainfleet) – DJ Holmes

DJ Holmes reported:

- They successfully completed their final fundraiser of the year for their children's programs.
- Plans for building an accessible playground on the property were recently launched on their website. Information and donation details can be found at clpcw.com.
- Staff had a positive experience attending Lakeshore Catholic High School's Grade 8 Open House, which served as a valuable networking opportunity.
- The organization has several holiday events planned:
 - An entry in the Port Colborne Santa Claus Parade this weekend.
 - Their annual kids' Christmas party in two weeks.
 - Their third annual Christmas dinner dance for all individuals they support.

5. Inclusion West Niagara – Patricia Ferrie

Patricia Ferrie reported:

- The organization has officially changed its name and is now Inclusion West Niagara (no longer Community Living Grimsby). Email addresses have been changed, and the website is being updated.
- They successfully held their first overnight respite session.
- They will not be able to offer overnight respite in December due to staffing issues but are planning one for January 10th.
- They continue to offer Saturday and Sunday respite from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM.
- The organization is participating in its first-ever Santa Claus Parade in Grimsby this Saturday.
 - The children's program is involved.
 - The parade theme is "Canada," so they will be carrying decorated hockey and lacrosse sticks to represent Canadian sports.

6. Down Syndrome Niagara - Andrea Pede

Andrea Pede reported:

- Upcoming events:
 - Dance Your Niagara Christmas Party: This Sunday, December 7th, from 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM at Americana Conference Resort.
 - Annual General Meeting (AGM): Monday, January 19th, from 5:30 PM to 7:30 PM, currently planned for Williams Fresh Cafe (location may change based on attendance)
- World Down Syndrome Day (WDSD) 2026 Theme:
 - World Down Syndrome Day is March 21st.
 - The global theme for 2026 is a call to "stand together against loneliness."
 - People with Down syndrome and other intellectual disabilities, along with their families, often experience loneliness more intensely and frequently.
 - Loneliness is not a choice; it results when people are not supported in building real connections. It is exacerbated by stigma, discrimination, and exclusion from school, work, and community life. Being physically present is not the same as being included.
- Key Facts:
 - 39% of people with intellectual disabilities often feel lonely, compared to 14% of people without disabilities.
 - Loneliness is reportedly as detrimental to health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. To combat loneliness, it is essential to promote and remind everyone that every person needs real inclusion, welcoming spaces, and meaningful relationships beyond immediate family and supporters. This is treated as a human rights issue.
 - The theme also helps counteract the common, incorrect stereotype that a person with Down syndrome is "always happy," addressing the reality of emotional well-being and loneliness, especially heightened since the pandemic.

7. Mainstream - Erica Simmanivong-Elizarraras

8. Bethesda Services – Alyson Wilson

Alyson Wilson reported:

- Christmas Break Service Guide: This guide details various recreational and family activities offered by Bethesda throughout the holidays. Families are encouraged to check the website for information if they are looking for things to do during the break.

- Winter Service Guide (January to March): This guide covers free and immediately available services for families, including:
 - Recreational and clinical groups (Monday to Thursday evenings and Saturdays).
 - Interdisciplinary consultations.
 - Support groups for caregivers (including a male group).
 - A Sibling Resilience Group, run in partnership with the Powerhouse Young Caregivers Association.
- FASD and Mental Health Collaboration:
 - Bethesda is co-facilitating a series of workshops with **Contact Niagara** on various topics related to Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) and mental health
- Niagara College Dental Clinic:
 - Bethesda staff and students from Niagara College's Dental Hygiene and Behavioral Science programs are hosting a clinic to support families in receiving dental hygiene checkups.
- Third Annual Caregiver Appreciation Dinner, taking place next Wednesday.
 - The dinner is generously donated by Amici's Banquet Hall, with meals provided by the Niagara College Culinary Program.
 - The Bethesda team provides childcare so that families can enjoy a night out. Over 150 families are registered to attend.

9. Autism Ontario Niagara Region – Jessica Thomas

Jessica Thomas reported:

- Autism Ontario recently released a public statement in response to the province's media release on November 13th. This statement is available on their website.
- Resources for parents and families navigating a new diagnosis are always available.
 - A "Navigating a New Diagnosis" information session will be held online on December 10th from 12:00 PM to 1:30 PM.
- The Ontario Autism Program (OAP) provider list is available on the website to ensure families access approved providers for funding.
- A four-part video series is available to assist individuals transitioning into adulthood after high school with their Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) application.
- Available webinars include topics like "Autistic Burnout" and "Supporting Emotional Regulation."
- School Collection Resources: This resource collection is continually available for families and includes guides for parents on:
 - The Individual Education Plan (IEP) and the Identification, Placement, and Review Committee (IPRC) process.
 - Preparing their child for a special education meeting (includes a video and resource guide).
- Special Education Workshops:
 - A workshop titled "Understanding Special Education" is scheduled for December 9th.

