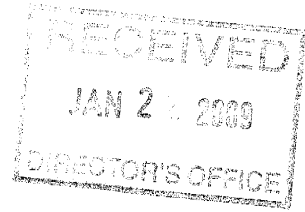

I am a life long resident of St. Catharines and a firm believer in the importance of Catholic Education.

I have resided within the boundaries of St. Nicholas School for my entire life. My formal education began in St. Nicholas and my five children attended St. Nicholas.

I even had the privilege of being principal of this wonderful school.

When I started my teaching career with the St. Catharines Catholic School Board at Christ the King School on Glenridge Ave., there were 6 more Catholic schools in full operation with the 8th one being built. (St. Mary's, St. Nicholas, St. Catherine, St. John, St. Denis, St. Joseph,) Basically these schools were between the QE highway and the train tracks on Glenridge. Ave.

Today Christ the King is an orthodox church, St. Mary's has been torn down to make way for a housing development. St. John's and St. Thomas house adult education, St. Catherine's is a parking lot, and St. Joseph's closed. St. Denis still exists but St. Nicholas is the only Catholic School in the downtown. This beacon of Catholic Education has been shining brightly for over 150 years.

We would not be here tonight if downtown St. Catharines had not been sliding into a coma for the past 30 years. Unfortunately the city councils of the past saw no need to invest in their downtown and as a result, people moved out. Naturally their children went with them and the businesses followed.

However, in 2008 it began to show signs of waking up. The prognosis is that downtown will fully waken and become a very vibrant destination over the next few years.

Projects are under way which will provide housing in the core of the city. Presently, older commercial buildings are being converted to residences as seen on King St. in the former handball facility. New construction of 40-45 townhouses is taking place on the parking lot of the former Hotel Dieu Hospital. When the new hospital is complete the former Hotel Dieu site will

be transformed into hundreds of residential units. People living in an area bring life, vitality and children with them. New businesses have already sprung up in anticipation of this renewal.

Over the past few years we have seen downtown transforming into an Arts Centre with several theatre groups as well as a number of visual arts establishments. Some of these venues not only display art but provide studio space for artists.

Brock University is moving its School of Fine and Performing Arts to downtown. There are over 500 students in that program and it is growing. In conjunction with the school, a Performing Arts center will be constructed adjacent to the school. It will host music, dance, film, photography, dramatic displays and performances. It will also double as a convention center.

It was reported in; the St. Catharines Standard on Dec. 20, 2008 that "Catholic School Board Staff recommended closing the downtown's only faith based school if it doesn't gain 100 more students by 2011

THAT STATEMENT SCARED ME! If I was a parent of school age children I would be looking now for another school. Kids and parents have enough stresses in their lives without the added threat of their school closing.

I would therefore request that the board state loudly and clearly that St. Nicholas School **will Not** close in 2011 but will be reviewed again in 5 years. This would provide immediate security for the current parents and students as well as giving the staff time to work on my next suggestions.

I would also ask the board to direct the staff to find ways to keep Catholic Education alive in downtown St. Catharines and I will now speak to this possibility.

As a result of working together, I learned that when Mr. Crocco was given a task to do, he did it with enthusiasm, with focus, with energy and, if it was meant to be, with success. If given the challenge, and, if it is meant to be, Mr. Crocco will find a way to keep St. Nicholas School open,

To that end, I also have a couple of suggestions.

A) The board has been running a pilot program in Intensive French. Perhaps a program in Intensive French could be started in St. Catharines and housed at St. Nicholas. Proximity to Immaculate Conception could be a bonus.

B) Make St. Nicholas a centre for Special Interest Programs in the Arts. Programs could be developed for students in grades 6,7 & 8 to have a more in depth exposure to the arts than they can receive in the regular school setting.

For example: Bring to St. Nicholas the students from the various schools for a half day a week for a semester. Creative, energetic and talented teachers will provide innovative programs that will enrich the current arts curriculum.

The McGuinty government says, and I quote, “Arts education is critical to our kid’s intellectual, physical and emotional growth. By studying dance, drama, media arts, music and visual arts, students learn to think more creatively and critically, and further develop the ability to work with others.”

C) Enter into a partnership or co-operative arrangement with Brock’s School of Fine and Performing Arts, the Niagara Artists Centre (NAC) and other theatre groups such as the Carousel Players which would be extremely enriching and rewarding experiences for our students

D) The downtown location of St. Nicholas with its proximity to the Cathedral, library, police station, city hall, market, etc. provides many alternate learning opportunities.

I am asking the board to seriously consider my proposal which will result in more of our students selecting art courses in our high schools. This in turn will result in more of our high school students selecting arts at Brock and all of this will provide employment opportunities that will allow our youth to stay in the area.

