REPORT TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE SEPTEMBER 12, 2017

NAMING REQUEST – ST. MARTIN OF TOURS CHAPEL AT THE NEW ST. MARTIN CATHOLIC ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Niagara Catholic District School Board received over \$12.6 million in funding from the provincial government to replace the aging St. Martin Catholic Elementary School in Smithville. On Wednesday, December 9, 2015, Niagara Catholic broke ground on the site for a new St. Martin Catholic at 18 Streamside Drive, in Smithville.

On September 5, 2017, the first day of the 2017-2018 school year, arrangements were made for the St. Martin Catholic School community to participate in a memorable ceremony that honoured both the past and present St. Martin Catholic Elementary School. The school community assembled to say "good-bye" at the original school site that had provided over 50 years of Catholic educational excellence in Smithville, and then boarded school buses to move together, a kilometre down the road, to celebrate the new school opening. Over 400 students, along with staff, parents, Chair McNeil, Vice-Chair Burtnik, Director Crocco, Superintendent Baldasaro, Controller Whitwell and Mayor Joyner entered the new school building which includes a beautifully appointed school chapel at the entrance of the school.

In accordance with Board Policy 100.15, Naming of a Board Facility, Designated Area or Chapel,

All Chapels in the Niagara Catholic District School Board will be named after the Blessed Trinity, or a name for Christ, or a mystery of his life already accepted in the liturgy, or the name of the Holy Spirit, or a name for the Blessed Virgin Mary, or a name of a holy angel, or the name of a Saint, or the name of a blessed provided the Bishop has given permission.

- 1. All requests will be presented to the Family of Schools' Superintendent of Education for consideration.
- 2. If supported by the Family of Schools' Superintendent of Education, a recommendation will be made to the Director of Education for consideration.
- 3. The Director of Education will consult with the Bishop of the Diocese of St. Catharines for endorsement.
- 4. If supported by the Director of Education and endorsed by the Bishop of the Diocese of St. Catharines, the Director will present the recommendation to the Board of Trustees for consideration.
- 5. The Board of Trustees will approve the naming or renaming of a Chapel within a Board facility.
- 6. The name of the Chapel within a Board facility will be displayed with an appropriate interior sign or lettering.

Recommendation

A recommendation has been made by the Family of Schools' Superintendent of Education, and Principal of St. Martin Catholic Elementary School to the Director of Education - to name the chapel at St. Martin Catholic Elementary School - after St. Martin of Tours. The Director of Education has consulted with the Bishop Bergie of the Diocese of St. Catharines and received Bishop Bergie's endorsement of the recommended name for the chapel.

Born in Sabaria, modern day Hungary, in 316, Martin was raised in Italy by non-Christian parents. The son of a military veteran, by law he was forced into service with Roman army at the age of fifteen. During a military mission in France on a cold winter day, Martin encountered a shivering beggar. Having no money to offer, Martin removed his cloak, tore it and wrapped half around the man and half around himself. Later that night he had a vision of Christ wearing his cloak and saying, "Martin, a mere catechumen has clothed me." The next day he resolved to be baptized and after completing his catechumen studies was baptized at the age of eighteen. After being discharged from military duties, Martin began his ministry of preaching and later was made Bishop of Tours, a position he faithfully carried out until his death in 397.

We are requesting the chapel at the new St. Martin Catholic Elementary School be named after St. Martin of Tours. His full title, St. Martin of Tours, is an acknowledgment of the service and leadership he provided to the people of Tours over the course of his twenty-five year ministry as their bishop. While his encounter with the beggar in France is often the most recognized image of St. Martin, it was his time in Tours that set him apart as a true shepherd and faithful servant of God. He is credited with numerous healings and miracles and his preaching drew large crowds from cities and villages far beyond Tours. Christian peacemaking was a theme throughout his episcopal ministry as the Bishop of Tours even going so far as to oppose violence against heretics. Firmly rooted in his faith, and devoted to a life of service to Christ, St. Martin of Tours is a great model and witness to the faith we share and the life of service Christ calls us to.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

At the April 26, 2016 meeting of the Niagara Catholic District School Board, the following motion was approved;

THAT the Niagara Catholic District School Board approve the Niagara Catholic System Priorities 2016-2017, as amended. (Appendix A)

The Niagara Catholic System Priorities 2016-2017 were designed to provide the annual focus for the system towards achieving the outcomes of the Niagara Catholic Vision 2020 Strategic Plan. Within the two (2) Strategic Directions and the seven (7) Enabling Strategies are the approved system priorities which provide the specific framework to measure the achievement of each direction and strategy within a specific school year.

The Board approved System Priorities 2016-2017 were posted on the Niagara Catholic website and copies were provided to all Principals, Vice-Principals, staff, Bishop Bergie, Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC), Catholic School Council Chairs and the Niagara Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (NCPIC). In addition, a poster size copy of the Niagara Catholic System Priorities 2016-2017 were placed in public locations in all schools, Board sites and the Catholic Education Centre for review by students, staff, parents and guests to Niagara Catholic.

With the conclusion of the 2016-2017 academic year, members of Senior Administrative Council and Board staff collated, analyzed and reviewed all measurements and data gathered for the 2016-2017 school year and completed its review of the progress in achieving the System Priorities within each Strategic Direction and Enabling Strategy of the Board 's Vision 2020 Strategic Plan.

1. Enabling Strategy - Provide Supports for Success



- Established a Grade 4 Faith Festival pilgrimage to the Holy Doors of the Cathedral of St. Catherine of Alexandria for all Grade 4 classes throughout the fall of 2016 to celebrate the Jubilee Year of Mercy.
- Held Vocation Fairs, in partnership with the Diocese of St. Catharines Vocations Office, in each secondary school to foster a deeper understanding of vocation.
- Secondary students and staff participated in the Special Olympics Ontario School Championships and Qualifiers program, and the School Championships held June 14-16, 2017 in the Niagara Region.
- Provided the Board Improvement Plan for Student Achievement and Well-Being (BIPSAW) and the template for School Improvement Plans for Student Achievement and Well-Being (SIPSAW) to all schools.
- Provided results from the Student Voice Surveys

 Grade 8 Transition and Grade 12 Graduation
 surveys, to elementary and secondary schools for school improvement planning.
- Provided EQAO results of the 2015-2016 Primary and Junior Assessments, Grade 9 Assessment of Mathematics, and the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test to the Board and schools, in support of school improvement planning for the 2016-2017 school year.
- Continued to implement evidence-based programs by Child and Youth Workers - Roots of Empathy, Zones of Regulation, Girls' Talk, Boys' Lounge and No Longer the Norm in elementary and secondary schools.
- Continued to provide mental health interventions and counselling supports to schools - the

Board's Mental Health Team, *Community Threat Protocol* implementation, and Mental Health and Addictions Nurses (MHANs).

- Developed a Protocol for Suicide Prevention, Intervention and Postvention that includes Pathways to Service.
- Delivered training for Principals, Vice-Principals, Board Administrators and staff with the Niagara Regional Police Service, on the revised Police Protocol between the Niagara Regional Police Service and the Niagara Catholic District School Board.
- Provided Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) for staff.
- Provided professional development for Child and Youth Workers on restorative practices and circles, health and safety, special education and experiential mindfulness and practice.
- Provided training for Child and Youth Workers on EverFi's Ignition online e-modules for implementation in elementary schools to support digital literacy, responsibility, citizenship and discipleship.
- Provided learning resources materials and information for Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week in November 2016.
- Continued to support research projects as approved by the Board's Research Ethics Review Committee for educational research to enhance student learning, achievement and well-being.