- An on-demand webinar, "The Journey Through Special Education: Navigating Challenges and Building Connection," is accessible at any time.
- The website is the central place to register for all family events and parent-focused activities, including:
 - The monthly "RAD Dads" meeting.
 - The monthly "Moms Meeting Minutes"

10. Community Living (Welland/Pelham) – Monique Somma

Monique Somma reported:

- A successful annual fundraising dinner dance was held, which included a silent auction.
- A Christmas tea was hosted for all families and staff.
- Staff conducted ongoing training on Social Role Valorization (SRV), a philosophy previously presented to the SEAC group.
- The organization now has three certified SRV trainers on-site, enabling continued internal training for staff.
- Families and all board members are also invited to and receive training on this core organizational philosophy.

Ann Marie reported:

- ERT and Special Education Classroom Teacher meeting
 - On Tuesday, December 2, our annual Behaviour Management Systems refresher certification was held for elementary and secondary ERTs and Program Chairs. This session took place in the morning. Those who require full certification will have the opportunity to attend training early in the new year. In the afternoon, ERTs had the opportunity to participate virtually in a Lexia PowerUp or Core5 session. The Core5 sessions were differentiated to meet the needs of staff at various stages of implementation—whether new to Lexia, developing their practice, or progressing toward becoming data experts in the program.

- Kindergarten Transition to School

○ Curriculum Resources for Parents

E. SECONDARY STUDENT SENATE REPRESENTATIVE REPORT-*Ella Colaneri*

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells provided a report on behalf of Ella:

- Niagara Catholic elementary and secondary schools participated in Pilgrimage Sunday on October 26, 2025. To support the 50th Anniversary of Notre Dame College Pilgrimage, representatives from each secondary school were bussed to Notre Dame College to walk in solidarity showing the community that we have a strong Catholic faith and commitment to social justice initiatives to support those less fortunate.
- Niagara Catholic secondary schools are preparing to host their Open Houses. Grade 8 students from the elementary feeder schools will be invited to step into the future and experience a day of secondary school culture and opportunities that are offered at the secondary level, including curriculum, electives, clubs, sports, drama and the arts.
- Christmas is fast approaching, but as the secondary schools enter the Christmas season, we recognize that we must place emphasis on our Catholic faith and our Lord, who is the reason for the season. Secondary schools are beginning to plan their fundraisers, dances, assemblies, roadshows, and more. These are just a few initiatives to help give back to the community and support those who are in need during the holidays.

- OAPCE is the only Catholic parent association recognized by the Ministry of Education. OAPCE provides a voice for parents who share a common goal in supporting the continuation and preservation of publicly funded Catholic education in the province.

How to engage with OAPCE?

This is a great resource for parents/guardians and those interested in advancing Catholic education in the province. There are publications, reports and survey results that may be of interest on the site.

What has OAPCE been busy with?

- OAPCE participated in the Ministry of Education Task Force to implement the revised Provincial Code of Conduct (PPM 128) for the 2024-2025 school year. This initiative aims to refocus education on the basics, improve classroom environments and enhance communication with parents/guardians, students and educators.
- On November 13, OAPCE will host an in-person meeting at Saint Michael Catholic High School at 7:00 p.m., for OAPCE liaison representatives. The evening will commence with a meet and greet, followed by guest speaker Lucy Colangelo, OAPCE Provincial and Regional updates and round table discussions.

H. SEAC REPORT

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells on behalf of SEAC reported on the following:

