# Why A Chess Program Newsletter?

One of the main reasons why it was decided to publish a Chess Program newsletter is because more and more schools are starting to incorporate Chess as part of their regular instructional program and all but two Elementary Schools participated in the 4 Regional Area Chess Tournaments that were held this past April.

# **Elementary School Chess**

2009 Junior and Intermediate Chess Team Championships

The Chess Instructional Program is an integral part of the Ministry's Mathematics curriculum. This program is designed to enrich the mandated Ontario Mathematics & Literacy expectations. It promotes higher level thinking and problem solving skills; presents EQAO style questions and game scenarios. Studies prove that there is a great benefit to the students when Chess is taught as part of the regular curriculum.

# Why a Chess Curriculum Program

- Studies prove that there is a great benefit to the students when Chess is taught as part of the regular curriculum.
- 2. A Chess curriculum program will serve to enhance current curriculum practices.
- Through the medium of Chess, children learn disciplined thinking skills, which are applicable to other intellectual endeavours
- The Chess Program may be used to cover mandated Provincial Mathematics & Language Expectations.
- Dr. Robert Ferguson states that "The discipline of Chess provides the necessary fourth 'R' in education REASONING. Dr. Ferguson states that Chess Education is extremely effective with children because:
- Chess involves all levels of critical thinking (knowledge, comprehension, application, analysis, synthesis & evaluation).
- 2. Chess requires forethought and cultivates visualization skills.
- 3. Chess improves problem solving skills
- 4. Chess encourages children to overcome the fear of risk taking.
- 5. Chess teaches concentration and self-discipline.
- Chess enables children to assume responsibility for their decisions.
- 7. Chess rewards determination and perseverance.
- Chess raises self-esteem and promotes good sportsmanship.

Chess encourages socialization skills that extend across cultures and generations.

Ancient game finds new life as teaching tool

POTOMAC, Md. - All Ross Pancoast has to do to get his class at Beverly Farms Elementary School to sit quietly and focus is set up a few chessboards,

Pancoast, who teaches chess before and after school at about nine schools in Montgomery County, says he has seen a resurgence of the game in schools."

"More educators are seeing the impact on their students," says Jerry Nash, scholastic director of the U.S. Chess Federation,

The aim: to teach criticalhinking skills that help students ucceed academically and socialy, she says. "One of the basics of he chessboard is that it uses a oordinate system (which is) the asis of algebra."

that is part of the Abundant Waters after-school program at PS 51 in New York, says founder Marlie Buehler, who notes that it teaches children many skills, including how to take notes. "I firmly believe everybody should have to take it," she says. "It's teaching the mind how to think."

Though chess isn't required in most schools, Nash says, programs have been launched in ineven home schools

The universal nature of the game is the reason for its popularity. "Chess is an equalizer - it doesn't depend on your size or age. Plus it's very inexpensive."

Pancoast says parent demand is a large part of the reason chess programs have become a staple in many schools. When Pancoast's father, Omar, started the C&O Family Chess Center in

years ago, there were so many Parent Teacher Associations asking for programs in their schools that Omar brought Ross on to meet the demand. Now they work with about 25 schools.

# Chess is effective teaching tool: study

For parents who simply want their children to excel in school, research has consistently pointed to one tool: chess. It is a game some Nobel laureates have mentioned playing as children.

A number of studies have focused on the benefits of the game. One, published in 2000 and entitled The Case for Chess as a Tool to Develop Our Children's Minds, by Professor Peter Dauvergne at the University of Sydney, was based on a summary of other research and concluded chess can raise IQ scores, strengthen problem-solving skills, enhance memory, reading, language and math abilities, foster creative and original thinking and provide practice making accurate and fast decisions under time pressure, a skill useful during exams. It also noted chess can teach children to think logically and efficiently and help with concentration.