1.2 Improve student achievement in mathematics and create pathways for success for all students

- The November 18, 2016 Professional Activity Day theme of *Knowing the Learner* focused on modules in the area of IEP development, learning disabilities and technology to align with the implementation of the *Renewed Mathematics Strategy.*
- Provided Maplewood connectEd training for Kindergarten teachers and Early Childhood Educators to implement the Kindergarten Communication of Learning: Initial Observations template and the Kindergarten Communication of Learning template.
- Continued the implementation of the Secondary Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting Department Guide in all secondary schools.
- Continuing to build capacity in content knowledge for teaching mathematics through self-directed learning opportunities, Primary /Junior Mathematics Part 1 Additional Qualification course, in-class coaching support and co-teaching, resource sharing and schoolbased mathematics learning sessions.
- Continuing to provide direct coaching support for schools identified as requiring intensive and increased support in the *Renewed Mathematics Strategy*.
- Continuing to support secondary mathematics departments in using data to assess student learning, and to support teachers of Grade 9 Applied Mathematics to develop a comprehensive program, including adjusting instructional and assessment practices, to communicate and assess students with learning disabilities.
- Learning sessions were provided for Grade 9 Applied Mathematics, GLE/GLS teachers and Program Chairs of Mathematics and Special Education, focused on knowing the learner, evidence-informed decision making, and professional learning for the use of diagnostic assessments and digital tools in gathering assessment data, such as Chromebooks, ABA strategies and Executive Function.

- Continue to provide in-class coaching support and learning sessions with mathematics departments.
- Completed a book study Grading from the Inside Out (Tom Schimmer) - with Elementary and Secondary Principals and Program Chairs of Mathematics.



1.3 Develop and implement a plan to embed global competencies and experiential learning in elementary and secondary programs

- Defined Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) Program to teachers, students and parents through individual classroom visits in secondary schools and at Chair, ERT and Principals' meetings.
- Opened the new Niagara Launch Centre -Powered by Niagara Catholic District School Board, and continue to promote and utilize it as a school, community and industry hub for innovative, creative and authentic experiential learning experiences.
- Continuing to promote experiential learning ideology and opportunities to teachers, students and parents in support of the Highly Skilled Workforce Recommendations/Community Connected Experiential Learning document.
- Continuing to promote Creating Pathways to Success as a necessary avenue for career and life planning - for K-12.
- Continuing to nurture partnerships with postsecondary institutions (Niagara College, Brock University) to offer rich, engaging workshops and activities (both on and off campus) to K-12 students in various subject areas.
- Continuing to address local economic needs through industry partners such as the Niagara Industrial Association and Niagara Workforce Planning Board, and adapt programs to meet demand for the changing workforce.
- Continuing to offer and encourage students to take advantage of rich cooperative education experiences through single-credit, double-credit, full-day, SHSM, after-school, and summer co-op programs.



1.4 Expand social justice opportunities, global citizenship and international education experiences

- Continuing to enhance the Annual Pilgrimage to raise awareness, educate and raise money to support various projects and social justice organizations in the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Domenica, Peru, Rwanda, and Haiti.
- Students and staff participated in mission trips to communities in countries supported by the Annual Pilgrimage in 2016-2017: Holy Cross travelled to Guatemala; Blessed Trinity travelled to the Dominican Republic; and Lakeshore Catholic travelled to Dominica.



- More than 350 students and staff from all eight Catholic secondary schools travelled to Italy, France and England to participate in the 100th Anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge in April 2017.
- Holy Cross students in the International Languages course travelled to Italy in March 2017.
- The fourth annual Secondary School Culture of Life Conference, featuring keynote speaker, Fr.
 Tom Lynch from Priests for Life, took place at Mount Carmel Spiritual Centre on November 23, 2016.
- Created and trained a community of educators, chaplaincy leaders and faith ambassadors to use technology such as Chromebooks and Google, and facilitated opportunities to connect their students to the world, forming digital discipleship.





2. Enabling Strategy - Enhance Technology for Optimal Learning



2.1 Implement the 2016-2017 phase of the Technology Blueprint 2016-2020

Network Infrastructure

- A new VPN (Virtual Private Networking) appliance, which provides secure access to Niagara Catholic content for all staff, has improved capabilities which will further improve Niagara Catholic's Information and Data Security.
- Additional modern wireless technology is being acquired to continue to improve wireless internet access across the system. ETS continues to roll out this newer, more reliable technology. Approximately half of the Board has been upgraded, with the remaining upgrades dependent upon the availability of budget.
- Data Centre
 - Niagara Catholic is continuing to both invest and play a pivotal role in the Niagara Community Cloud project, which provides the lowest-cost cloud solution. The cloud was designed and built by Niagara Catholic's Cloud Architect, and a pilot is currently underway with all Niagara public sector partners.

 A new core switch has been acquired, configured and staged for our new data centre. This switch has state-of-the-art technology which will allow Niagara Catholic to take advantage of features to drive down the cost of internet.

Instructional Technologies

- Principals now have discretion and control in using endpoint funding to best meet the needs of their respective schools.
- Robotics pilots are underway, which provide enhanced opportunities for elementary students to both gain and increase competency in coding and robotic engineering.
- Niagara Catholic continues to leverage services from Gartner to maximize resources and gain access to more valid technology research and technology implementation acceleration tools.
- Business Continuity
 - With support from Gartner, ETS has implemented a Disaster Recovery Management program to ensure a consistent architecture for disaster recovery across all core platforms, such as the network, internet, wireless, school and business platforms.



- ➤ Central Services
 - Investments in telecommunications and dependent wiring infrastructure are being made to improve operations and reduce costs. These changes will save up to \$5,000 per month, each month, going forward.
- Information & Data Security
 - A consolidated *Education Technology Services Policy and Procedures* document was developed as part of our Technology Blueprint plans for the year, which meets recent internal audit guidelines.
 - An Incident Management Plan for information and data security events is in development. This will guide Niagara Catholic's response to related incidents quickly and efficiently, protecting the information and data assets of the Board and school communities.
 - A Security Risk Management Plan will be developed using industry standard tools to mitigate risks with our available resources and capacity.



- 2.2 Relocate the network infrastructure of Educational Technology Services
- The planning phase of relocation project is completed, and deliverables to fulfill Niagara Catholic's obligations to the Ministry for our Shared Services Grant will be finalized by the end of September. This project has moved to the preparation phase, where application performance baselines will be developed to validate the success of the project. Workflow is being documented to create the necessary checklist for use during the final (execution) phase of the project.
- The ETS organization has finished the relocation to the St. Thomas Centre. Building upgrades and enhancements are ongoing while staff are working from their new location. All upgrades and enhancements to the site should be completed by the winter.



3. Enabling Strategy - Building Partnerships and Schools as Hubs



3.1 Enrich the engagement of student voice and leadership

- Met with elementary and secondary students senators regularly to engage in dialogue regarding school-related activities and initiatives and set goals for the upcoming year.
- Hosted the 28-8: The Power of Leadership Student Conference for student councils and student leaders from each secondary school and elementary senators.
- Invited opportunities for student engagement and leadership through Board-wide participation in community events such as the Niagara Wine Festival Grande Parade and WE Day, and Board events such as Heritage Fair, Speak Out, Student Leadership Symposium and our Grad Celebration.
- Student trustees and senators used input gathered from the FNMI Truth and Reconciliation Conference and 28-8: The Power of Leadership Conference, to create a document of recommendations for future student leadership conferences.
- Niagara Catholic increased student participation in the annual *Culture of Life Conference*, to encourage a strong Catholic voice on life issues.