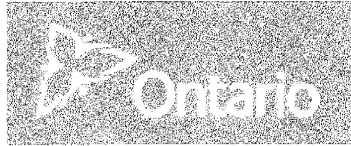
To briefly summarize, I have two requests.

McGuinty Government Boosts Arts Education

Ontario Students Will Benefit From Investments In New Resources Including Musical Instruments And Art Supplies

TORONTO, Jan. 18 /CNW/ - Students in Grades 1 through 12 will benefit from new arts education resources and professional development for teachers, thanks to nearly \$5 million in provincial funding, Education Minister Kathleen Wynne announced today.

"Arts education is critical to our kids' intellectual, physical and emotional growth," said Wynne. "By studying dance, drama, media arts, music and visual arts, students learn to think more creatively and critically, and further develop the ability to work with others."

Public school boards across Ontario will receive more than \$4 million to buy musical instruments, art supplies and other resources to support dance, drama, music and media arts in elementary and high schools. In addition, arts education associations and community organizations will share almost \$800,000 to develop resources and host artists, performances and workshops in schools.

The outcomes of arts education - creativity, imagination, innovation and originality - are among the most important resources for economic prosperity in the 21st century. Ontario's entertainment and creative industries contribute nearly \$9.9 billion to the provincial economy and generate approximately 185,000 jobs. Over the next two decades, job growth in this sector is expected to surpass most of Ontario's other thriving employment sectors.

The investment is part of the McGuinty government's commitment to improving Ontario's public education system. Students are already benefitting from government initiatives intended to help more students succeed, including:

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- Providing a more well-rounded education, with funding to hire 1,600 elementary specialist teachers in areas such as music, the arts, as well as phys-ed
- Providing every school in the province with more textbooks, learning resources and library books with funding of \$535 million
- Funding to hire 3,600 teachers to reduce the number of students in JK to Grade 3 classes to a maximum of 20 students in 90 per cent of classes
- Transforming the Ontario high school experience with six innovative programs to keep kids learning until age 18, including Grade 8-9 transition teams, expanded co-op education and specialist high skills majors that allow students to focus on the career path that matches their unique skills and interests
- Introducing character building initiatives in schools to inspire students to become caring and contributing citizens.

means providing them with a well-rounded education," said Wynne. "Ontario has a terrific arts education curriculum and we want to support schools in delivering that program."

Backgrounder

TEACHING THE ARTS IN ONTARIO

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The McGuinty government has invested nearly \$30 million in arts education across the province, including almost \$5 million announced today for new resources.

Arts education contributes to student success across the curriculum, supports higher academic achievement, and improves student motivation and attendance. It enhances student engagement, fosters tolerance and respect for diversity, and builds self-confidence. Arts education has been shown to be a particular benefit to at-risk youth and hard to reach learners.

At the secondary school level, students must earn one arts credit and may add a second one toward their compulsory credit requirements.

In addition, through the Specialist High Skills Major announced in December, students will now be able to complete a minimum bundle of courses in specific high skills areas, such as the arts.

The government has provided funding for school boards to hire an additional 1,300 teachers to support high school students, as well as funding to hire 1,600 elementary specialist teachers in areas such as music, the arts, as well as phys-ed.

Students at the elementary level receive a strong foundation in music, visual arts, drama and dance to ensure they acquire essential knowledge and skills. Teachers are also encouraged to integrate arts education with other subjects in the curriculum such as math, reading and social sciences.

The outcomes of arts education - creativity, imagination, innovation, and originality - are among the most important resources for economic prosperity in the 21st century.

\$5 Million Investment In Arts Curriculum Resources And Training

To support the Grade 1-12 arts curriculum, public school boards across Ontario will receive more than \$4 million to buy musical instruments and other supplies and resources, and provide professional development opportunities for teachers.

As well, 11 arts education organizations will share \$775,000 to develop resources and host artists, performances and workshops in schools. They are:

My name is Cathy Sonier and I am proud to be a parent at St. Nicholas School.

Clearly there is no regard at all for our children and their feelings. How can you feel right about closing down the school they know and love, separate them from the friends and teachers they know and love, and just plop them wherever.

For those of you who think that closing St. Nicholas school down is the right decision, I'd be willing to bet that you have never had a conversation with any of our children in the school to find out what they would like to see happen with their lives.