Prof. Dauvergne, a chess player himself, concluded, "Chess is one of the most effective teaching tools to prepare children for a world increasingly swamped by information and ever-tougher decisions." He argued chess is one of the few games that fully exercises our mind and meted that most children around six or seven can follow the rules and some aged four or five can play "Like learning a language or music, an early start can help a child become more proficient. Whatever a child's age, however, chess can enhance concentration, patience, and perseverance, as well as develop creativity, intuition memory and, most importantly, the ability to analyze and deduce from a set of general principles, learning to make tough decisions and solve problems flexibly... It can equally challenge the minds of girls and boys, gifted and average, athletic and non-athletic, rich and poor. It can teach children the importance of planning and the consequences of decisions. It can further teach how to concentrate, how to win and lose gracefully, how to think logically and efficiently, and how to make tough and abstract decisions.... Chess can also build confidence and self-esteem without overinflating egos, as some losses are inevitable, even for world champions."

# **EQAO Background Information**

The Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) tests students' skills in reading, writing and mathematics at key points in their elementary-school education. Students are tested twice:

- at the end of Grade 3, to assess what they've learned throughout the Primary Division (Grades 1–3)
- at the end of Grade 6, to assess what they've learned throughout the Junior Division (Grades 4–6).

Why does Ontario conduct province-wide tests of reading, writing and mathematics? In 1995, Ontario's Royal Commission on Learning recommended such tests for Ontario students. The Commission made this recommendation after consulting with parents, educators, students and others who wanted greater accountability and assurances of quality in the publicly funded education system.




EQAO test results provide a snapshot of your child's achievement in relation to the provincial standard. Students meeting or exceeding the standard (Levels 3 and 4) have demonstrated most or all of the required reading, writing and mathematics knowledge and skills expected at this stage in their education. However, no single test can offer a complete or definitive picture of what your child has learned. In the end, no one better understands the true measure of your child's abilities and knowledge—or is in a better position to assess them—than his or her classroom teacher. When used together, the results of EQAO and classroom tests provide a more complete picture of your child's knowledge.



#### H1N1 Flu Virus - practices and policies of the Diocese of St. Catharines

On May 1, 2009 a communication was circulated to all the parishes of the Diocese outlining a series of interim preventive and protective measures in liturgical practice in light of the H1N1 influenza. We are in regular communication with health authorities who advise us that these measures are appropriate and ought to continue.

General recommendations from health authorities are the following:

- Clean hands regularly and thoroughly with soap and water
- · Cough into your elbow, arm/sleeve or tissue
- · Clean Surfaces, Toys and Objects regularly and disinfect them
- · Practice personal space of two metres if someone in your household is ill
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth to spread germs
- · Stay home if you are ill or have a fever
- Keep on hand an alcohol-based hand sanitizer available at home and in your car or your pocket.
   To be effective, the hand sanitizer gel or wipe needs to have at least a 60% alcohol content.

#### Recommendations for liturgical practice:

- Parishes may wish to provide hand cleaning stations near the entrance to the church.
- Priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers need to be vigilant in the practice of sound hand hygiene. Ministers of Holy Communion should wash their hands thoroughly before Mass begins.
- Holy Communion under both kinds (except for the priest presiding and other concelebrating priests) should be discontinued for the present.
- When distributing Holy Communion to those who receive "on the tongue," special care must be taken to avoid touching the tongue or the lips. If inadvertently this happens, the one administering Holy Communion should withdraw to cleanse their hands before continuing.
- The exchange of the Sign of Peace, an important gesture in the sacred liturgy, can be given in ways other than our common North American gesture of shaking hands. A polite bow accompanied by a verbal greeting such as "peace be with you" seems more appropriate in our present circumstance.
- Clear instruction should be given that if anyone suspects they may be suffering from the flu, they should stay at home and take proper measures of care at home.