3.2 Enhance the relationship and capacity between schools, parishes and homes in Niagara Catholic and the Diocese of St. Catharines

- Implemented Tiers Two and Three of the Catholic Education Congress, engaging students, parents, the Niagara Catholic Parent Involvement Committee, Catholic School Councils, Trustees, staff, priests, parishioners, Catholic educational partners and community members.
- Increased Principal and pastor dialogue at the Advent Director's Meeting and Faith Formation Luncheon, in support of Tier Two of the Catholic Education Congress.
- Supported local triad committees in developing and sustaining local initiatives and/or events to strengthen the triad relationship.
- Approximately 800 people attended the Festival of Families at Saint Michael Catholic High School on May 25.
- Trustees, staff and parents participated in the annual Faith Formation program, based on our theological theme of One Family in Christ: Love Him.





3.3 Expand, develop and implement community hub programs, services and facilities partnerships within school communities

- The Ministry of Education has approved grant submissions to fund after-school skills development programs for students with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). These programs began in 2016-2017 and will run through the 2017-2018 school year.
- Niagara Catholic and Niagara Student Transportation Services (NSTS) completed the leasehold agreement at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Elementary School. This agreement and renovations optimized empty space on the second floor.
- Staff developed additional after-school and weekend programming, as well as Summer Camp 2017, across the system. Two-hundred and seventy-five students participated in the summer camp, offered in elementary, secondary schools, and at the Board's St. Kateri Tekakwitha Centre from July 10 to August 11, 2017.
- Niagara Catholic continued to work closely with the Region of Niagara, through Community and Social Services, as well as the YMCA of Niagara, to maximize program delivery efficiency for students and families.
- Niagara Catholic continued to develop partnerships with the Niagara Regional Native Centre, Fort Erie Native Friendship Centre and Niagara

Region Metis Council to expand current secondary educational opportunities, child care services and elementary programming.

- Niagara Catholic has formed a relationship with Strive Niagara to support our Young Parent Program, and will continue to monitor the current program to look for expansion needs.
- Niagara Catholic continues to work with the John Howard Society to share facilities and resources and provide job development and career awareness opportunities.
- Niagara Catholic works with RAFT Niagara to provide support services, programs, resources for students, with the goal of reintegration into school wherever possible.
- Niagara Catholic is developing a Health and Wellness partnership in three elementary schools with No Limit Performance as a pilot program. This program will be monitored for potential expansion into an after-school and/or summer program.
- Niagara Catholic continued to work closely with Brock University and Niagara College for transitioning activities for students, for shared usage of facilities and potential staffing opportunities.





4. Enabling Strategy - Strengthen Human Resource Practices and Develop Transformational Leadership



4.1 Design and deliver a comprehensive *Multi-year Professional Development Plan*

- A PD Committee will update this plan regularly.
- The timeframe for the Multi-year Professional Development Plan is 2016 to 2018.
- The highlights of the Plan for teachers for 2016 - 2018 are Literacy and Numeracy (Renewed Mathematics Strategy).
- The highlights for Administrators focus on the Predictive Index, HR Certification, Wellness, Leading in a Unionized Environment and Resiliency.
- Special Education highlights included training in Behavioural Management Systems (BMS) and Safe Management Group (SMG) for select employee groups.
- Year One of the Leadership Identification Program (LIP) 2016 – 2018 is completed. Year Two will begin in October 2017.
- Four sessions of the New Teacher Induction Program (NTIP) are completed. The four sessions are Introduction to NTIP, Equity, Google Training, Assessment and Evaluation.
- The PD plan is organized and aligned to the yearly BIPSAW.
- The Joint PD Committee is a conduit to Staff Development and link to Senior Administration. The team met quarterly to discuss PA Days and other relevant PD needs with partners including OECTA, CUPE, Principals and Vice-Principals, Non-Union staff and Senior Administrative Council.
- THRIVE Platform is in development, and will replace PD Place by January 2018 and will assist in the organization of all PD at Niagara Catholic.





4.2 Promote effective communication, process and leadership in decision making to nurture the distinctiveness of Catholic education and advance student achievement for all

- Discussions occurred with Superintendent of Human Resources Services, Family of Schools Superintendents and Principals on a variety of operational items.
- To date, individual, large group and specialized group consultations and discussion have occurred. Topics of discussion included:
 - Attendance Support Program and requirements of Principals and Administrators with staff that report to them;
 - School-based staffing requirements;
 - Collective Agreements;
 - Terms and Conditions; and
 - Personal Wellness



4.3 Develop a differentiated coaching and mentoring model for aspiring leaders

- The assessment provided a descriptor of the leader's strongest behaviours, management style and strategies and influencing style to maximize the effectiveness, productivity and job satisfaction of the leader.
- The Predictive Index Survey provided valuable information to support mentee self-reflection, and for an effective mentor-mentee relationship.
- Individualized and differentiated self-assessments and coaching guides were completed by Senior Administration, Principals, Vice-Principals, Administrators and members of the Leadership Identification Program, and the Human Resources Services Department.
- Senior Administrative Council members analyzed their individual results and its results as a senior team.

5. Enabling Strategy - Create Equity and Accessibility of Resources



- 5.1 Continue to design evidence informed decision making with key performance indicators to align with board and school improvement plans, system priorities and annual budgets
- Database mining is occurring for several Niagara Catholic applications to create a Niagara Catholic Database Hub in Microsoft SQL Server 2016. We are establishing a relationship database management system.
- Exploring an application to connect our Niagara Catholic Database Hub and provide timely data to all Management and Board Of Trustees. (Microsoft Power BI).
- Completed the database for the Board's Smartfind application.

A multi-year project, in partnership with Education Technology Services, has been launched, introducing a web application platform powered by Microsoft SharePoint to continue to improve workflow and automate the approval process. We will continue to explore all operational workflow procedures, and accelerate productivity by transforming all processes such as notifications and approvals with web-based solutions.





6. Enabling Strategy - Ensure Responsible Fiscal and Operational Management



6.1 Maintain financial stability through a balanced budget for 2016-2017

- With the revision of the Board's Attendance Support Program Policy and the implementation of the Provincial Earned Leave Plan, sick occurrences increased approximately 13% since last school year.
- Local negotiations, grievances and arbitrations continue to strain our ability to manage our balanced budget for 2016-2017.





- 6.2 Select and implement a functional and user-friendly Accounting Software Platform
- Microsoft NAV Altus Dynamics application was selected as our vendor of choice.
- The implementation process is underway with current staff and no additional resources.
- ➤ Application was live as of August 2017.