Presentation to save St. Nicholas School

Good evening Mr. Crocco, Secretary/Treasurer, Mrs. Kathy Burtnik, Chair, Mr. Frank Fera, Vice-Chair, Trustees of the Niagara Catholic, Parents, Prinipals and Guests, Hello my name is Leslie Landolt and I am a member of the St. Nicholas Parent Council. Presently, I have two children in attendance at St. Nicks, in grade three and five respectively. I had the duty as past chair of our council to participate as a member on the Accommodation Review Committee. The process required dedication, care and concern from all members, not just for individual schools but for the benefit of Catholic education in Niagara. Often the process was full of emotion, yet due to the structure outlined by the Ministry of Education we were forced to clearly look at the health of our system as a whole. On a personal note, I came into the review thinking about cost, numbers and logical steps that needed to be taken in order for a bottom line to be maintained. By the end of the entire process I began to view the outcome in a totally different way.

I began to ponder what being a Catholic was.

I pondered what living in a community was all about.

I pondered the entire concept of Christian Ministry, fellowship within a community of Catholic families and how that influences the parents and children who are unfamiliar with Catholicism.

In the transient life that makes up any downtown, the tiny heartbeat of all that Catholic education strives for is evident in St. Nicholas School. Yes, it is a tiny speck of a school in the center of a downtown struggling to revitalize itself. Let us all remember that it is the only school that serves the residence of downtown. We all know that our School Board's mandate does not include downtown revitalization, yet I hope that it does include values of Christian ministry to the most vulnerable among us. By and large St. Nicholas is made up of inner city kids whose stability depends upon the safe haven of a historical community that for 150 plus years has always served them.

As past Chair of our council, I had the extreme pleasure of attending our Catholic Conferences put on by our board. They are both wonderful and

inspiring. They clearly affirm the devotion of this board to promote the concept of Triad: School, Church and Home.

The Triad is both visible and spiritual. I am reminded of it every time my children walk home from school and attend Mass at the Cathedral on Sundays. As a parent, the concept of "Triad" was brought to life because of the core values explained to me through the Niagara Catholic District School Board. In the case of St. Nicholas, where stability within a community is needed, why is the Board ready to dismantle the connection between the Cathedral, School and Home? Yes, you can, as you have, make the recommendation to send our St. Nicholas children to many different schools and be content with a Cathedral that no longer has the life blood of children. But how does this truly fit with the Board's proclaimed concept of "TRIAD"? I will leave this question for everyone here to ponder: Is it our responsibility to care for the communities that we serve no matter how transient or vulnerable? Is it our business to treat our school communities that are vulnerable and weak as centers of Catholic Ministry? Personally, I feel that this is what our faith calls us to do.

Please consider this fundamental and spirit filled reason to keep a 152 year old school community open.

Parents, Principals, and Guests:

My name is Yvonne Wowk and I am a parent at St. Nicholas Catholic School. Tonight I would like to make a few comments and suggestions and to ask some important questions concerning the possible closure of St. Nicholas Catholic Elementary.

First, our student enrolment has gone from 130 students up to 145 students since the Accommodation Review Committee survey was done in 2007. According to the Senior Staff Recommendations from Dec. 2, 2008, St. Nicholas School could stay open if a minimum of 230 students are registered by Sept. 2011. I received information from our School Superintendent stating that there are 87 students who are within our school boundary, who could be going to St. Nicholas, but are allowed to go to other schools for various reasons. 87 students!!! That is a very high number of out of boundary students for a school that is struggling to remain open. Almost half of our student population!! Why are so many students allowed to leave? If you do the math, 145 students plus 87 students equals 232. My question is: why the number 230, when there are other schools allowed to remain open with lower enrolment? I feel that our school is being targeted. A comment made during an Accommodation Review Working Committee Meeting re-affirms my thoughts on this. It was suggested to take a brick from St. Nicholas and to place it in the library of St. Denis Catholic Elementary School as a remembrance of the school. This gives me the impression that the decision about our school has already been made before the community input has been presented.

According to Senior Staff Recommendations once again, it is stated that if the school is closed, the St. Nicholas students would be relocated to either Mother Theresa, which has by the way, minus 26 student spaces available, or to St. Anthony's, which has minus 9 student spaces available, or to St. Christopher's, which has minus 24 student spaces available or to St. Denis which has only 64 available student spaces but with a proposed renewal need cost of \$863,608.00. Right now there is a proposal from the school board to build a minimum of 4 additional classrooms to St. Anthony's with

the project cost to be announced. Why spend the money on these additions and upgrades when we already have a school right here to accommodate not just some, but all of our students? How much money will the school board actually save by closing the school? If each student generates approximately, \$8,000.00 the real question is: what is the potential loss of revenue if all of the current students at St. Nicholas opted to attend Memorial Public School or Alexander Public School, two public schools within walking distance of St. Nicholas?