13 new cases in Niagara region

For the week of October 10 - October 16, 2009 Niagara Region Public Health has received 13 new laboratory confirmed cases of H1N1 flu virus, resulting in a total of 47 laboratory confirmed cases in Niagara Region (cumulative of 1st and 2nd wave). There has been one death of a Niagara resident associated with H1N1 flu virus.

1st wave cases – From May 25, 2009 - August 4, 2009 we had a total of 21 lab confirmed cases and one death associated with H1N1.

2nd wave cases – From September 1, 2009 - October 16, 2009 we have had a total of 26 lab confirmed cases of H1N1.

#### \*Updated\* Pandemic H1N1 Influenza is Here!

October 21, 2009

Dear Niagara Region School Boards,

Autumn and cold weather is here, and with it, an increase in pandemic H1N1 flu virus. At Niagara Region Public Health (NRPH) we have been monitoring the levels of influenza in the region and they are increasing. We believe most cases of sudden onset of fever and cough with sore throat, aches and pains, or fatigue is caused by H1N1.

Thank you for your ongoing support of the **school absenteeism monitoring program.** Your continued assistance has allowed us to keep a watchful eye on the levels of illness in the community. As you know, NRPH will be contacting your school and possibly conducting a site visit if a school reports student absenteeism of **20% or greater**.

In anticipation of further spread of the H1N1 flu virus this season and beyond, Niagara Region Public Health wants to ensure that you, your staff, teachers, and parents are aware of the ways to prevent the spread of the virus.

Vaccination is OUR BEST way of protecting against the H1N1 flu virus. All people 6 months of age and older, including pregnant women, are recommended to get the H1N1 vaccine. Information on H1N1 vaccination clinics is available from the NRPH website at:

Other simple precautions you can take to reduce the spread of the virus include:

- Wash your hands encourage regular hand cleaning with either soap and water for at least 15 seconds, or an alcohol-based hand rub and rub until hands are dry. Be sure to set a good example by doing this yourself.
- Stay home if you are sick you or your child should stay home until you are free of symptoms for 24 hours with the exception of a mild cough. This is usually 5-8 days. People WITHOUT symptoms do NOT need to be isolated or guarantined.
- Cover your cough or sneeze set a good example for children by
  covering your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze
  (and then wash your hands), or coughing/sneezing into your upper sleeve,
  NOT the hands. Encourage children to do the same.
- 4. Avoid close contact with sick people.
- Discourage touching the eyes, nose or mouth, as germs spread this way.
- Clean surfaces often, this includes counters, fridge handles, faucet taps, bathrooms, railings, computer keyboards, and telephones. Your usual school or household cleaner is sufficient. Remember to follow the directions on the label.

#### PREPARATION OF THE AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR 2008-2009

#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On an annual basis, the Ministry of Education requires all school boards to submit their Audited Financial Statements and Grant Schedules, at the end of the school year.

The Board Auditors have completed the audit engagement for the year 2008-2009 and they have prepared a "DRAFT" of the Audited Financial Statements. The final and official Audited Financial Statements will be presented to the Board at a special Board Meeting on November 9, 2009.

We are pleased to report that the financial results for the year 2008-2009 are very positive and that the planned transfer of \$1,908,638 from the Reserve for Working Funds, which was required to balance the annual budget, will be reduced to a total of \$497,090. In addition, the Board will be able to transfer unspent capital funds amounting to \$772,256 into the Pupil Accommodation Reserve.

This improvement in the financial position of the Board resulted mainly from increases in enrolment, from additional revenue received during the year and from the monitoring and control of the expenditures throughout the year.

At this time, we confirm that the 2008-09 Financial Statements are balanced and that they are in compliance with the guidelines and regulations issued by the Ministry of Education. We are pleased to enclose the following information, for the review of the Trustees.

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for local governments established by the Public Sector Accounting Board of The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants.

### (a) Reporting entity

The consolidated financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures and fund balances of the reporting entity. The reporting entity is comprised of all organizations accountable for the administration of their financial affairs and resources to the Board and which are controlled by the Board.