7. Enabling Strategy - Address Changing Demographics



7.1 Implement the 2016-2018 phase of the Long-Term Board Accommodations Plan

- The Saint Michael and Saint Paul Catholic High School Families of Schools Attendance Area Review Committee completed its review and submitted a recommendation to the January 17th, 2017 Committee of the Whole Meeting, in compliance with the timelines established by the Board for this Board Ad Hoc Committee.
- The Modified Pupil Accommodation Review process was completed for Monsignor Clancy Catholic Elementary School and St. Charles Catholic Elementary School. The Board

approved the Staff Recommendation that the two school communities be combined at the Monsignor Clancy Catholic Elementary School site, following appropriate renovations and/or addition. The Capital Priorities Business Case for funding approval by the Ministry of Education was submitted on September 8th, 2017.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This Board report details the 2016-2017 EQAO Board results for the Assessments of Reading, Writing and Mathematics for the Primary and Junior Divisions, the Grade 9 Assessment of Mathematics and the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) in Niagara Catholic schools. The results indicate that Niagara Catholic students continue to demonstrate success in literacy and numeracy.

Senior Administrative Council, along with Principals, Vice-Principals, teaching and support staff continue to collect, review and analyze student achievement data, including EQAO results, in order to inform Board and School Improvement Plans for Student Achievement and Well-Being. Niagara Catholic administrators and staff continue to implement instructional, assessment and evaluation strategies, as well as interventions to support the learning needs of all students, and to close the achievement gaps in literacy and numeracy. The increased focus on teaching and learning in Mathematics, through the Ministry of Education's *Renewed Mathematics Strategy*, will continue in 2017-2018 to support student achievement in Mathematics.

Committee of the Whole Takes to the Road to Niagara Launch Centre



Trustees and Senior Staff took to the road for the first Committee of the Whole Meeting of the 2017-2018 school year.

The September meeting took place at the Board's state-of-the-art technology training hub, the Niagara Launch Centre – Powered by Niagara Catholic District School Board, which is located inside the former Target store at the Seaway Mall.

The 12,000 square foot facility is home to a number of innovative new programs, including automotive service

and repair and a variety of construction technologies. It came to life after many years of Niagara Catholic utilizing space in public locations in Welland, including the former Canadian Tire store on Niagara Street, and unoccupied storefronts in Seaway Mall. The Niagara Launch Centre is the culmination of these experiences, as well as consultation with students, staff, parents, the community, local industry and the Ministry of Education.

The Board was praised for its commitment to providing students with the most current, relevant and innovative career paths by those in the know, including Niagara Workforce Planning Board CEO Mario DeDivitas, Kevin Hart, National Sales Manager for In-House Solutions, a technology software provider, Steve Hett, the Ontario Technology Training Manager for Bell Canada, and Nick Ciccone, Training Director for the Labourers' International Union of North America (LiUNA), Local 837. Mr. Ciccone also presented a \$10,000 cheque to Director of Education John Crocco and Board Chair Father Paul MacNeil to help fund the Launch Centre.

Following the presentation of the report to Committee of the Whole, trustees and senior staff were able to view the students in action, as they showed off their skills in their respective areas of study.

Trustees Approve Recommended Name of New St. Martin Catholic Elementary Chapel

On September 5, the St. Martin Catholic Elementary School community celebrated the opening of their long-awaited brand-new school. A week later, Niagara Catholic trustees recommended that the Board approve naming the new school's chapel after the school's namesake, St. Martin of Tours, during the Committee of the Whole Meeting. The name recommendation was endorsed by Bishop Bergie.

St. Martin of Tours was born in Sabaria (modern-day Hungary) in 316 to non-Christian parents, and was raised in Italy. During his mandatory military service, Martin encountered a beggar in France, shivering in the cold. With no money to offer, Martin took off his cloak, tore it in two and shared it with the beggar before going on his way. That night, he had a vision of Christ wearing his cloak, saying, "Martin, a mere catechumen (a person training to convert to Christianity), has clothed me."

Martin was so moved by the vision he resolved to be baptized. After completing his studies, Martin was baptized, began his ministry of preaching and was later made Bishop of Tours. Firmly rooted in his faith and a life devoted to the service of Christ, St. Martin of Tours is an excellent model and witness to the faith we share and the life of service we are called to by Christ.

2017 Summer Camp Program Hailed as a Success

Niagara Catholic's first-ever summer camp program drew 275 elementary students to six sites over five weeks this summer.

The 2017 summer camp program was an integrated program that consisted of the Summer Learning Program for students with high literacy and numeracy needs, and a traditional summer camp. Students participated in a variety of activities themed around life skills, pathways planning, active living and general interests, all of which were infused with literacy and numeracy.



Modules in the 2017 summer camp program included **Home Sweet Home** (reading and following instructions, basic assembly, fixing and maintenance, budgeting, sewing and crafts); **Master Chef** (preparing nutritious and popular meals and snacks, with the emphasis on reading instructions, measuring/proportions and counting, as well as on the importance of using local produce, nutrition, health and wellness,

gardening and safe food handling); **Nuts and Bolts** (woodworking and tool basics, which allowed students to learn to read blueprints and diagrams to learn measurement, scale, angles and calculation, building hand-eye co-ordination as they created their own projects); **On the Move** (focusing on common and alternative modes of transportation and energy forces, as well as calculating distance, speed and time, fuel consumption and power); and **Robotics** (by building a robot through the VEX program). The camps took place at Our Lady of Victory Catholic Elementary School in Fort Erie, Blessed Trinity Catholic Secondary School in Grimsby, Saint Michael Catholic High School in Niagara Falls, Lakeshore Catholic High School in Port Colborne and Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School in St. Catharines.

WEEKLY ROUNDUP

THE BAD WITH THE GOOD — While the provincial election won't officially begin until May, there is not an announcement made without a thought about how it will play on the campaign trail. On that front, internal polling has no doubt buoyed Liberal prospects as they are being told their recent policy announcements are gaining traction — even if their leader continues to languish at dismally low levels. While most public opinion polls have the PCs maintaining a lead over the Liberals, internal polls conducted for the governing party over the past nine months — albeit by the Gandalf Group and **David Herle** who is leading the Liberals' 2018 election campaign — indicate widespread popular support for increasing Ontario's minimum wage, implementing carbon pricing and even measures to provide rebates on hydro bills, a particularly contentious matter for the government. All of this while Premier **Kathleen Wynne**'s personal popularity sits at around 15%. With this information in hand, expect the Liberals to do all they can to make this election more about policy than personality. Wynne implied as much in a short video she posted to Twitter this week where she said her job is not to be popular, but is to build a more fair Ontario: "Whether people like me or not, I'm really glad that people think that free tuition for kids from zero to 25 is a good idea. I'm really glad people think that having free medication for kids from zero to 25 is a good idea. I'm really glad people think that having free medication for kids for a fairer Ontario."

WHAT NOMINATION ISSUES? — Wynne wasn't the only party leader to get some good polling news where trouble was thought to lay. According to a recent poll conducted by Forum Research, more than half of Ontarians say they are not aware of the issues that have been plaguing the Progressive Conservatives and Leader **Patrick Brown** when it comes to the nomination of candidates. Among the roughly 43% who say they are aware of the issues, a third say it has made their opinion of Brown worse — but it should also be noted that more than half of those folks identified as NDP and were unlikely to be voting for the PCs anyway. These figures make for an interesting study of the so-called political bubble, occupied by those who are actively engaged and/or attentive observers of the happenings at Queen's Park, on Parliament Hill or in their local city hall. Quite often, issues emerge that seem massively important within that bubble, but the reality is outside of the political bubble — where the vast majority of Ontario residents reside — they barely cause a ripple. PC Party insiders are hoping this poll is painting that exact picture. While committed Liberals and NDP harp on the nomination irregularities in some ridings, most Ontarians are not tuned in, and likely won't be until the campaign kicks into high gear next spring when it is hoped more pertinent policy issues will be occupying the stage. The Forum poll surveyed 981 Ontarians on August 23rd and 24th, with a margin of error of three per cent, 19 times out of 20.

