Treaty Awareness Week - November 4 - 8

In responding to the Truth & Reconciliation Calls to Action, beginning in 2016, the Ontario government designated the first full week of November as Treaties Recognition Week. Treaties Recognition Week is a time to recognize the importance of treaties as legal documents that are shared between sovereign nations. While we typically think of treaties as land claims between the Canadian government and Indigenous people, or between countries as a way of establishing peace, treaties

have been a part of native culture for thousands of years and were legal agreements among the many Indigenous nations who shared this land long before European contact. Treaties are not a thing of the past. Even today, there are ongoing treaties in the Niagara Region and Niagara Peninsula that impact our staff and students who are of Indigenous heritage. For example, the 1492 Land Back Lane claim on Six Nations, the Haudenosaunee Right to Hunt in Shorthills, or the Mi'kmag Lobster Fishermen on the east coast are recent international headlines.

Inuit Day - November 7

The Inuit (pronounced in-new-wheat) are found in the circumpolar regions of Canada, the United States, Greenland and Russia. November 7th has been designated Inuit Day to celebrate the history and lives of Inuit, as well as recognition of the creation of the Inuit Circumpolar Council representing approximately 160,000 Inuit from all four countries. While the number of people of Inuit heritage is small in Niagara, Niagara Catholic does have students who have identified as Inuit as part of the confidential self-identification process.

Indigenous Veterans Day - November 8

Indigenous people from this land have fought on the frontline of every major battle Canada has been involved in dating back more than 200 years to the War of 1812. It is estimated that 12,000 First Nations, Métis and Inuit men and women served as part of Canada's military in World Wars I & II as well as the Korean War. Please take a moment to acknowledge the contribution of all the brave men and women who served to keep Canada and the world a safe place for us to enjoy today.

Bullying Awareness Week - November 10 - 16

During this week, students, school staff and parents/guardians are encouraged to learn more about bullying and its effect on student learning and well-being. Bullying is defined as a form of repeated, persistent and aggressive behaviour directed at an individual or individuals that is intended to cause (or should be known to cause) fear and distress and/or harm to another person's body, feelings, self-esteem or reputation. Bullying occurs in a context where there is a real or perceived power imbalance. Kindness has never been more important than right now. It is a time where kindness can break down barriers and brighten the lives of those around us! That is why 'One Kind Word' is this year's BAPW theme.

Project Plaid - November 29

On students at Holy Name will be encouraged to wear plaid to support Project Plaid for Pathstones Mental Health. HOW IT BEGAN: #ProjectPlaid launched in 2019 after the tragic loss of Amelia Durocher to suicide. Taking quick action, with a resolve not to let this happen to other kids and families, Amelia's mom Shanta created #ProjectPlaid. It not only helped her cope, it quickly became a connection for those who were struggling and it has now become a mental health movement.

Anaphylaxis Policy

At the beginning of every school year, we remind all students and parents/guardians of our Board's Anaphylaxis Policy.

At Holy Name Catholic School we have Emergency Procedures, which clearly state what medical procedures must occur for those students who have various lifethreatening medical conditions.

We are reminding all students and parents/guardians that we have students in our school who are known to have a potentially life-threatening allergy called Anaphylaxis.

Anaphylaxis is a serious allergic reaction that is rapid in onset and may cause death. While fatalities are rare, anaphylaxis must always be considered a medical emergency requiring immediate treatment.

Symptoms of anaphylaxis generally include two or more of these four body systems: skin, respiratory, gastrointestinal and/or cardiovascular. However, low blood pressure alone (i.e. cardiovascular system), in the absence of other symptoms, can also represent anaphylaxis. Breathing difficulties and low blood pressure are the most dangerous symptoms and both can lead to death if untreated. Anaphylaxis is an unpredictable condition as signs and symptoms can vary from one person to the next and from one episode to another in the same person.

In Canada, the most common food allergens that cause anaphylaxis are: peanut, tree nuts (almonds, Brazil nuts, cashews, hazelnuts, macadamia nuts, pecans, pine nuts, pistachios, and walnuts), milk, egg, seafood (fish, shellfish, and crustaceans), soy, wheat, mustard and sulphites (a food additive).

Anaphylaxis requires immediate first aid response and immediate medical intervention

NUT SAFE SCHOOL

Holy Name is a Nut Safe School. Please be aware that there are children in our school who have severe allergies to nuts and foods containing nut by-products. NASK (Niagara Anaphylaxis Support and Knowledge) recommends parents read and become familiar with food labels and check ingredient contents. Please send only foods that are peanut and nut safe.

Medication at School

Students who require medication to be administered at school must submit the appropriate forms signed by a doctor prior to them being administered by staff. Medication will be stored in a secure location and tracking sheets will kept in the Vice-Principal's office.