School generated funds, which include assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures and fund balances of various organizations that exist at the school level and which are controlled by the Board are reflected in the consolidated financial statements.

Interdepartmental and inter-organizational transactions and balances between these organizations are eliminated.

### (b) Trust funds

Trust funds and their related operations administered by the Board are not included in the consolidated financial statements as they are not controlled by the Board.

### (c) Basis of accounting

Revenue and expenditures are accounted for on the accrual basis of accounting. The accrual basis of accounting recognizes revenues as they are earned and measurable; expenditures are the cost of goods and services acquired in the period whether or not payment has been made or invoices received.

### (d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are comprised of cash on hand, demand deposits and shortterm investments. Short-term investments are highly liquid, subject to insignificant risk of changes in value and have a short maturity term of less than 90 days.

### (e) Capital assets

The historical cost and accumulated depreciation of capital assets are not reported. Capital assets are reported as expenditures on the "Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities" in the year of acquisition. See note 2.

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies - continued

### (f) Deferred revenue

Certain amounts are received pursuant to legislation, regulation or agreement and may only be used in the conduct of certain programs or in the delivery of specific services and transactions. These amounts are recognized as revenue in the fiscal year the related expenditures are incurred or services provided.

### (g) Retirement and other employee future benefits

The Board provides defined retirement and other future benefits to specified employee groups. These benefits include pension, future paid sick leave benefits, retirement gratuity, workers' compensation and long-term disability benefits. The Board has adopted the following policies with respect to accounting for these employee benefits:

(i) The costs of self insured retirement and other employee future benefit plans are actuarially determined using management's best estimate of salary escalation, accumulated sick days during employment and at retirement, insurance and health care cost trends, disability recovery rates, long-term inflation rates and discount rates.

For self-insured retirement and other employee future benefits that vest or accumulate over the periods of service provided by the employees, such as future paid sick leave benefits or retirement gratuities, the cost is actuarially determined using projected benefits method prorated on service. Under this method, the benefit costs are recognized over the expected average service life of the employee group. Any actuarial gains and losses related to the past service of employees are amortized over the expected average remaining service life of the employee group.

For those self-insured benefit obligations that arise from specific events that occur from time to time, such as obligations for workers' compensation, long-term disability and life insurance and health care benefits for those on disability leave, the cost is recognized immediately in the period the events occur. Any actuarial gains and losses that are related to these benefits are recognized immediately in the period they arise.

- (ii) The costs of multi-employer defined pension plan benefits, such as the Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System pensions, are the employer's contributions due to the plan in the period.
- (iii) The costs of insured benefits are the employer's portion of insurance premiums owed for coverage of employees during the period.

### (h) Reserve and reserve funds

Certain amounts, as approved by the Board of Trustees, are set aside in reserves and reserve funds for future operating and capital purposes. Transfers to and/or from reserves and reserve funds are an adjustment to the respective fund when approved.

### NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies - continued

### (i) Government transfers

Government transfers, which include legislative grants, are recognized in the consolidated financial statements in the period in which events giving rise to the transfer occur, providing the transfers are authorized, any eligibility criteria have been met and reasonable estimates of the amount can be made.

### (i) Investment income

Investment income earned on surplus operating funds, capital funds, reserves and reserve funds are reported as revenue in the period earned.

Investment income earned on externally restricted funds such as pupil accommodation, education development charges and special education is added to the fund balance and forms part of the respective deferred revenue balances.

### (k) Budget figures

Budget figures have been provided for comparison purposes and have been derived from the budget approved by the Trustees. The budget approved by the Trustees is developed in accordance with the provincially mandated funding model for school boards and is used to manage program spending within the guidelines of the funding model. Given differences between the funding model and Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for local governments established by the Public Sector Accounting Board, the budget figures presented have been adjusted to conform with the basis of accounting used to prepare the consolidated financial statements. The budget figures are unaudited

### (1) Use of estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, and reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results may vary from current estimates. These estimates are reviewed periodically and, as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in the periods in which they become known.