NORTHERN REFLECTIONS — The chances of the Northern Ontario Party sending an MPP to Queen's Park are as remote as, well, the northern reaches of the province. But that doesn't mean the separatist party isn't having an impact. It was founded with a mandate to create a new province out of Northern Ontario, but in the process has made strides to highlight the unique issues that face the north that perhaps are not being reflected in the highly urbanized Toronto power centre of government. And without question, with nine months to go until the election, the three major parties are jostling for the votes of Ontario's northern residents:

- Wynne has been all over the north for much of the past couple of weeks. Her government recently announced the creation of two new ridings in the northernmost areas of Ontario, and she did a tour to highlight efforts to kick-start the infrastructure projects that will make the vast deposits of chromite in the area known as the Ring of Fire accessible.
- Brown brought his caucus retreat to Timmins last week to let voters in the area know the "North matters." He wasn't shy to point out that he has visited Northern Ontario 27 times since he became party leader in 2015.
 "Part of our tradition is every year we have a driving tour and we go through some of the worst snowstorms in some of the most dilapidated infrastructure, areas where there's no cellphone reception," he said. "It gives you a perception of some of the real challenges and why you have to put a northern lens on public policy being written at Queen's Park."
- The NDP have traditionally been the strongest in the region, and Leader **Andrea Horwath** isn't going to easily cede any of that ground to her political rivals. Her most recent northern jaunt stopped in Kenora, Sioux Narrows and Thunder Bay where she was taking the government to task for staffing shortages in local hospitals, seniors care that doesn't meet adequate standards and to state her support for development to the Ring of Fire the right way: "I want to unlock the thousands of jobs and billions of dollars in economic activity this project promises," she said, noting any efforts must respect Indigenous nations in the area as partners. "Unlike Wynne and the Conservatives, I understand the urgency."

All of this attention on the north and general political uncertainty highlighted in public opinion polling is making political observers believe the election in the north may be more competitive than we have seen in the past. With the Tories staging a surprise win in the recent Sault Ste. Marie by-election, it is expected to be a real three-way race.

C'EST MANUFIQUE — With more than 600,000 francophones living in Ontario — and two-thirds of those in the Greater Toronto Area — the Liberals are set to introduce legislation that will create the province's first French-only university. Recommended by the French-language University Planning Board last month, the proposed new school was touted by Advanced Skills and Education Minister **Deb Matthews** as an entity that will be governed for and by francophones. It is also looking at a downtown Toronto location, which will be a point of contention raised by the NDP; MPP **France Gelinas**, who has several times introduced a private member's bill for a French university in Northern Ontario, immediately raised concerns about the pockets of French communities in places like North Bay and Sudbury remaining unserviced. However, with more than 400,000 francophones in Toronto, a site in the provincial capital simply makes sense.

RUMOURS & RUMBLINGS

ELECTION FORD-CAST

If there is one thing at which the Ford family excels, it's generating media attention. Former Toronto city councillor **Doug Ford** was partaking this week with the pre-announcement of a pending announcement that he will next week decide whether he will challenge Toronto Mayor **John Tory** in the municipal vote a little more than a year from now, or carry the Tory banner in Etobicoke North in June's provincial vote. He will make the announcement Sept. 8 at the family's annual Ford Fest gathering. "People are fed up," Ford said. "They put their hands in their pocket and you've got the municipal government in there, you've got the provincial government in there and you've got the federal government in there...It's all 'tax, tax, tax' and 'spend, spend, spend." Speculation is now running rampant about

what that decision may be — but PC Party insiders say Ford will run provincially and that they are not only holding Etobicoke North open for him, but are also keeping adjacent ridings open for other candidates from the so-called Ford Nation. But the rumour mill is churning, with whispers that between now and the vote, Ford is expected to be a good soldier and support the party. But if Brown fails to unseat the unpopular Wynne, Ford is expected to make a quick strike to unseat him as leader and make a run for the post himself. Adding to the gossip is that Ford will not be alone in pushing for a quick change. It is doubtful another star candidate attracted by the Tories came on board to just be a cabinet minister or, in a worst-case scenario, backbench MPP in opposition. In that scenario, expect **Caroline Mulroney** to line up against Ford for the party leadership. Many insiders believe that race has already begun, even through Brown is still active and showing quite well — according to polls.

FOR THE RECORD

"I think it's important because of the impact it's having on my community. People are horrified, they're traumatized, they're worried about their children. • NDP MPP **Peter Tabuns**, who has joined with Toronto school board trustee **Jennifer Story** and city councillors **Paula Fletcher** and **Mary Fragedakis** in asking Attorney General **Yasir Naqvi** to file an injunction to block the distribution of graphic anti-abortion images and literature in vogue with pro-life activist groups.

• Premier **Kathleen Wynne**, while acknowledging that Canada's first Prime Minister was "far from perfect", refuting a call from the elementary teachers union to pull **John A. Macdonald**'s name from schools that have been named after him.

ONTARIO LEGISLATIVE HIGHLIGHTS

ROCK THE HOUSE – Technically it's a legislative session, but everyone involved knows that when MPPs reassemble this coming Monday it will be about broad positioning far more than the minutiae of lawmaking. They will convene one more time before the provincial election in June 2018, but by next spring the parties will be in full campaign mode, so the period between now and December is the last real opportunity to use the Legislature as a springboard for policy stances. (This will intensify in November, when PC Leader **Patrick Brown**'s long-awaited policy conference takes place. Presumably he will emerge with the basis of a platform, which will then become central to his daily Legislature discourse.) Oh, there will be some legislative business, not the least of which will be processing the Liberals' labour reform bill, which includes the contentious plan to hike the province's minimum wage to \$15/hr. The bill will assuredly pass – after plenty more debate, much to the Liberals' delight as they are confident they have the public on their side. But even that will be more fraught than earlier in the current mandate. With Toronto Centre MPP **Glen Murray** having left Queen's Park and no plan to fill the vacant seat before the general election, the Liberal majority is down to just five. They have a caucus of 56, minus Speaker **Dave Levac**, leaving 55 voting members, against 50 from the Opposition benches.

BRAD NEWS – Economic Development Minister **Brad Duguid** will be in his seat on Monday, but he won't be looking to hang on to it next June. Duguid announced this week that he will not seek re-election, joining fellow Liberals Levac, **Monte Kwinter** and **Mario Sergio** as well as Tory **Julia Munro** on the path to retirement. As always in these situations, Duguid insisted his decision was not based on polls showing the Liberals headed to defeat, but was spurred more by the minor heart attack he suffered last year. "Like a good boxer ... you have to know when it's time to go, personally," he philosophized. "I'm not old, but I am old enough to know that the runway is shorter than it used to be – that now is the time to go and find another way to contribute." Traditionally this kind of announcement triggers a cabinet shuffle, as an opportunity to raise the profile of backbenchers who *are* running again. But for now Duguid will stay put, as will the rest of the cabinet – at least until other incumbents confirm they're on the way out.