This question was to put to me personally: "If you can get your numbers up to 230 students, not including the out of boundary students, then we can see about getting funding for a new downtown elementary school." Why is it up to the parents to increase enrolment? We already have our jobs, family responsibilities, kids in sports, volunteering on school councils and the many other school activities we provide for our students. This is your job, your responsibility. What has Senior Staff done to meet their recommendation that there WILL be 230 students registered at St. Nicholas by 2011 and that we WILL receive funding for a new school? The school board has the resources, the tools and options to make St. Nicholas more attractive and viable. Why doesn't the board:

1. restrict the out of boundary attendance
2. change the attendance area boundaries by redistributing student enrolment across the city to eliminate the need for additions.
3. establish a day care centre at St. Nicholas to accommodate the families who need child care after school. This would eliminate the need to go to an alternate school because day care is offered there.
4. regain and return ownership of St. Nicholas school property back to the English Catholic School Board, ie. Niagara Catholic, or to obtain permission from the French Catholic School Board to do renovations or additions as needed to improve St. Nicholas if/when funding becomes available.

For those present this evening, St. Nicholas and Immaculate Conception School's buildings and sites were both lost to the Catholic French Board in the 1998 amalgamation of the District School Boards.

All of these options will benefit our school and would avoid the travesty of closing the oldest catholic school in the Niagara Region and the only english speaking catholic elementary school that serves the downtown community of St. Catharines.



My name is Mrs. Lee Page and as a long time supporter of St. Nicholas Catholic Elementary School I would like to address the Board on behalf of the 551 concerned citizens who signed a petition when the possibility of closing St. Nicholas arose.

As a direct result of the Provincial Government's Places to Grow Act of 2005, St. Catharines has seen an increase in residential construction in the downtown area. These developments include the building of 40 units at Welland Ave. and Ontario Sts., 197 units at 583 Welland Ave. and 228 units that will house as many as 500 people on Herrick Ave.

These developments and the influx of families in the area along with the building of a performing arts centre will have a dramatic effect on the downtown core. We believe strongly that a Catholic Elementary School is essential to this overall growth and respectfully ask that a decision to close St. Nicholas Catholic Elementary School be deferred until 2012 when further population statistics will be available and the very real possibility that 230 students could continue the tradition that is St. Nicholas.

History of St. Nicholas

St. Nicholas has a 150 year old history. Our first Catholic School was opened in 1857 in downtown St. Catharines. The reason the school opened was to meet the needs of new immigrants to the area. That need is still present in the downtown. We were there for the early newcomers to our city and we must be here for the newcomers today. Our immigrant families still need accessible Catholic education. Downtowns tend to be gathering points for newcomers; they arrive here and live here. Without St. Nicholas, new families in the area may resort to sending their children to one of the two public schools located near by, rather than sending their children by bus to a Catholic school further away. St. Nicholas has a positive impact on the surrounding community.

My personal history at St. Nicholas is one that is very close to my heart.

My husband Leo Bonomi attended St. Nicholas as did all of our 4 children. Our children received an excellent education at St. Nicholas that prepared them for High School at Denis Morris as well as post-secondary education. Our eldest is a graduate of University of Western Ontario, our 2nd daughter is in 3rd year at Western and our two youngest are still attending Denis Morris. We truly believe that the education our children received at St. Nicholas exceeded the academic requirement. It prepared them for the real world. The unique blend of staff and students form a cross-section of backgrounds at St. Nicholas school. The diversity that makes up St. Nicholas school is not available elsewhere. Students become exposed to different cultures, ethnic backgrounds, and socio-economic conditions. This has proved to be invaluable to my children in making sound judgements that affected their lives in a very real way.

If you close St. Nicholas School you will never be able to build downtown again, as there is no available land. Although urban sprawl has affected all city centres, it is still extremely important to have a Catholic elementary school in our downtown for our downtown residents. It is important for these young people to have a school in *their* neighbourhood. This school is one that they can call their own, and that is a privilege that all students deserve.

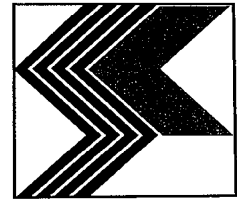

Presentation Re: Consideration of Closure of St. Nicholas School
St. Catharines

The St. Catharines Downtown Development and Revitalization Committee (DDRC) was established by St. Catharines City Council to advise on matters related to the revitalization of the downtown area. On November 27th, 2008, the DDRC received a presentation by a concerned resident about the possible closure of St. Nicholas School.

