



School, Home and Parish

St. Nicholas Catholic Elementary Schools is associated with the Cathedral of St. Catherine of Alexandria. Parish Priest is Father Ben Weber.

Weather pending, we walk to church once a month for mass with Father Ben, usually the third Thursday of the month for a 10:00 a.m. start. Each class is responsible for the readings and for celebrating mass along side Father. Our current masses are as follows:

It Is Imperative That You Report Your Child(ren)'s Absences Daily SafeArrival:

To report your child absent prior to the start of the school day (before 8:35 a.m. of the day being called in for), please use one of the 3 methods listed below:

- 1. Use the SafeArrival website, https://go.schoolmessenger.ca. The first time you use the website, select Sign Up to create your account using your email address. After logging in, select the Attendance tab to Report an Absence.
- 2. Using your mobile device, download and install the SchoolMessenger app (blue logo) from the Apple App Store or the Google Play Store (or from the links at https://go.schoolmessenger.ca). Use your new login information to access your account. Select Attendance to Report an Absence. If you would like to receive attendance notifications on your mobile device please enable Push Notifications in the Settings area of the app. The document Using the SchoolMessenger app will give instructions for using the App.
- 3. The toll-free number 844-287-6287 will allow you to report your child absent without creating an account.

Arriving on Time:

Please try your hardest to arrive to school on time, at 8:35 a.m. Arriving late causes disruptions in the classroom and often times means trying to catch up on what was said regarding the day's events

Please also remember, if you are late to see Mrs. Winstanley for a late-slip before going to class. Thank you

Inclement Weather: Bus Cancellations/School Closures

With the winter weather upon us, there may be times that busses are not running and schools are closed due to inclement weather. Please ensure that you listen to local news/radio for the happenings of the day. When at all possible, Niagara Catholic District School Board in conjunction with the District School Board of Niagara will announce cancellations or closures by 6:00 a.m. Board announcements will be made through various ways: on local radio stations, emails sent to families and staff, and posted on the NCDSB's website.

If busses are cancelled but schools remain open it will become the responsibility of the parent/guardian to drive their children to school and to pick the children up at the end of the day. If you choose to keep your children home, they must be called in using safe arrival - as inclement weather.

If schools are closed, Way To Grow Daycare located at St. Nicholas Catholic will be closed as well.

You do not need to call your children in using the safe arrival if schools are closed.

**Please note that due to Niagara Region's extreme weather, there could be times that schools are closed or busses are not running in one area, such as Fort Erie but other areas are open and proceeding as usual. Information such as this will be made clear through the announcements stated above.

Just a reminder that if busses are cancelled, Lunch Angels will also be cancelled. Children who receive Lunch Angels will be responsible for bringing in their own lunch and snacks on bus cancellation days.



Kindergarten Open House Wednesday, February 7th

Do you have a little one or know of a family that has a little one who will be turning 4 years old by this December? Do you want to have a better understanding of how Kinders play yet learn all at the same time. If so, come and visit us during our open house on Wednesday, February 7th. You do not need to make an appointment.

When registering you will need - proof of address, proof of birth and baptismal certificate. Even if registering online, you will still need to bring or email the above documentations in before the registration is considered complete.

We will also be holding a Kindergarten family orientation evening for all registered children and their families for the 2024-2025 school year at the end of May or beginning of June. Further information will be placed in May's newsletter.

Public Health School Vision Screening March 5th, 6th and 7th

All students at St. Nicholas Catholic will have the opportunity for a school vision screening conducted by Public Health, the first week of March. March 5th, 6th and 7th.

If you do not wish for your child(ren) to be screened, you must opt out two weeks prior to the screening dates. Information on how to opt out will be sent shortly.

Process for follow-up as follows:

- 1) A letter will provided from the EssilorLuxottica Foundation to be sent home with students outlining the results of the vision screening and the recommended next steps. It is important that students receive these letters within 48 hours of the school receiving them.
- 2) If vision screening has indicated the student may be having trouble seeing clearly and SHOULD be seen by an eye doctor (optometrist) as soon as possible.
- 3) Parents/guardians are recommended to follow up with a local optometrist to schedule an eye exam as soon as possible.