COURT OF PUBLIC OPINION – However hostile the mood in the Legislature might be, it will be a welcome respite for most Liberals in the next few weeks, as they endure not one but two courtroom dramas with political ramifications. The cases are unrelated judicially but very much linked politically, as Liberal operatives defend themselves against accusations of wrongdoing. In Sudbury, proceedings are now underway to deal with allegations of bribery in the 2015 by-election – with Premier **Kathleen Wynne** slated to be a star witness for the defence – and next week will see the start of a criminal trial over alleged destruction of government documents related to gas plant closures in 2011. Not everyone is convinced that either or both trials will seriously damage the Liberals' re-election

chances (see below). But the Opposition parties are gung-ho to amplify the relatively minor charges into the equivalent of political war crimes. As several Tories have put it in media interviews, this is "Liberal corruption on trial."

"You have to put this all in context. The Tories are going through their own mini-crises with riding association battles and legal things going on and police being called in. It's not just the Liberals, it's happening to the Tories as well and we don't know how this is going to play out in the campaign. The other thing is, how much of this has already been discounted? With [Sudbury MPP Glen] Thibeault, this was a cloud hanging over even the last byelection, but voters held their nose and they voted for Thibeault, they held their nose and voted for the side of government."

POLL DANCE – Regular polling should give some indication as to whether the court cases are having any impact on public sentiments and voting intentions. According to the most recent baseline, a late-August survey by Forum Research found Brown's Tories still holding a commanding lead, with 40% support among decided voters, well ahead of a statistical tie between the NDP at 27% and the Liberals at 25%. This result brought some joy to the NDP, whose supporters chortled on social media that it shows Liberal efforts to outflank them on the left (e.g., \$15 minimum wage) aren't working.

SOUTHWESTERN UNION – As they watch judicial events unfold in Sudbury, it must gall the New Democrats to know that all of this started when they *won* the seat in 2014, only to have their MPP decide a few months later that the Queen's Park lifestyle wasn't for him, triggering the by-election that snowballed into the bribery saga. But as much as the NDP still sees Northern Ontario as fertile ground, they focused their attention on the other end of the province this week. Leader **Andrea Horwath** convened a three-day caucus retreat in Chatham-Kent – kicked off by a luncheon with about 100 local community leaders – to prepare for the upcoming legislative session. "We decided to come to southwestern Ontario to have this meeting, because we think that this area … has got a great deal of potential," Horwath enthused to the *Chatham Daily News*. "There's a lot of great things going on here and we think that this particular region deserves a government that's going to partner with you and share your vision." Following the 2014 election the Liberals, despite having won a majority, targeted the Southwest (along with Niagara) as an area for improvement. Since then, their flagging popularity province-wide has somewhat broadened their focus, but the dozen or so ridings between London and Windsor figure to be crucial to each party's success or failure in 2018.

THIS BETTER WORK – Premier Wynne took dead aim at traditional NDP support in her annual Labour Day message – just the latest salvo in her out-left-the-left strategy. Usually these statements are bland platitudes about the value of Ontario's workers, but Wynne's language was quite provocative. "This year, Labour Day feels especially meaningful and relevant. I have spent the summer traveling around our province, and what I am hearing is that people are worried. They don't know what the future holds, only that it is uncertain," Wynne posited, addressing the "too many people in Ontario who can't get ahead, don't feel secure in their job or can't get a fair deal from their employer." That last bit was a direct shot at business groups opposing the minimum wage hike – and, by extension, the Tories they tend to support. "There have always been loud and strong arguments for the rich and the well-connected," Wynne continued, drawing a line between big business on one side and government on the other. "The arguments for those struggling to make ends meet or just too busy getting by often go unheard or unheeded. Government exists to seek out and hear those voices."

FORD EXPEDITION – Today's the day former Toronto Councillor **Doug Ford** is expected to announce his electoral plans, and by most accounts he will opt to run for mayor, setting up a rematch with current Toronto boss **John Tory**. Speculation has swirled for months that Ford would throw his hat into the provincial ring, and the Etobicoke North PC nomination has reportedly been kept on hold for him. Not only that, but he is featured on the Ontario PC Party

website, which touts "An Evening with Doug Ford" in Nepean on September 16, a fundraiser on behalf of MPP Lisa **MacLeod** (who, of course, can't attend the event because of new fundraising rules). Nonetheless, rumours persist that PC Party brass made it clear to Ford they didn't want him on their slate, because his brash style and right-wing views could hinder Brown's kinder, gentler, more centrist thrust. Word is there was also distrust over Ford's motivation, amid suggestions he was ready to pounce on a leadership bid should Brown falter in the election. Ford has denied that any such conversations took place, but there is talk that he is marshalling PC candidates throughout Etobicoke and other ridings, which would give him a core of support should the leadership scenario ever unfold.

FOR THE RECORD

"The public wants to know, are you managing your deficit? Are you going to balance the budget this year? Quite frankly, I don't think the public is terribly hung up on accounting disagreements."

Treasury Board President Liz Sandals, after releasing public accounts showing last year's deficit as \$991 million – a figure disputed by Auditor General Bonnie Lysyk, who used different calculations to peg the deficit at \$1.4 billion.

"I think that this is a very important move, that we recognize the importance of what are sometimes called ... global competencies to student learning in all areas. It's important that we recognize that there's more to life than the three Rs."

• Annie Kidder of People for Education, welcoming a "refresh" of Ontario's public school curriculum to focus on critical thinking, spurred in part by low math scores on standardized tests.

"It's all the best farmland that's been developed. Essentially it's entombed forever under asphalt and cement."

• Keith Currie, President of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, supporting the province's current public consultation on agriculture in the Greater Golden Horseshoe amidst ever-growing urban pressures.

"We go back to what his brother used to say: Be there for the taxpayer. Drain the swamp ... although I think that was another bushy-haired guy."

 Joe Reis, a federal Conservative campaign organizer who has been actively working on behalf of Doug Ford, channelling the late Rob Ford – and U.S. President Donald Trump – in explaining why Doug has reportedly opted to run municipally. Reis also took a shot at Toronto Mayor John Tory, who Ford would be trying to unseat, sniping, "The only thing Tory about that man is his name."

THE TRUTH, THE WHOLE TRUTH, ETC. – Ontario's lawmakers may have re-assembled for their fall legislative sitting on Monday, but law *enforcement* was a preoccupation, as judicial proceedings with political ramifications unfolded on multiple fronts:

- Premier Kathleen Wynne made history by testifying in open court unprecedented for a sitting Premier as she took the witness stand in the Sudbury bribery trial. Historic yes, but memorable not so much, as Wynne said exactly what everyone expected her to say: unshakably insisting that she had already determined Glen Thibeault was going to be the Liberal candidate in the 2015 by-election and therefore wannabe nominee Andrew Olivier couldn't have been offered a bribe to voluntarily step aside. She spent the entire four hours standing in high heels no less, a feat described as symbolic by Postmedia columnist Michele Mandel, who wrote, "There was no way she was sitting in the hot seat." Because this was a courtroom and not a public inquiry, there were no cameras at the hearing, but there was plenty of media on hand as Wynne made her way in and out of the courthouse, and the appearance will likely resonate in the months ahead. The outcome of the trial will have more immediate impact a guilty verdict and the critics have a field day; acquittal and the whole issue goes pfft but by waiving her parliamentary privilege and agreeing to testify, Wynne took a chance that voters will ultimately approve of her resolve.
- Wynne may have been in court, but she herself was not on trial a point tersely driven home by her lawyers in a letter to PC Leader Patrick Brown demanding that he stop referring to it that way. Last week, Tory MPP Bill Walker was forced to apologize for comments during a radio interview, and this week a similar statement from Brown "I hope that the premier will give us answers. We're not getting them in the Legislature. Maybe when she stands trial," he was quoted as saying is now on the Liberal legal radar. The letter calls for Brown to formally retract and apologize for the slight. All of which is reminiscent of a tactic Wynne used against Brown's predecessor Tim Hudak. He and caucus colleague Lisa MacLeod were sued for libel over accusations that Wynne "oversaw and possibly ordered" the deletion of emails related to gas plant cancellations. That \$2 million suit was dropped after Wynne won the 2014 election, but it did put a chill into the Tories' rhetoric in the meantime. So far Brown has shown no such inclination to back off, declaring, "her baseless lawsuit will be ignored."
- The aforementioned email deletions are subject of another high-profile court case, involving the Chief of Staff and Deputy Chief of Staff to former Premier **Dalton McGuinty**. But it's on hold at the moment amid legal

