Chairperson Burtnik asked Director Crocco to clarify the following issues and questions raised within Ms. Hesse's presentation which resulted in the following responses:

Warren Woods is still on the table for the new subdivision. Has property been purchased by the School Board or serviced by a developer?

 The School Board has not purchased property in the Warren Woods Subdivision, and it currently is being serviced by a developer.

St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School in Niagara Falls received money in the form of grants from the Ontario Government. What happens to that money if St. Joseph closes?

 The approximately \$250,000 in Ministry of Education grants received by St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School in Niagara Falls purchased resources for students, books, professional development for staff etc. If St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School closes the resources would be shared amongst other schools.

When does the Niagara Falls Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review meet? The whole city should have been included. Has there not been a city wide review before?

 The Niagara Falls Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review Committee held it's last major review in the 2003-2004 school year and reviewed boundaries for 11 elementary schools. An Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review Committee could be formed as a result of the Pupil Accommodation Review recommendations to begin in September 2009.

Part of St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School's recommend boundary is now within the Saint Paul Catholic Secondary School boundary. For children living in Coronation Park Area, will they be forced to leave Saint Michael Catholic High School?

 The potential change in boundaries may result in a shift within population of the schools and a decision will be made based on complete information at the time. The City of Niagara Falls has requested that Region expand the urban boundary for the north west area, making St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Elementary School within that boundary of an already crowded school. Is the trend toward Big Box Schools? We live in an area where this isn't necessary, due to population numbers.

 We have been informed that the Region denied the City's request. The Niagara Catholic District School Board has most recently approved two new smaller elementary schools in Grimsby. St. Joseph and Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Elementary Schools of approximately 230 and 350 students rather than one school of 500 plus students.



St. Thomas More School



We aim to create and maintain an environment that is inviting, collaborative and secure. Our school is Christ-centred and is peopled by teachers and support staff who are dedicated to empowering all children to achieve success.

- School Mission Statement

Introduction

In the past, the St. Thomas More community has been bombarded with comments such as:

"It is a sign of the past," or "There is only one other school like yours," and the all time favorite, "It's so close to Our Lady of Mount Carmel."

"Other schools have K-8, it's worked for them, so why is your school so special?"

Sit back, listen and we will show you just how special our unique little school is.

Purpose of Presentation

The purpose of our delegation tonight is to give you a glimpse into the life of a primary school, a school we love to fight for, St. Thomas More.

It is About the Kids and Not About the Money

Our hope is that children are not being used as a commodity and that the decisions that are made are not primarily based on dollar signs.

The future of our school is partially dependent upon the building of a new school in Warren Woods. Our parents feel that students do not necessarily need new fancy buildings with marble floors and a fountain in the lobby. These superficial features can never replace the reputation that our school has earned over the years for being one of the best schools in the Board. Any updated equipment and technology that a new school could offer can be installed in an older school just like it can be in a new school. Many of us over the years, when being asked what school our children attended, have been met with comments from other parents, such as "you are lucky, I have heard that is such a great school".

The fact that the District School Board has recently built a new school near the Warren Woods subdivision should not be the deciding factor, in making this decision. The reality is that there are already two top notch schools in St. Thomas More and Our Lady of Mount Carmel that can accommodate the future Warren Woods children, in an atmosphere that is unique to other schools.

Little Kids Need More

As we all know, the needs of younger children are so much different than older children, and the younger they are, the more impressionable they will be.

When children start JK, it is a frightening time for many students, as well as their parents. In a K to 8 School, there are a higher percentage of older kids than in a primary school, and as a result, many more adults in terms of teachers and staff.

Many young children can feel intimidated by this, rather than in a primary school where the oldest child in attendance is at the most, only 5 years older than the youngest child. This reduces the worry that these young children may feel inhibited, forgotten, and become withdrawn as can happen in a regular elementary school. This is not as likely to happen in the primary setting, because as the younger children will say there are no "big kids here". There is less chance that these little children will feel like they are being swallowed up in a larger school, because of the presence of older students and many more adults on staff.

The primary "whole school expertise," helps students develop intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually. There is a very tight commonality in instruction, skill based and extra curricular activities. A primary school grants more opportunity for specialized primary instruction because all staff will be administering the same division of teaching and assessment strategies. Greater staff commonality results in improved student achievement and improves the teachers' ability to deal with classroom management, organization, use of space, instructional focus, and delivery.

Keeping in mind that all schools have good teachers, we feel that the qualities of the primary teachers are better in a primary school setting than in a regular elementary school. When teachers move around a school to a different grade (because of leaves and other reasons), in a K to 8 School you could have a grade 8 teacher who is now teaching Kindergarten or Grade 1 if the need arises. In a primary school, no matter where the teachers move within the school, they have the advantage of being trained to teach primary grades and to deal with primary children exclusively. We feel that the effect of this experience is immeasurable, and provides for more quality teachers in the primary grades.