As you know, Downtown St. Catharines has been designated by the Provincial Government as the only Urban Growth Centre in the Niagara Region through the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe. This designation requires a minimum density of 150 residents/jobs per acre for all new development in this area. City Council has adopted the proposed Growth Centre boundaries to include the area south of Welland Avenue to the Highway 406, to Ontario Street on the west, and out to the intersection of Queenston Street and Church Street to the east (see map attached). The site where the current school is located is within this area. Within this area over the next 20 years, it is anticipated that over 2,000 new residential units will be constructed. The future of the downtown is based on a combination of concentrated commercial core with residential development to the east in and around the existing school site.

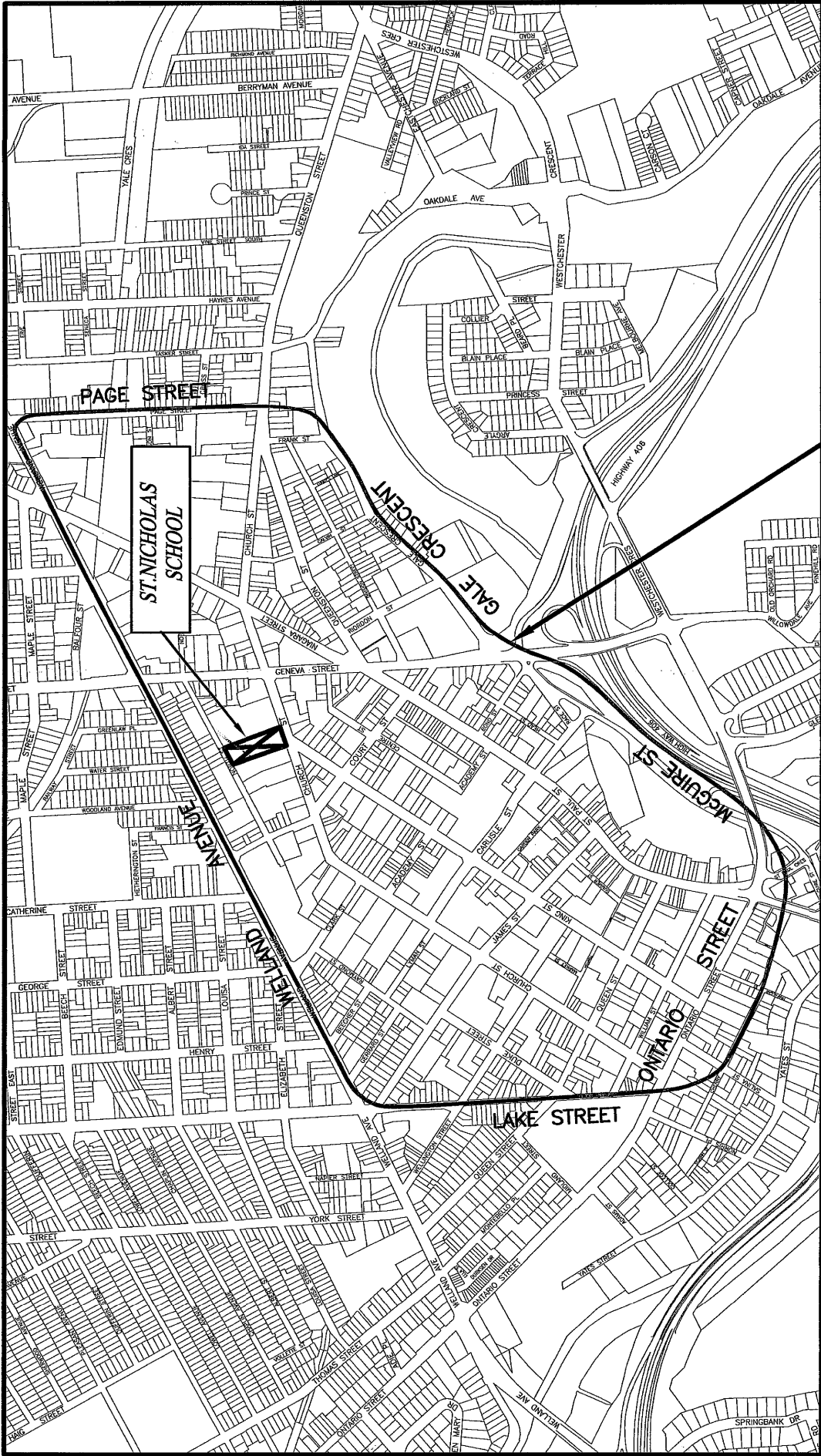
A school is an important component of any residential area. It is an important facility that particularly younger families look for in making housing choice. As such, the continuation of the presence of an elementary school is considered very important in helping the City to achieve the longer term provincial targets.

The DDRC recognizes that school boards are faced with difficult decisions concerning school capacity based on changing demographics. DDRC requests that Board give serious consideration to all options that would allow the continuation of a school presence within the Urban Growth Centre designation including partnering with different community groups and other public agencies to keep the school open before making a decision to close this school.