wrangling. Having two corruption cases simultaneously was never going to be good for the Liberals, but they had hoped to get them over and done with as quickly as possible. Now, the trial of **David Livingston** and **Laura Miller** will have to wait until at least next week to start hearing evidence. Court did convene long enough for Livingston and Miller to formally plead not guilty to charges of illegally destroying documents related to the 2011 gas plant cancellations, and for Livingston's lawyer to describe police notes as "cryptic, unusually sketchy, as if by instruction" – hence, the legal wrangling over Crown disclosure.

JOINT ACCOUNT - Coincidentally - or not at all, according the Opposition - the Liberals chose the eve of the court cases for a major announcement about provincial marijuana sales when cannabis is legalized federally next July. A trio of cabinet heavy hitters - but not, notably, the Premier - unveiled the plan, with Finance Minister Charles Sousa, Attorney General Yasir Nagvi and Health Minister Eric Hoskins standing side by side to cover the fiscal, legal and health bases. Starting with 40 locations and expanding to 150 stores by 2020, the government will essentially replicate the LCBO model – albeit the 1950s model, with product hidden away, unlike the shiny modern liquor stores – to sell weed. Nagvi called it "a safe and sensible approach to legalization that will ensure we can keep our communities and roads safe, promote public health and harm reduction, and protect Ontario's young people." Not everyone agreed with this assessment. Currently-illegal private dispensaries will continue to be illegal -"If you operate one of these facilities, consider yourself on notice," Nagvi growled – which naturally displeased their owners. Canadian Federation of Independent Business President Dan Kelly also scoffed at the "public sector monopoly," arguing that "an above-ground, regulated private sector could stay much closer to customers' preferences and would guard against an underground industry." Politically, PC Leader Patrick Brown - careful not to sound like he's against legalizing marijuana - challenged the plan as half-baked, suggesting the Liberals just wanted an issue that would stir the...uh, pot. "[It was] a rushed announcement as a distraction technique," Brown sniped. "They don't want us talking about the Liberal corruption trials. They want us talking about some salacious issue."

SWEET LITTLE FIFTEEN – Speaking of issues the Liberals want people talking about, their proposed \$15/hour minimum wage continues to be a hot topic. The narrative didn't exactly go their way this week, however, when a report from the province's Financial Accountability Office deduced that the hike will cost at least 50,000 jobs because it is "both larger and more rapid than past experience, providing businesses with a greater incentive to reduce costs more aggressively." Critics vigorously seized on the report as independent validation of their position, but Labour Minister **Kevin Flynn** wasn't conceding any ground. "People in Ontario support the notion that you work 35 or 40 hours a week ... you deserve to be able to pay rent, to buy food, put shoes on your kids' feet," Flynn asserted, adding, "The job-loss numbers are something that would be disputed by other economists." Notwithstanding the financial watchdog's analysis, the Liberals continue to see the issue playing in their favour, and indeed the other parties were treading carefully, attacking the LIBs' approach rather than the substance of the policy. Brown argued for slower implementation, positing, "What I'd like to see is just a level of reasonableness. Why does it always have to be the Premier's way or the highway?" NDP Leader **Andrea Horwath** aimed to get credit for the idea, while blasting the Liberals for giving the FAO – not to mention the Tories – ammunition to criticize. "We think the \$15 minimum wage should be going ahead – that's why we announced it almost two years ago now – but there needs to be that work done," she fumed.

RUNNING STARTS – Provincial Tories came from far and wide to cheer on **Caroline Mulroney** as she was acclaimed as the party's candidate in York-Simcoe last weekend. The daughter of former Prime Minister **Brian Mulroney** is obviously seen as a new force for the PCs, leading to the unusually large turnout (for any kind of nomination meeting, let alone an acclamation) in Keswick. Brown took the opportunity to pitch his big picture message, crowing, "Caroline is a fantastic addition to our modern, inclusive and pragmatic Ontario PC team." Meanwhile, at another high-profile Conservative announcement, **Monte McNaughton** was the lone MPP on hand for the "Ford Fest" barbecue when **Doug Ford** confirmed he will be running for Mayor of Toronto next fall – and not, as had been previously speculated, as a provincial candidate. Many provincial Tories are heaving a sigh of relief that Ford will not be running on their ticket. There's little doubt Ford could have won Etobicoke North, but it is just as likely he would be a largely unmanageable new MPP that would be the source of problems for Brown from election

day on. But the provincial problems aren't completely resolved. Ford's rematch with current Mayor **John Tory** sets up a quandary within the PC camp, inasmuch as many provincial PCs are Tory supporters while many others are in Ford's corner. They'll all be compelled to mute their criticism – even in the midst of what will surely be a nasty battle – to show a united front for the provincial election that comes first.

GONE TOO SOON – Much sadness in Ottawa and at Queen's Park this week with the passing of Liberal MP **Arnold Chan** (Scarborough-Agincourt). Prior to winning a seat on Parliament Hill, Chan was well-liked throughout Queen's Park as an earnest, enthusiastic aide to cabinet minister **Michael Chan** and Premier McGuinty. He had been battling cancer for a couple of years but that did not deter him from continuing his duties as an MP and his passion for and respect of Parliament.

IN THE HOUSE

- The Sault Ste. Marie by-election seems like eons ago (actually it was June 1), but newly-minted PC MPP **Ross Romano** had to wait until this week to take his seat in the Legislature. As the fall session got underway, the first order of business was for Romano to be escorted into the Assembly. A few minutes later he was up for his first-ever Question Period, grilling the Premier about recent Ring of Fire announcements, asking if she'd admit they were "nothing more than Liberal photo ops to win over voter support in an election year?" She admitted no such thing of course, and welcomed Romano to the Legislature with a droll, "It's great to have you here, but I have to say that we probably need to offer you a technical briefing on the Ring of Fire file."
- Attorney General **Yasir Naqvi** introduced Bill 152, the *Representation Statute Law Amendment Act*, to create the ridings of Kiiwetinoong, Mushkegowuk, Timmins, and Kenora-Rainy River resulting in a total of four ridings in Ontario's Far North instead of the current two.
- Economic Development Minister **Brad Duguid** introduced Bill 154, the *Cutting Unnecessary Red Tape Act*, to amend 40 statutes across six ministries to reduce regulatory burdens on businesses.