The Broken Triad

St. Thomas More School and Our Lady of Mount Carmel are fortunate to have a church in their own backyard which we feel is a blessing to our students. This close proximity is paramount to reinforcing the triad between home, school, and church. What can strengthen the children's faith more, than being able to look across their school yard to see their school parish? This would not be available to the Warren Woods students if they were not afforded the opportunity to attend our school.

St. Thomas More School is built on over 50 years of faith from the early teachers and principals of the school, as well as the families that have gone through over the years, which cannot be replaced by a new school. The faith development that has happened in this primary setting over the years is second to none. There are no older kids around who can unfortunately act like "it is not cool" to participate in the religious activities. Grade 3 students do not feel embarrassed to participate which is a strong influence on the faith development of the younger children.

As a result, when the primary students of St. Thomas More attend weekly mass they are very well behaved and respectful of where they are. This chain of faith carries over when they graduate and go to Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

If a new school is built for Warren Woods, those students would have to be bussed to St. Thomas More Church which would result not only in a cost, but the children may not attend mass as often, as it is not within walking distance. As St. Thomas More is in close proximity to the church, even in inclement weather, the children are able to attend weekly mass; if students had to be bussed, safety becomes a concern.

The Benefits of a Sheltered Environment

The experts say that from birth to 5 years old is when a child's personality is formed, thus making this their formative years. A primary setting benefits the children as it allows them to stay children a little longer, without the influence of older children as long as possible. Being away from older children allows them to build personality and self esteem, and lets them find out who they are, without the pressures and influences that can be felt when older children are present.

Playground Atmosphere

The stresses that older children can present in a playground environment, such as bullying, fighting, and misbehaving, do not become a part of the younger children's day in a primary environment.

Primary children are a lot easier to redirect when older children are not involved. Younger children are more apt to ask a teacher for help if not feeling pressured by older children.

Younger children may feel that they will be bullied by older children if they report a problem to the teacher. Grade 3 children will still report bullying problems if they are in a primary setting, and this sets a good example for the younger children so they will feel comfortable in doing so also.

It seems to make sense that where there is less of a variance in ages, there are fewer problems and confrontations on the playground.

Uniqueness of our School Setting

If you have been in our school, you will see the handprints on the walls and on the ceiling tiles of every single student who has graduated from the school. These symbolic memories leave an impression on our students and years later when these children return to the school for various reasons, the first thing they do is to find their handprint. This has been part of our tradition at St. Thomas More, and is a reflection of how important each and every student's time was at the school. We will fight with all the strength in our hands to continue this legacy.

When walking through the school, you will also see the primary type hallways which tweak the children's imagination. All the walls in the school are geared to a primary environment, and create an atmosphere which is conducive for young minds to learn and grow. Even the gym walls are brightly painted and are inspiring to the children.

In addition, our primary school offers more enriched opportunities and individualized learning centers.

Insofar as St. Thomas More is a primary school, all of the furniture and accessories in the school are geared to primary. Blackboards, cupboards, chairs, desks are all the right size and height for our students. In a regular elementary school, because the classrooms are interchangeable in that a grade 1 class might become a grade 6 class, this is not always possible. In a primary school, the classrooms and their contents will always be age and size appropriate.

Growing up in Steps and Stages

As kids progress to grade 3, they see what its like to be a senior in a school and when they experience the transition to enter Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Grade 4, they experience what it's like to enter a new school again and be the youngest in the school. Students learn what it's like to climb up the ladder on their way up to high school and beyond. Parents also experience what it's like to support their children when transitioning to a new school.

Children that are in a K to 8 School never get to experience this again until they go to high school, which to many can be frightening, but less likely for those that have attended a senior elementary school and experienced what this is like.

A primary school gives the children ways to develop skills of leadership. In a normal elementary school the senior grades take on the leadership roles and do most of the work as far as planning masses, faith services, and special school activities. In a K to 8 School, the primary children aren't given as much of an opportunity to plan and participate in these events.

A primary school creates more opportunity for better spiritual enrichment and self esteem. When the children are reading at mass and participating as gift bearers, this promotes a sense of independence and self confidence, especially with public speaking. It has been proven that the opportunities of participating in these events would promote further faith development.

The added responsibilities that children receive in a primary setting as there are no older kids to take on most of these jobs, results in there becoming more self sufficient and independent.

Community Building

The families of a primary school have a closer community as the children at the school are of similar ages, and have similar needs and expectations. Parents have

more in common because of this and work well together for the good of the school and the students.