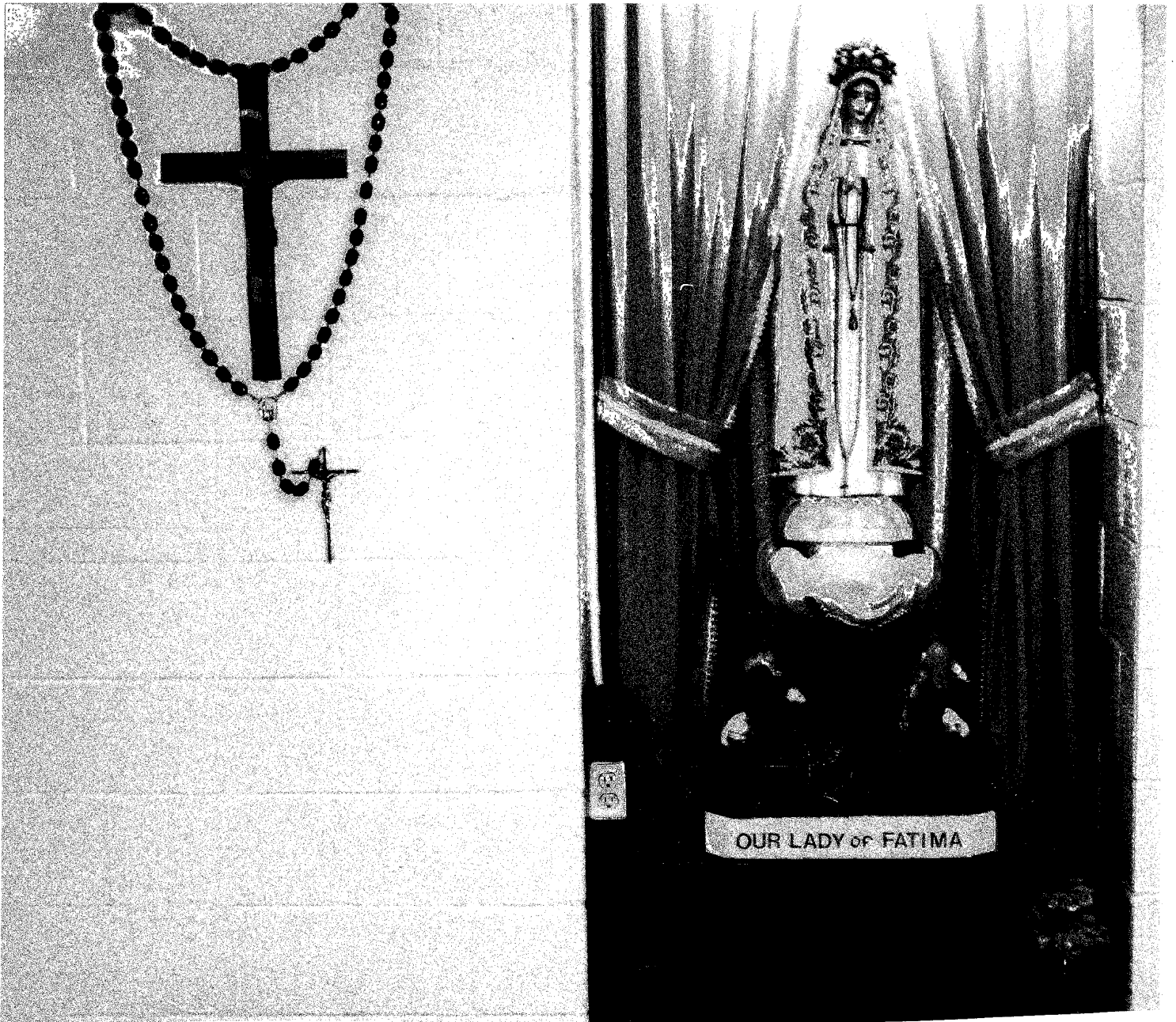

- Niagara Falls Elementary - 7:00 p.m. February 17th, 2009, at Saint Michael Catholic High School
- St. Catharines Elementary - 7:00 p.m. February 18th, 2009, at Denis Morris Catholic High School
- St. Catharines Secondary - 7:00 p.m. February 23rd, 2009, at Denis Morris Catholic High School

The public may provide a written report to the Director of Education at any time.

The following Guidelines describe the public meeting process.

Delegation Application Process

The public meeting will follow the By-law of the Board for public delegations in modified form, as set out below. The modifications are intended to facilitate public participation.