### 2. Tangible Capital Assets

For fiscal years beginning on or after January 1, 2009 the Board will be required to report the historical cost and the accumulated amortization of tangible capital assets in its financial statements in accordance with The Public Sector Accounting Handbook PS3150 - Tangible Capital Assets. The Board will fully implement this standard beginning with the August 31, 2010 fiscal year.

For 2008 & 2009, Public Sector Guideline 7 requires the disclosure of tangible capital asset information in the notes to the financial statements to the extent that reliable information is available. Information related to land and buildings summarized below has been obtained from the Ministry of Education for purposes of Provincial Consolidation.

Tangible capital assets will be recorded at historical cost. Historical cost includes the costs directly related to the acquisition, design, construction, development, improvement or betterment of tangible capital assets. Cost includes overheads directly attributable to construction and development. Estimated historical cost was used to record existing tangible capital assets, if the actual cost was unknown when the board first started to prepare to implement tangible capital asset accounting.

### Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan

Teachers and related employee groups are eligible to be members of Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan. Employer contributions for these employees are provided directly by the Province of Ontario. The pension costs and obligations related to this plan are a direct responsibility of the Province. Accordingly, no costs or liabilities related to this plan are included in the Board's consolidated financial statements.

### Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System

All non-teaching employees of the Board are eligible to be members of the Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System ("OMERS"), a multi-employer pension plan. The plan provides defined pension benefits to employees based on their length of service and rates of pay. The Board contributions equal the employee contributions to the plan. During the year ended August 31, 2009, the Board contributed \$1,789,418 (2008 - \$1,757,700) to the plan. As this is a multi-employer pension plan, these contributions are the Board's pension benefit expenses. No pension liability for this type of plan is included in the Board's consolidated financial statements.

### Future Paid Sick Leave Benefits

The Board allows for the accumulation of sick days for certain groups of employees hired after specified dates up to an allowable maximum provided in their employment agreements. Accumulated credits may be used in future years to the extent that the duration of the employee's illness or injury exceeds the current year's allocation of credits. The use of accumulated sick days for sick leave compensation ceases on termination of employment. The Board provides these benefits through an unfunded defined benefit plan. The benefit costs and liabilities related to this plan are included in the Board's consolidated financial statements.

As a result of an actuarial valuation for the year ending August 31, 2009, it was determined that an actuarial loss of \$4,313,181 existed. This amount is being amortized over the expected average remaining service lives of several employee groups. The unamortized value is \$4,053,250. The actual obligation is \$13,910,818.

### Retirement Gratuities

The Board provides retirement gratuities to certain groups of employees hired prior to specified dates. The amount of the gratuities paid to eligible employees at retirement is based on their salary, accumulated sick days, and years of service at retirement. The Board provides these benefits through an unfunded defined benefit plan. The benefit costs and liabilities related to this plan are included in the Board's consolidated financial statements.

As a result of an actuarial valuation for the year ending August 31, 2009, it was determined that an actuarial loss of \$890,286 existed. This amount is being amortized over the expected average remaining service lives of several employee groups. The unamortized value is \$779,033. The actual obligation is \$5,915,673.

### WSIB - Schedule II Future Liability

The Board is a Schedule II employer under the Workplace Safety and Insurance Act and, as such, assumes responsibility for the payment of all claims to its injured workers under the Act. The Board does not fund these obligations in advance of payments made under the Act. The benefit costs and liabilities related to this plan are included in the Board's consolidated financial statements.

A reserve has been established for this liability. The balance as at August 31, 2009 is \$ 924,860 (2008 - \$ 914,444)



### Stop Now and Plan Program to Assist Students



Niagara Catholic elementary schools will benefit from a share of \$4.7 million in federal funding for a program to help at-risk students in our schools.