Increased Parental Involvement

Parents of primary school students want to volunteer more, both because the children are little, and also because the children want their parents there. As children get older, parents go back to work and are not as readily available to volunteer. In a K to 8 School, parents are not needed as much because grade 7 and 8's do much of the activities normally done by parents (such as Pizza, Milk, reading to younger children, etc.). This makes the parents feel less connected and less welcome in the school.

Cost Savings to the Ministry

By keeping the boundaries the same, future students from Warren Woods would attend St. Thomas More and Our Lady of Mount Carmel and therefore there would be no cost to the Ministry to build a new school, at a cost savings of approximately 6 million dollars, along with a savings of approximately 2 million dollars to renovate Our Lady of Mount Carmel to accommodate St. Thomas More students. This would save approximately 8 million dollars that could be spent elsewhere. This would also result in eliminating or greatly reducing the surplus space at St. Thomas More School and Our Lady of Mount Carmel by accommodating the Warren Woods students.

Bus Rides from Warren Woods

Despite having to bus children from Warren Woods to St. Thomas More School and Our Lady of Mount Carmel, such a ride would only be minimal.

Children would be traveling on major roads along this bus route, and the buses would not be crossing any railway tracks. This keeps the ride short and safe, as McLeod Rd and Dorchester Road are major roads, and are highly maintained in the winter season.

Classroom Libraries and School Library

Our students are fortunate that the reading materials in the classrooms and in the library are geared only to primary grades, therefore the money received by the school to purchase the reading materials is divided only between 5 grades instead of 10 grades; this results in the students having a larger selection of materials to choose and learn from, which can only add to increasing their literacy skills.

Physical Education Time

Insofar as St. Thomas More students range from JK to Grade 3, they do not have to share the gym with the intermediate and senior grades. This means that they have a

longer gym time and have gym more often. Even with the inclusion of Warren Woods's students, the students would all be of primary age, and they would still have the increased amount of physical activity, because they could participate together and would be doing similar activities.

Reading Recovery Training Area

The Reading Recovery Training Area has already been established at St. Thomas More School and is used by teachers and families throughout the Board. This would have to be moved to another location as a result of the possible school closure.

Use of the Property if the School is Closed

As the school is located next to St. Thomas More Church and adjacent to Our Lady of Mount Carmel, the property is not as viable as others, insofar as the Board will have to ensure that any future use, must be appropriate for the area.

This property is also located in an older neighborhood and the residents are used to having the school there. There is a great concern among the neighbors that the new use may not fit in with the neighborhood.

A consideration would also have to be that if the building is torn down or undergoes extensive construction that the students walking to Our Lady of Mount Carmel past the St. Thomas More property while construction is underway, the safety of the children would not be at risk.



Introduction

"I CAN", which stands for Improvement that is Continuous and Never Ending. This is the motto of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic School. Our school not only has wonderful students and teachers, but its programs and the special features cannot be taken for granted or taken away.

Purpose

The purpose of our delegation is to speak on behalf of our students to ensure that if St. Thomas More School is closed and the students are moved to Our Lady of Mount Carmel that our school and our students will not suffer with this change.

Just My Size

Keeping in mind that our school does not have facilities to accommodate 4 and 5 year old children, extensive renovations would have to be made to accommodate these children. Obvious things such as washrooms, sinks and water fountains which are size appropriate would have to be installed. In addition, all the furniture, cupboards, blackboards, library and computer centers would have to accommodate the younger children.

J.K. and S.K. Wing

As the needs of J.K. and S.K. children have to be met, a wing of classrooms would have to be constructed, ensuring that these students would be separate from the rest of the school. Currently, there are 3 classrooms for J.K. and S.K. grades at St. Thomas More.

A separate entrance would be required to ensure that the children would have easier access in and out of the school. In this way, these children would not be entering and exiting with the older students. This would also assist with fire drills and emergency procedures.

A fenced in playground would be required, not only for safety purposes but also to assist with teacher supervision. Age appropriate play structures and play areas would be contained within this playground.

Transporting Primary Children

It is obvious that construction would be required in the drop off area to accommodate the extra 200 plus students; all of which will range from age 4 to 8 years of age. At present, the current arrangements would not be suitable to ensure child safety insofar as when the buses drop off, there is not enough room for 500 students to walk through a crowded parking lot to the back of the school. Staff and visitor parking areas would have to be moved from the bus area to allow for a proper walkway for the children to walk to the back of the school.

