Catholic Faith and Community

November and December were very busy months at St. Mark! Throughout the month of November, students from grades 1 to 8 attended mass and prayed the Rosary with Father Chris. In December, Student Council led our school in virtual and in-person Advent Celebrations. It was wonderful being able to celebrate such a special season with our entire school – yes, Kindergarten to Grade 8! We held 2 separate in-person Advent Celebrations on the last day of school before the break. Our Choir were amazing and we are very proud of the leadership of our Student Council.

Our focus on the Catholic Graduate Expectations are in full motion, and students are learning about them each month. This month's focus is on being an Effective Communicator and February will be being a Reflective and Creative Thinker

Student Achievement

In our classrooms student are working hard! Structured Literacy continues to be a strong focus. Students are learning more about Phonemic Awareness and decoding strategies to strengthen their Reading Skills. In Numeracy, students are building a stronger understanding of the fundamentals of Numbers with a focus on multiplicative thinking. Both Additive and Multiplicative thinking are taught from Kindergarten to Grade 8. Helping students bridge from additive to multiplicative thinking is complex but starts early. It forms the backbone of the mathematics curriculum and includes important and interconnected ideas such as multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, ratios, percentages and linear functions. It requires time, a variety of situations and opportunities to construct their understanding in multiple ways. Additive thinking means that students are skip counting, one group at a time. Multiplicative thinking means that students are choosing fewer, larger chunks.

Home Supports – Supports for both Literacy and Numeracy can found on your child's NCVLE account. Parents will be receiving information on Knowledgehook. This is a resource used in grades 1 to 8 and our board license will be expanding to tutoring supports. All students will have an account and will be able to access a great deal of supports from home within the next month. Knowledgehook can be accessed through the NCVLE.

Mental Health, Well-Being and Engagement

During December, students celebrated many fun activities. Joy Day started our Christmas season with lots of activity. Dance-A-Thon, Christmas Activities, and a Toy drive to name a few. Our hallways were decked out and celebrating the birth of Jesus was everywhere. Around the school students participated in Choir, basketball, Go Girls, Student Council, and Vex Robotics. Our families were invited to participate in Gingerbread Night and we had a special visit from Santa and Mrs. Claus. A very big thank you to the Knights of Columbus for helping our Student Council for this fun family night.

A very big thank you to our entire community for an extremely successful Dance-A-Thon. In total we raised \$13 000.00 that went towards technology in our school. We were able to purchase an additional Interactive Flat panel Smartboard for the Grade 6/7 classroom as well as 50 Chromebooks. Our students now have 1:1 Chromebooks from grades 4 to 8. Grades 1 to 3 now have 8 to 10 Chromebooks per classroom.