- **ERT and Special Education Classroom Teacher meeting**
The November Student Support Learning Session was held yesterday, Wednesday, November 5, at the Catholic Education Centre. The day highlighted updates to the Niagara Children's Centre – School Based Rehabilitation SLP referral process, information on services and upcoming Fall/Winter programs from the Learning Disabilities Association of Niagara Region, as well as a breakout session on the basics of administration of the Kaufman Test of Educational Achievement with Student Support Resource Teachers, and much more.
- **"SNAP" (Supporting Neurodiversity through Adaptive Programming)**
All Niagara Catholic schools had a chance to register for the Fall Session of SNAP offered through Brock University. This program includes a wide range of activities such as educational gymnastics, dance and movement education, games, and other activities of daily living. Activities can be modified to meet the needs and capabilities of the individual participating. Niagara Catholic school session dates began in late October and continue through to the end of this month.
- **Gifted Module**
On November 18, students participating in the elementary gifted module will partake in an outdoor learning experience at the Stevensville Conservation area designed to challenge their minds and build essential life skills. Students will strengthen character, communication, and interpersonal skills while working together as a team to overcome challenges. During the orienteering portion of the day, they will work on applying problem-solving, math, and geography skills to navigate and complete a map challenge. Finally, in the ecosystem design workshop, students will explore the diverse habitats of the Niagara Region, use natural materials to create and model their own ecosystems.
- **ABA for Educators Level 1 Training**
Niagara Catholic has been provided with an opportunity to offer educators the chance to complete the ABA for Educators Level 1 online course, provided through the Geneva Centre for Autism. A memo was sent out to the system extending this invitation to Teachers and Educational Assistants to support the ongoing development of skills and capacity building in our schools, to support the growing needs of our students.
- **Upcoming November 28th PA Day**
Elementary and Secondary Educational Assistants and Intervenors will have the opportunity to attend a virtual presentation from our Educational Audiologist who will provide education and practical strategies for educators working with students with Auditory processing needs. Additionally, there will be time dedicated for staff to explore the Niagara Catholic Virtual Learning Environment (NCVLE) for specific resources provided by our central staff. Lastly, Secondary Principals will guide their staff through a presentation developed by Student Support. This presentation follows the same theme of the one led by Elementary Principals on the previous PA Day and focuses on a framework for supporting students in reaching their full potential as they progress through their educational journey. It will also emphasize collaboration within Niagara Catholic's problem-solving model and its application to all students' pathways.

I. STAFF REPORTS-Maria Solomon and Chris McLean

Elementary Principal, Solomon and Secondary Vice-Principal, McLean provided elementary and secondary school updates for information.

Elementary

Principal, Solomon reported:

- Catholic School Council elections took place in September along with the annual Terry Fox Walk/Run, the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on September 30, which went beyond wearing Orange Shirts.
- Many schools at the elementary level had the Indigenous Team supporting different activities. St. Mary planted six cedar trees planted with a seventh one for the 7 Grandfather Teachings and also tied it into: the 7 Catholic Social Teachings, 7 Catholic Graduate Expectations, 7 Sacraments and the 7 gifts of the Holy Spirit
- In October, High Schools participated in the annual Pilgrimage which Chris will speak to but this ties into the Holy Childhood Association Walk across the Board. St. Mary NF had their first Pilgrimage where students in grades 4 to 8 walked to St. Patrick Church Hall with the support of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and Project Share – where students walk to raise money for the Holy Childhood Foundation and also, We Scare Hunger by making a food donation
- November 3-11, is Treaties Recognition Week committed to reconciliation and learning and relearning to support our Indigenous Brothers and Sisters.
- Progress Reports are available the week of November 10 (parent portal). Kindergarten observations for Year 1 students take place for Term 1 between November 1 to February.
- Niagara Catholic Chaplaincy visits are underway – three visits per school throughout the year support our faith while the literacy and math coaches meet with teachers to support.
- Niagara Catholic St. Carlo Acutis Challenge -- Students are invited to create a project that highlights an aspect of Catholic faith they are passionate about and share it in a way that is engaging and effective. Projects can take many forms, including: Website, App, Video or Game, Podcast or Social Media Campaign, ... that spreads the love of Jesus and our faith – due in April 2026.
- The Ontario Catholic School Trustees' Association (OCSTA) “Pilgrims of Hope: On the Path to Holiness” Short-Video Contest is open until Nov.12/25. Niagara Catholic elementary and secondary schools will have the opportunity to create a two-minute video “As God who called you is holy, be holy yourselves.” (1 Peter 1:15-16)
- Preparation for Remembrance Day Service is underway with Poppy Campaigns and connections with an organization called The Memory Project for guest speakers
- Our elementary and secondary principals continue to meet as Professional Learning Teams (PLTs), using data from Knowledgehook, Acadience Screeners and Lexia to support the implementation of the Science of Reading.
- In addition, Catholic School Councils and staff will be meeting to review the results of the EQAO assessments, collaborate and share Student Achievement Plans and provide ways to foster deeper relationships and support student achievement.
- Bullying Awareness & Prevention Week runs November 17-21, 2025
- Gr. 8 Open Houses are scheduled in November – Saint Paul Open House will be on November 20 with planned Grade 8 Day events in December; Saint Paul is on Dec.12
- Elementary and secondary principals continue to work collaboratively to support transitions to high school through school visits and well-planned events.
- November 26, is the Niagara Catholic Lead Out Loud Conference
- Supporting Pathstone Mental Health by wearing Plaid takes place on November 27, 2025 with a PA Day on November 28.
- Looking ahead to Advent and Christmas, we are planning a range of festive events, including Christmas Family Open Houses, trips to Balls Falls and Weekly Advent Services with a school Mass.
- December 22 to January 5, 2026 is our Christmas Break, returning the day before the Feast of the Epiphany.

