



FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

During the week of May 4 to May 9, 2025, we will celebrate the significant contribution that Catholic Education has made to the community, the province and to Canada. Our Catholic Graduate Expectations challenge students to articulate in society those fundamental values that underpin Catholic education.

The theme for this year's Catholic Education Week is:

Catholic Education: *Pilgrims of Hope* L'éducation catholique: *Pèlerins de l'espérance*

The theme for Catholic Education Week 2025 was inspired by the following considerations:

- In February of 2022, Pope Francis announced that the theme for the upcoming 2025 holy year would be "Pilgrims of Hope." "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given to us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. (from Vatican News, a short video on the history of the Jubilee/Holy Year: https://x.com/VaticanNews/status/1783768498885275868)
- The Holy Father asks us to focus prayerfully on the bonds that unite our whole human family, to reflect on the rampant poverty in our world, and to think about the plight of the many refugees forced to leave their homes. He also summons us, as stewards of Creation, "to contemplate the beauty of creation and care for our common home."
- A pilgrimage is a spiritual journey of movement toward a goal, often lived together with others and that certainly describes Catholic education. Hope one of the three theological virtues is grounded in our Easter faith in Jesus' resurrection and renewal; this is what enables us to be builders, dreamers and leaders in Jesus' name. Pope Francis invites us to keep moving ahead in faith, in joy, and in hope, as part of a pilgrim people. Even in challenging times, our eyes are focussed on the future.

There are five sub-themes, one for each day of Catholic Education Week and they are aimed at helping staff and students to reflect more fully on what being *Pilgrims of Hope* means to them. The five sub-themes are:



Day 1: By honouring human dignity / Honorent la dignité humaine
Day 2: By caring for creation / Prennent soin de la création
Day 3: By responding to the poverties in our world / Luttent contre les pauvretés
Day 4: By serving in solidarity / Servent en solidarité
Day 5: By living as peacemakers / Vivent en artisans de paix

Catholic Education Week is marked by special activities at all grade levels, including prayer celebrations and service activities. I invite you to visit our school during this special week and to participate in any of our activities as we celebrate Catholic Education Week 2025.

EQAO - GRADE 3 AND GRADE 6

The EQAO assessment is administered to all Grade 3 and Grade 6 students in Ontario's publicly funded school system by the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO), an independent agency of the Government of Ontario.

At St. John Bosco, our Grade 3 students will be completing the assessment from May 27—May 29 and our Grade 6 students will be completing the assessment from June 2-4. Parents with children in Grade 3 and Grade 6 are asked to please ensure that your child is in attendance during these times.

This assessment includes a language and mathematics component, along with a student questionnaire and an introductory session that includes a sample test for students. The purpose of the introductory session is to familiarize students with the e-assessment platform and the types of assessment questions. During the assessment, students will complete four language sessions that range from 15 to 35 minutes each, and four mathematics stages that each take about 30 minutes to complete. The administration of the stages and sessions will be spread out in the assessment window.

EQAO assessment questions are directly based on the expectations set out in the Ontario Curriculum, which is what teachers teach in the classroom every day. Therefore, your child does not need to prepare in any special way. Students will complete the assessment in their regular classrooms with their current teachers, and are simply encouraged to do their best and show what they know.

In the fall, EQAO will share individual reports with us for all our students. Once we receive these reports, we will provide you with your child's achievement on the assessment. Your child's results are private and will give you an indication of his or her achievement in relation to Ontario's provincial standard. The standard, or Level 3, represents the range from B– to B+. Meeting the standard means your child has a solid grasp of the required knowledge and skills, which is a good indication that he or she will be ready for Grade 4. The results of the assessment do not affect your child's grades or report card in any way. They do, however, give you information about your child's progress.

Vision Health Month

Visual health is an important part of a child's overall health and well-being. Proper vision is important for a child's movement and coordination, independence, play and learning. If left untreated, vision problems may become serious and prevent a child from reaching their full potential.



A yearly eye exam is FREE – the Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) covers the cost of an eye exam every 12 months for children up to the age of 19 with a valid OHIP card. Find an eye doctor near you.

Also, contact an eye doctor if you see ANY of these signs:

8	•	Squinting or holding objects close to the eyes	•	One eye that turns out or in
8	•	Blinking often	•	Rubbing, tearing, itchy or burning eyes
	•	Turning or tilting the head to the side often	•	Reporting blurry or double vision

NEW Quit Vaping Program for Youth

The Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) is excited to launch <u>Youth-Vaping</u>, <u>Substance use</u>, and <u>Technology (VAST</u>). Youth-VAST is a program for youth in Ontario who are using vaping, substances, or feel like technology is taking up too much of their time. This program brings together existing and new

resources across CAMH to deliver virtual services directly to youth and their family.

- Appointments are offered virtually for youth all over Ontario
- Youth will be assigned a care coordinator to create a customized treatment plan
- Individuals can self-refer directly into this program, no physician referral required.

Course Cancellation

At times, a summer school course may be cancelled due to insufficient enrolment. Any course that is cancelled will be posted on the summer school website by Friday, June 20, 2025. If your selected course is not cancelled, students are to report to their course on Wednesday, July 2, 2025, as scheduled.

Number of Courses:

One summer school course per student.

Attendance

Regular attendance is essential for student success. As such, students are expected to attend each day of summer school. These are participation courses. Missing classes may impact their average.

Transportation

Students and their families are responsible for their own transportation to their summer school site. Only students in rural areas will have transportation from a pickup location to the summer school site. Parents are expected to drop off and pick up students from the pickup location.

Student Dress Code

Students are expected to dress in clothing appropriate for the activity and a school setting.

Course Availability

The enrolment in these classes will be capped based on space at each location. Courses will be filled based on date of registration and payment of activity fee.