- (a) Written application requesting the opportunity to appear as a delegation must be submitted to the Director of Education no later than 4:00 p.m. on February 10th, 2009.
- (b) The following information should be included with this application:
 - (i) The name of the organization/individual(s) or party(ies) who will be making the presentation;
 - (ii) Their authority/title/position with the organization (if applicable);
 - (iii) A complete mailing address;
 - (iv) A day time telephone number;
 - (v) A number where they can be reached after business hours;
 - (vi) A fax number (if available);
 - (vii) An e-mail address (if available);
 - (viii) The complete presentation in written format

- (c) Delegations are encouraged to send the Presentation in as soon as possible so that it can be provided to and reviewed by Trustees prior to the meeting. Presentations that are received on a timely basis will be considered and addressed in the Director's follow-up report to the Board required by the Pupil Accommodation Review Policy in which the Director will report on and respond to the presentations made by the public. A presentation that is submitted late may not be addressed in the Director's follow-up report although it will be made available to the Trustees.

Delegation Presentation

Minutes of the Special Board Meetings including references to the presentations will be posted on the Board's website.

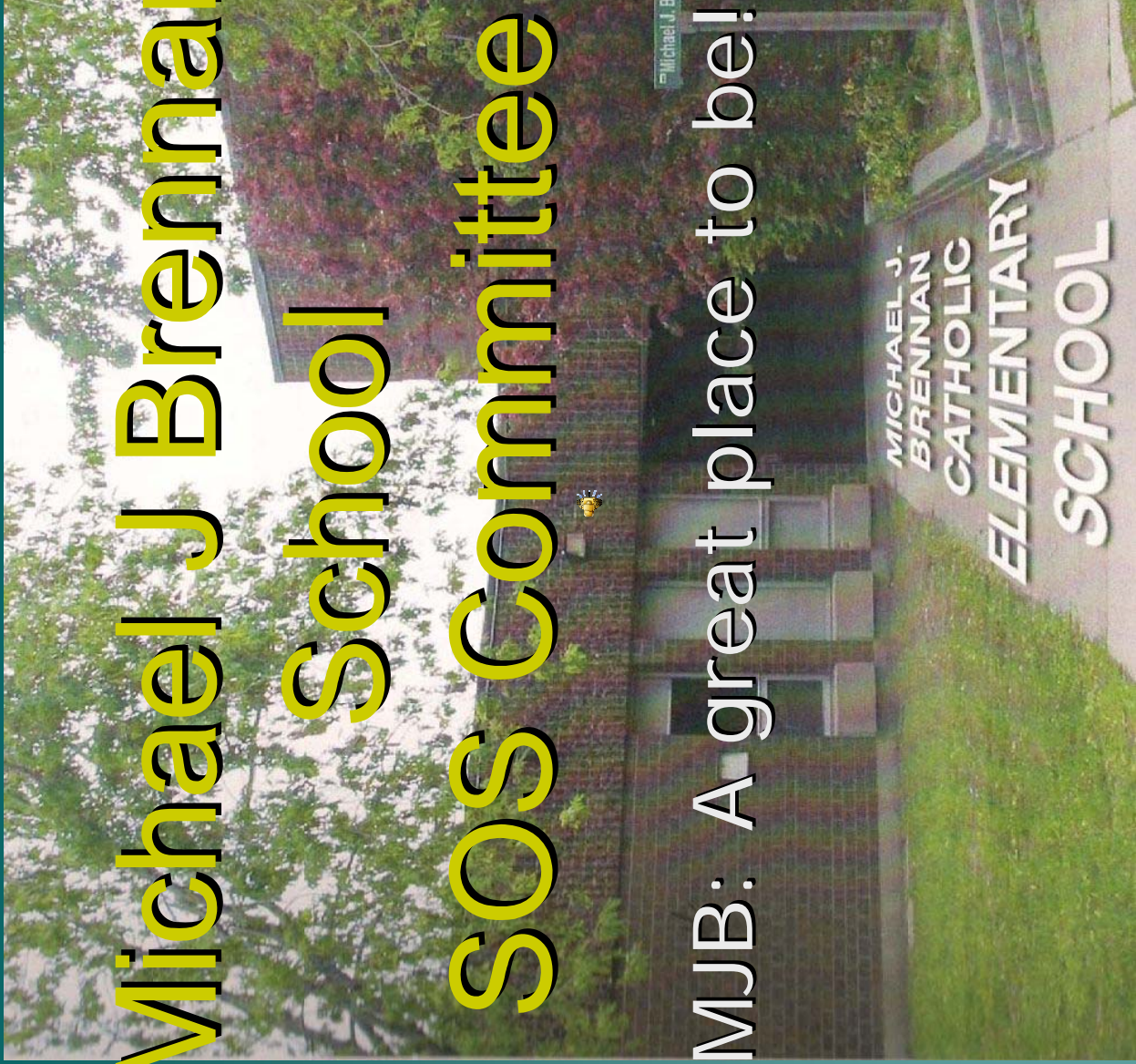
- (a) The identified spokespersons will address the Trustees from the podium.
- (b) The spokespersons are expected to provide comments that are relevant to the subject matter of the meeting. If a previous delegation has already addressed the matter and the delegate is being repetitive, the Chairperson of the Board may request the delegate to express support for an earlier presentation and may reduce the following speaking times available to the delegate accordingly.
- (c) The time for each public delegation to speak, excluding the question and answer period, is not to exceed fifteen (15) minutes, with normally a five (5) minute question period following.
- (d) Delegates who have a similar perspective are encouraged to co-operate in appointing spokespersons in addressing the Board.
- (e) Delegations from the same school community on the same point of view shall be limited to a combined total of fifteen (15) minutes.
- (f) Delegations who are unrelated to a particular school community but who are speaking on a common issue shall be limited to a combined total of fifteen (15) minutes.
- (g) Trustees may ask questions of the delegation for clarification only, for a period of time which shall be at the discretion of the Chairperson.
- (h) The Chairperson will apply the normal Board practices in respect of decorum and order at the meeting.
- (i) The Board will not permit delegations respecting the Pupil Accommodation Review Policy at other Board meetings.
- (j) In accordance with Board By-law 7.5 the Board shall not remain in session later than 11:00 p.m. unless so determined by a 2/3 majority of the members present.