On September 28th, St. Catharines Member of Parliament Rick Dykstra announced \$4.7 million in funding from the Ministry of Public Safety for the Stop Now and Plan (SNAP) program. The program will help students in Grades 2-8 who are showing signs of aggression, impulsivity and low achievement.

The program focuses on teaching students to think before reacting when they are angry or frustrated. It will teach students to stop and think through positive alternatives before acting out. It will also focus on increasing emotional awareness.

SNAP will also address mental health issues among Niagara's youth, offering support to students and their families.

The 3.5-year program will be administered by the John Howard Society of Niagara, and will operate in all four school boards in Niagara, in partnership with Niagara Regional Police and Niagara Child and Youth Services.

### Niagara Catholic Launches International Co-op Program

Beginning in February 2010, Niagara Catholic will offer its first international cooperative education experience, which will be available to all secondary school students throughout Niagara Catholic.

Students participating in the inaugural Niagara Catholic International Co-op Experience (NCICE) for 2010 will travel to Japala, Guatemala and earn four credits in co-op, one credit in Grade 12 Religion and one credit in Grade 12 Physical Geography.

Students will choose an area of interest for their co-op placement, from teaching English in rural elementary schools and basic computer skills in computer centres run by Wells of Hope, to working at local orphanages, medical clinics or construction sites.

Additional co-op placements include learning construction skills from local and Canadian contractors by building homes and constructing wood-efficient, smokeless stoves, rainwater collection systems and cisterns and helping to develop small business opportunities for people in both rural and urban centres.

Students will also have the opportunity to volunteer as "Big Brothers" or "Big Sisters" to children living in Guatemalan orphanages and to learn about Guatemalan family life by staying with a rural family.

Future cooperative experiences to other destinations affiliated with our secondary school social justice programs are being discussed.

### European Exchange Students Welcomed by Board



Members of Niagara Catholic's International Student Exchange program and their exchange partners were presented to Trustees during the October 13th Committee of the Whole Meeting. Niagara Catholic students Victoria Ahle, Samantha Auger, Emily Burkholder, Patrick Fowler, Jillian Karner, Braden Kenny, Michelle Presse and Dalton Vander Sanden will travel to France in February 2010, for their semester-long exchange, while Christina Rome will travel to Switzerland. Lauren Kafal has already completed her exchange to France and is currently hosting her exchange partner.

### 17 Schools Designated "Schools in the Middle"

Seventeen Niagara Catholic Elementary Schools have been designated as "Schools in the Middle" by the Literacy and Numeracy Secretariat (LNS), Student Achievement Branch.

Canadian Martyrs, Cardinal Newman, Father Hennepin, Loretto Catholic, Monsignor Clancy, Our Lady of Victory Jr., St. Alexander, St. Ann (St. Catharines), St. Anthony, St. Charles, St. Denis, St. Gabriel Lalemant, St. John, St. Martin, St. Peter, St. Theresa and St. Thomas More Catholic Elementary Schools all had between 50 and 74 per cent of students achieve the Provincial Standard on EQAO during the 2008-2009 school year.

The results mean the schools have been designated Ontario Focused Intervention Partnership (OFIP) 3 Schools in the Middle for the 2009·2010 school year. OFIP is considered akey strategy to support schools to improve student achievement.

A Board Improvement Team comprised of the Superintendent of Student Achievement, Family of Schools Superintendents, the Administrator of School Effectiveness Framework, Principals and Consultants/ Coaches will support the work of each designated school's School Improvement Team.

The Ministry of Education will hold a System Improvement Team Professional Learning Symposium in October. Following that meeting, the School Improvement Teams from the 17 designated schools will be invited to a meeting to discuss and share learning strategies and to help develop instructional leadership capacity.

One of Niagara Catholic's System Priorities is to improve student achievement by focusing on increasing Niagara Catholic's EQAO scores and the OSSLT achievement results an average of 2 percent by June 2010.