WEEKLY ROUNDUP

FARMA CARE – Prior to this week most MPPs likely couldn't find Walton, Ontario, on a map (it's about 30 kilometres east of Goderich in Huron County), but many of them were there this week for the International Plowing Match and Rural Expo. Officially, it's North America's largest outdoor agricultural exhibition; unofficially it's the yearly opportunity for political parties to show how much they care about rural Ontario. It's such a big deal the Legislature recesses for a couple of days to enable large contingents from each caucus to make the trek, and the party leaders never pass up the opportunity to address the opening ceremonies. Alas, a couple of other annual traditions – and major photo ops – were thwarted by Mother Nature this year, when a downpour turned the fields into mud, nixing both the opening parade and the leaders getting on tractors in a contest to see who can plow the straightest furrow. As for the mood of the crowd, Premier **Kathleen Wynne** got a cool reception – which was an improvement over last year, when she was booed outright – while PC Leader **Patrick Brown** was, not surprisingly given his party's rural domination, given the warmest welcome.

THAT'S YOUR OPINION – PC support is still solid far beyond rural areas, according to the most recent Campaign Research survey, which reported 38% of voters province-wide backing the Tories. Unlike other polls, however, that level of support didn't translate into a big lead, with the Liberals only five points back at 33%, while the NDP trail at 23%. Digging a little deeper, the results do indicate a continuation of a couple of trends that are worrisome to respective party strategists, namely that Wynne's approval rating is still a dismal 19%, while fully half of the respondents still don't know enough about Brown to have an opinion one way or the other.

TRIAL BALLOONS – As the Sudbury bribery trial continues over alleged contravention of the *Elections Act*, another statute is now in play, with the Liberals citing the *Libel and Slander Act* in their threat of defamation action against Brown. Specifically, they are pointing to a provision allowing six weeks for a response, setting October 24 as the deadline for Brown to publicly retract his statement that Wynne herself is "on trial" before they proceed with the lawsuit. In the meantime, they will no doubt revel in Brown's discomfort – he repeated his stance that he will ignore the "baseless" lawsuit, but clearly doesn't want to say much more than that – as they try to turn the tables on a bribery trial that obviously makes *them* uncomfortable. Wynne doubled down this week, subtly likening Brown to U.S. President **Donald Trump** and allegations of a less than honest presidential campaign. "I deplore any behaviour that isn't based on truth," Wynne – who publicly supported **Hillary Clinton** against Trump – declared. "Let's just hope and pray that that's not the level of political debate that we're going to have here in Ontario or in Canada." If that linkage wasn't clear enough, Wynne made the direct connection, offering, "No matter who it is, whether it's the President or whether it's the Leader of the Opposition in Ontario, I don't think that behaviour belongs in politics.

DRIVING FORCE – Motorists will be the subject of not one but two new pieces of legislation as the fall session kicks into gear. Transportation Minister **Steven Del Duca** served notice this week that bills are coming to toughen laws around drug-impaired driving – a necessity as recreational marijuana is legalized next year – and distracted driving – a necessity as cellphones continue to be on too many drivers' laps. The latter legislation will also include increased penalties for drivers who fail to yield to pedestrians, Del Duca warned.

DiNOVO A NO-GO – Make it six current MPPs whose name won't be on the ballot next June. **Cheri DiNovo** (Parkdale-High Park) became the first New Democrat MPP to say she's had enough, joining four Liberals (**Brad Duguid, Dave Levac, Monte Kwinter** and **Mario Sergio**) and one Tory (**Julia Munro**) heading out to pasture. DiNovo had been rumoured to be considering retirement from Queen's Park for a while, and this week she made it official. A United Church minister, she won't wait until the election writ to bid adieu, announcing plans to return to her parish as of January 1. Presumably her seat will remain vacant until the general election, given that Wynne has opted against a by-election to fill the gap left by **Glen Murray**'s departure from Toronto Centre.

WHO WILL BE LEFT? – A month from now the NDP could be staring at another empty seat, as voting got underway this week in the federal NDP leadership campaign, with party members having until mid-October to cast their ballots. Which will mean a tense – but potentially exciting – few weeks for the provincial party. Current MPP Jagmeet Singh is considered a frontrunner for the federal NDP crown and, win or lose, the outcome will reverberate through the provincial ranks. If he wins he'll have to resign his Bramalea-Gore-Malton seat, further depleting the NDP squad. If Singh comes up short, there's the potentially awkward return to a provincial caucus he was trying to leave. On the other hand, NDP Leader Andrea Horwath is hoping to get a boost from the buzz Singh's leadership bid generated, and her party should also see a surge of invigorated volunteers in the run-up to the provincial vote.

RED ALERTS – With the provincial election just months away, any talk of Wynne stepping aside as Liberal Leader has subsided, which is fortuitous as a couple of her predecessors are taking turns in the spotlight:

- Lyn McLeod, who was party leader from 1992-96, received the 2017 Distinguished Service Award Ceremony from the Ontario Association of Former Parliamentarians. Prior to the award ceremony, all three parties paid tribute to McLeod in the Legislature. "Lyn McLeod shattered a glass ceiling in this province: She became the first woman chosen to lead a major political party in Ontario," Premier Wynne extolled. "I don't think it is too much to say that she inspired a new generation of female politicians to put their names on a ballot and make a positive difference in public life. Lyn made it possible for me to stand here today as the first female Premier of Ontario. But to tell you the truth, I've always wished I could have been the second female Premier of Ontario, after her."
- Former Premier **David Peterson** will be the guest speaker at the launch of a book about his speaking on Monday at Queen's Park. *Without Walls or Barriers: The Speeches of Premier David Peterson* is a collection edited by journalist **Arthur Milnes** (a former speechwriter for Prime Minister **Stephen Harper**) and policy researcher **Ryan Zade**, with an introduction by TVO's **Steve Paikin**. The tomes are \$30 apiece, but they won't be on sale at Monday's event.

ways of doing business. It's not like I was going to the NDP and asking them if they had that in the Liberal government."

• Sudbury Liberal MPP and Energy Minister **Glenn Thibeault**, at the trial around allegations of bribery in the by-election that brought him to Queen's Park. Thibeault, who was a federal NDP MP, testified that he had plenty of questions before deciding to defect to the provincial Liberals, and that it was a meeting with the Premier at her home – not any specific promises – that ultimately made up his mind.

"I see this as a war by Patrick Brown on local party members. There's no other way to explain it. The people who did get their paperwork in early, they're not even local residents. They think they can come in at the last minute, and carpetbag it ... but I don't think these outsiders would have a chance of winning against a local candidate."

• Jim Karahalios, a local activist who had been seeking the provincial PC nomination in Cambridge, but dropped out amid suspicions the vote was being rigged in favour of a candidate being parachuted in by the central party. Party President **Rick Dykstra** called the allegations in Cambridge – the latest in a long list of ridings where the Tory nomination process has been questioned – "categorically false."

"Patrick shares my vision for pragmatic, progressive conservatism. It's why I'm proud to support him in his mission to form a PC government in 2018. I'm asking you to support him, too."

• Former Prime Minister **Brian Mulroney**, known as a mentor to the PC leader – and whose daughter is running provincially for the Tories – stepping directly into the campaign with a letter urging supporters to donate.

"We have spent a lot of time teaching people that if it seems too good to be true, it probably is. You have to build techniques and strategies to reassure people that they aren't going to be let down and it isn't a scam."

• **Kwame McKenzie**, special advisor to the province's basic income pilot project, noting they have had challenges getting interest from qualified people to submit applications for what essentially amounts to \$1,400 per month, no strings attached.