Arc Committee Recommendation Regarding MJB

That, the consolidation of Michael J. Brennan with St. James Catholic Elementary School takes place not prior to September 2010, and not prior to an addition/renovation if required, and that facility renewal needs for St. James be completed to accommodate enrolment.

Senior Staff Recommendations Regarding MJB

THAT, Senior Staff will continue to monitor the possibility of closing Michael J. Brennan Catholic Elementary School and that Senior Staff will bring a report to the Board no later than September 2012.

THAT, a St. Catharines Elementary Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review Committee of the Board be established to review the attendance boundaries as recommended by Senior Staff for all elementary schools in St. Catharines to maximize facility utilization of elementary schools in St Catharines.

MJB SOS Committee Position Regarding the ARC Recommendation

- We are not convinced that financial case for closure of MJB is strong at this time.
- The investment required for accommodating MJB students at St. James in 2010 is too large relative to the reduction in surplus student spaces.
- Geography: The North West section of the city (west of Lake Street and North of the QEW) will be under serviced if MJB is closed.
- Day care considerations were not adequately addressed with the recommendation to accommodate MJB Students at St. James.
- The ARC recommendation was made without knowledge of the DSBN's plans for Pine Grove (the attached DSBN school).

Financial Case for Closure

- save 1.5 million in future renewal costs
- spend 1.5 million for expansion of St. James to accommodate MJB Students in 2010
- save 295,920 in operating costs
- spend an additional 90,000 per year in busing
- Surplus spaces are still projected to be at 570 students in 2022-2023 (proposal eliminates only 124 surplus spaces)

Problems with Financial Case for Closure

- Too much money spent for too little reduction in surplus spaces.
- This proposal is definitely **not** the “low hanging fruit” solution for reducing surplus student spaces.
- The savings figures assume there will be no additional operating costs at St. James. This seems a bit optimistic to us.

Effects on Day Care Availability

- A significant percentage of MJB parents polled cited day care availability concerns as a major factor in their choice of school.
- St. James currently uses both Kindergarten classes in the morning and the YMCA day care uses those rooms in the afternoon.
- The addition of more JK/SK students from MJB will require St. James to use their rooms in the afternoon and possibly force the YMCA day care out of St. James, eliminating the availability of school based day care for MJB and St. James parents.

How Does MJB Closing Affect Pine Grove?

- The ARC committee only considered MJB which is under NCDSB control (understandable).
- The facility (ie land, building etc) really accommodates over 300 children when both MJB and Pine Grove are considered.
- The closure of MJB would clearly affect the viability of Pine Grove. Wouldn't it make sense for the NCDSB to understand what the DSN plans for are for Pine Grove before deciding to close MJB.

Summary of MJB SOS Committee Position

- The ARC committee proposal regarding MJB would be expensive and difficult to implement at the time recommended.
- The NCDSB senior staff recommendation to monitor the situation and report in 2012 seems more reasonable and enables the board to better address the issue of surplus spaces without hurrying into a school closure that requires significant investment but does not eliminate many surplus student spaces.