When making the eye appointment – it is very important that the parent indicates that they were referred by the school's vision screening program.

If a prescription is provided by the eye doctor, it must be returned to the school (generally within six weeks of the screening) to qualify for FREE glasses.

The cost of one yearly **eye exam** is covered for children 19 years of age and under by the Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP).

4) If the student is seen by an optometrist and glasses are recommended during the school year, glasses may be provided for **free** by the Eyes to As program. There will be a clinic at the school in approximately **6 weeks** following the vision screening. At this time, students will be fitted for frames and corrective lenses. It is important that the prescription is at the school prior to this date. Confirmation of the date for fittings will be provided to the school once confirmed.

**If a student currently wear glasses, they are asked to bring them to school the day of their vision screening. If contacts are worn, students are asked to let public health know prior to their screening.

Transportation

All students enrolled in the French Immersion Program will be provided with transportation to their local Family of Schools designated French Immersion School site in accordance with the Board's Transportation of Student Policy #500.2. Designated Family of Schools French Immersion schools can be located at the following link www.niagaracatholic.ca.

French Immersion On-line Open Pre-Registration

- On-line open pre-registration window for students new to French Immersion in September 2024: Monday, January 15th, 2024 at 7:30 a.m. through to Friday, February 2nd, 2024 at 4:00 p.m. Pre-registrations outside of this window will not be considered.
- There are a limited number of spots available for students wishing to enter the French Immersion Program.
- An account must be created first through Edsembli to access pre-registration forms.
- Pre-registrations are on a first come, first serve basis. Each pre-registration will receive a time-stamp.
- Please visit www.niagaracatholic.ca and click >> the French Immersion Registration banner OR >> then, click the French Immersion tab for information about the program. Additional preregistration details will be posted on this site as they become available. Please check the site before the pre-registration window opens.

Selection Process

In accordance with the Board's Admission of Elementary and Secondary Students Policy #301.1, there are a limited number of spots available for students entering the program. Eligible spots will be determined on a first come, first serve basis for each elementary French Immersion school site. Applicants will receive notification by Monday, March 4th, 2024 to inform them if their children have been placed in the French Immersion program OR if their children have been placed on the school's waitlist. Applicants who have not received notification by March 4th, 2024 are to contact the elementary French Immersion school site directly.

Shrove Tuesday: Tuesday, February 13th

Shrove Tuesday is the day before Lent which starts on Ash Wednesday. The name Shrove comes from the old middle English word 'Shriven' meaning to go to confession to say sorry for the wrong things I've done. Since Lent always starts on a Wednesday, people would go to confession the day before. This day became known as Shriven Tuesday and then Shrove Tuesday. Other names for this day include Mardi Gras, Fat Tuesday or Pancake Tuesday. In preparation of Lent, a time in which people were to fast or eat simply, it was the custom to use up all of the fattening ingredients within the household. These fattening ingredients would include grease, eggs and milk. A very simple recipe to use up these ingredients included the addition of flour to make pancakes

Today, after first recess and for first morning snack, the staff and students of St. Nicholas Catholic will be served two pancakes in recognition of Shrove Tuesday. Please note that this is only a snack and that a lunch is still required.

Valentine's Day: Tuesday, February 13th; Ash Wednesday: Wednesday, February 14th

Pink Shirt Day Wednesday, February 28th


The Pink Shirt Day Story

In 2007, Berwick Nova Scotia, after a new student at their school was bullied for wearing a pink shirt, two grade 12 students bought 50 pink shirts and encouraged their classmates to wear pink. The next day they went to distribute the shirts and to their surprise the majority of students arrived wearing pink! With that act of kindness, Pink Shirt Day was born.

In recognition of the Berwick event, Nova Scotia proclaimed the second Thursday of September "Stand Up Against Bullying Day." In 2008, British Columbia proclaimed February 27th to be the provincial anti-bullying day, and the movement has continued to grow. In 2012, the United Nations declared May 4 as Anti-Bullying Day, and now the last Wednesday each February is Canada's national Pink Shirt/anti-bullying day.