- Extracurricular activities will continue to thrive in our schools, with upcoming events in sports and robotics. These include Junior Boys/Girls Triple ball, Intermediate Volleyball, and VEX Robotics competitions—offering students opportunities to grow in teamwork, leadership, and technical skills. Secondary

Vice-Principal McLean reported:

- Pilgrimage: All secondary schools participated in this year's pilgrimage, with Notre Dame celebrating its 50th anniversary. Representatives from each school joined the walk with Notre Dame, and an impressive 800–900 attendees gathered for Mass. The unified event saw strong participation across all schools.
- OSSLT: The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) is currently underway and will close on December 2. Students have been preparing through practice tests and receiving additional support to ensure success.
- Midterm Reports: Midterm report cards will be distributed during the week of November 17.
- Parent-Teacher Interviews: Scheduled for November 24–27, these meetings provide an opportunity for families to connect with educators and discuss student progress.
- Fall Athletics: The Niagara Catholic Athletic Association's Fall Championships are in full swing. Winning teams will advance to SOSSA (Southern Ontario Secondary Schools Association).
- Holiday Fundraising: Secondary schools are ramping up Christmas fundraising efforts to support students and families in need. Initiatives include collecting non-perishable food items and monetary donations.
- Post-Secondary Applications: University and college application season has begun. Key deadlines are:
 - University: January 15
 - College: February 1
- Young Women in Trades Bootcamp: On December 17, Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School will host a bootcamp in partnership with our community partners aimed at encouraging young women to explore careers in the skilled trades, such as plumbing, electrical and HVAC.

J. TRUSTEE REPORT

- The new Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board for the upcoming academic year will be chosen at the Organizational meeting. The meeting is open to the public and will be livestreamed.
- There has been a fair amount of information in the media about local representation and the interest of the Ministry to eliminate the role of the trustees. Trustee Huibers stated the he was not going to speak to the strength or the non-value of the trustee but wanted to identify that there is a horizontal movement of information, the role of SEAC and the role of the NCPIC creates an opportunity for movement of information in all directions to ensure that the system understands locally, what those pressures are. There have been a number of school boards that have had supervisors assigned and the role of the trustees taken away. It is clear for the Catholic boards because of our ability to self-govern, the trustees have retained 25% of the access to their services, which the Ministry has determined that, that is the amount of the faith-based influence you would have in the system. Trustee Huibers stated that he didn't

know if that was a fair representation of how it is meant, as he believes we do a much more comprehensive integrated piece and he doesn't know how you peel the onion to determine that is the 25% when it is woven through all of our curriculum. Supervisors were assigned to school boards as certain school boards, Toronto Catholic and Toronto Public the largest of them, didn't meet their budgetary requirements. We have to provide a balanced budget. The supervisors coming in now recognize that it is almost impossible to balance the budget based upon the funding envelop that is provided and now recognize that there are gaps in special education, facilities and deliveries. Niagara Catholic is fortunate that we have a balanced budget but it is not without compromise and sacrifice in a variety of areas. So as the conversation happens as to whether this is a good thing or bad thing to have Trustees determined by the broader public, and the Minister knowing that it is integrated and that's a voice that can happen have value. Trustee Huibers stated that he ran for Trustee because it mattered to him to help be that voice and he knows that his seven peers around the table do that, and Niagara Catholic is very fortunate to have two student trustees in a very active role. When we lose that voice and integration of conversation it's not going to be a good thing for Niagara Catholic and it does create a great risk to publicly funded Catholic education in Ontario. Not because any of the Trustees need a job and or something to come to, Trustees do it because they have faith in the system and they want the system to flourish, counting on everyone around the table and staff to ensure that happens. Trustee Huibers shared that his father was a trustee long before he was, and his father's name is on the original plaque at St. Edward as developing the school when there was no Catholic school in the Jordan area. That wasn't without some challenges in some of the outlying communities to develop Catholic schools, and seeing it evolve through the course of time, its a legacy that exists for all of us and it would be a shame to see it compromised in any way or creating an opportunity that it could be further eroded.

ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL YEAR CALENDARS: 2026-2027

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The *Education Act, Regulation 304 - School Year Calendar, Professional Activity Days* outlines the requirements and timelines for preparing and submission of school year calendars to the Ministry of Education for approval.

For the 2026-2027 school year calendars, there are 195 possible school days between September 1, 2026 and June 30, 2027. Within this total, elementary and secondary schools must have a minimum of 194 school days, of which seven (7) days must be designated as professional activity days. Secondary schools may have a maximum of ten (10) instructional days set as examination days. The remaining school days shall be instructional days.

CONSULTATION PROCESS

The 2026-2027 School Year Calendar Committee met to discuss and review the draft calendar and the consultation process.