Many countries now recognize specific days for raising awareness about the prevention of bullying and promoting kindness and inclusion. In Canada, many students have heard the Pink Shirt Day message from kindergarten through to their high school graduation. The movement continues to grow.


Black History Month: Black Excellence: A Heritage to Celebrate; Future to Build

Black History in Canada

'Black Canadians and their communities have been a part of shaping Canada's heritage and identity since the arrival of Mathieu Da Costa, a navigator, and interpreter, whose presence in Canada dates back to the early 1600s.

The role of Black people and their communities in Canada has largely been ignored as a key part of Canada's history. There is little mention that some of the Loyalists who came here after the American Revolution and settled in the Maritimes were people of African descent, nor the fact that many soldiers of African descent made many sacrifices in wartime as far back as the War of 1812. Few people in Canada are aware of the fact that African people were once enslaved in the territory that is now known as Canada, or of how those who fought enslavement helped to lay the foundation of Canada's diverse and inclusive society.

Black History Month is a time to learn more about these Canadian stories and the many other important contributions that Black Canadians and their communities have made to the history and continued growth of this country.'

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Kiss And Ride: Please Park Only In A Designated Parking Spot

Please remember that you are asked not to park or get out of your car when in the Kiss 'n Ride line up. The Kiss 'n Ride is exactly that - a quick kiss as your child(ren) quickly get out of the family car.

Or the quick ability for your child(ren) to get into the car and do up their own seatbelts. Please ensure that you have pulled up to the front of the line prior to your child(ren) getting out of the car. After school, staff will support students by getting them to their car safely. If you need to help your child(ren) get in and out of the car, or to assist with the seatbelt, or to help with the putting on or taking off of backpacks, we kindly ask that you park your car in a designated parking spot - away from the flow of traffic.

Our parking lot is small, however the traffic is able to flow well when expectations are followed. We thank everyone for their cooperation when it comes to the safety of our students and staff when in the parking lot and in the Kiss 'n Ride.



Elementary Dress Code

NCDSB has a dress code of <u>navy and white</u> for all Elementary schools and their students within. Below is an excerpt from the Elementary Standardized Dress-Code Policy 302.6.10:

1.1 At a minimum, every student is required to wear one of the following items:

Navy Blue sweat pants for students in Kindergarten to Grade 3;

Navy Blue Pants (Cargo, Corduroy, Denim, Dress, Kobe styles permitted);

Navy Blue Dresses or Skorts; or

Navy Blue Capris or Walking Shorts.

Grade 8 students have the option to wear grey secondary uniform pants purchased through Board uniform suppliers. Pants, skirt or dress length must be appropriate and modest. Only knee length capris or shorts are permitted. All clothing must be in good repair.

1.2 At a minimum, every student is required to wear one of the following items:

Navy Blue or White Oxford shirt (short or long sleeve);

Navy Blue or White Polo shirt (short or long sleeve); or

School designed spirit wear polo shirt. The elementary standardized dress code shirts, either polo or oxford must be buttoned in a respectable manner. Visible t-shirts worn under the elementary standardized dress code top must be either navy blue or white. In addition, approved sweaters and hoodies embroidered and/or screened with the school logo are permitted to be worn as part of the elementary standardized dress code.

No Cell Phone Use While In School

This is a reminder that cell phones are not to be used at school unless under direct supervision of the classroom teacher. Cell phones are not to be used during recesses or lunch breaks. Pictures are not to be taken and under no circumstances can anything, pertaining to any aspect of the school day, be uploaded to the internet. This includes pictures taken on any device aside from a cell phone. If an emergency arises and a parent needs to get ahold of their child, a call to the school's direct line can be made and Mrs. Winstanley will forward the message.

St. Nicholas Catholic is not responsible for any lost or damaged cell phone/technology that is brought to school. For the younger grades, cell phones are to be kept in a child's backpack. For the older grades, cell phones are to be kept in a child's locker. It is advisable for that child to bring a lock to place on his/her locker.