Also for parents dropping off their children off on Carlton Street, this could turn into a nightmare insofar as this street is crowded enough now with parents dropping their children off. There is very little room on the street and there are cars everywhere, which is unsafe for small children crossing the road. There would have to be a separate entranceway from a different road to accommodate this. Alternatively, the back portion of the St. Thomas More School's playground could be turned into an extra parking lot, as the current parking area of St. Thomas More Church cannot accommodate all these extra cars.

Our Beautiful French Rooms

Currently our school has 2 French classrooms and 2 French teachers. That means all children receive their French instruction in a classroom conducive to learning. When they look around the room, everything on the walls is written in French which reinforces what they are learning every day.

Our children need to continue to have this, as well as the students coming from St. Thomas More, who also currently have a separate French classroom.

"French on Wheels" is not the way for children to learn and definitely not what they have been used to at these two schools.

Music Music Everywhere

For those who have been lucky to be in our school, they have seen our awesome Music Room. The room has amphitheater seating for the students to sit and play their instruments. Again, the walls of the classroom are geared to a music classroom. The room contains a large closet area to store all of the musical instruments; it also has sound proof features which a regular classroom does not have.

If the students were to take music in their regular classrooms; this would result in moving the instruments back and forth from their storage area; and in addition there would be inadequate space to place the music stands.

Our students should not be forced to give up their music room and have to take music in their regular classroom. It is not fair to them or to the teacher.

Cyberquest

As you know, our school has a very large Cyberquest teaching area which accommodates not only our students, but all other Grade 7 and 8 classes within the Board.

This is an essential teaching space that should not be removed from our school in order to accommodate the St. Thomas More students. Our students should not have to be bused to another school for Cyberquest when it has been provided in their school all these years, not to mention the cost involved to construct this room in another school, and to turn the present room into a regular classroom.

Increase in Library Use

The current library space and computer lab are inadequate to accommodate an extra 10 classes of students from St. Thomas More School. As the library is the focal point of literacy in a school, it would have to be enlarged to include another reading area for primary children, as well as an extra computer lab with size appropriate furniture.

Extra shelving would be required for all of the primary books that the children have at St. Thomas More School., and which would then be incorporated into our library. The primary children are also read to by their librarian at St. Thomas More School, which requires a special reading area to be constructed for the children.

Larger Staff Room

The current staff room barely accommodates the teachers and staff of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. The addition of approximately 15 new people certainly will require a larger staff room for everyone to fit.

Learning Strategies Room

Our school has a Learning Strategies Room for certain students that require this given their special needs. This room is used for instruction such as physiotherapy, speech and occupational therapy. It must be maintained for the children who require it.

E.R.T. Room

The children of St. Thomas More have a large E.R.T. room where they are taken for intervention classes on a regular basis.

There are various centers for the children to work at; this includes an area for meetings to be held between parents, and educations. This centre is also used for staff conferences.

The current E.R.T. room at Our Lady of Mount Carmel is very small with room for only one meeting table.

Obviously, this room will need a large expansion to accommodate the needs of the primary children, while still serving the older students of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. This room would also need to be upgraded to include a meeting area that would meet the needs of all students, staff and parents.

We Don't Want Portables

As you may know, Our Lady of Mount Carmel currently does not have portables. Our parents will strongly resist the addition of portables as a result of the closure of St. Thomas More School. The parents of both the primary and the senior students will not accept having their child in a portable, as a result of the additional students. Enough classrooms would have to be available for every child to be taught inside the walls of the school and not in a portable.

Currently, there are only 5 empty classrooms at Our Lady of Mount Carmel. This does not take into account all the specialty rooms our school has; which are not considered to be empty rooms but teaching classrooms. These are rooms that our students have had for years, which are not to be taken away due to lack of space.

Without including the J.K. and S.K. students, which we have recommended having a separate wing for, there are currently 7 other classes at St. Thomas More which translates into 7 extra rooms being required, none of which should be taken from the specialty classrooms our students currently use. Presently Our Lady of Mount Carmel has 5 empty classrooms, 2 of which are used to form double classrooms; the other three are used as a drama, storage and a teacher's resource and book room. Out of these 5 classrooms, the teacher recourse and book room is an essential room which is used daily by staff and will soon be used by students.

There will only be four empty classrooms, keeping in mind that a storage area for the schools' large equipment will have to be constructed.

In the end, without the J.K. and S.K. rooms St. Thomas More's students would require 7 classrooms and Our Lady Of Mount Carmel only has 4 empty rooms, therefore three additional rooms would need to be added.

Construction


As you can see, extensive renovations and additions would have to be made at Our Lady of Mount Carmel, none of which should be attempted during the school year. Not only is this a safety issue, but it would be overly disruptive to the learning that goes on every day.

Plans would have to be made that the construction does not commence until after the school year ends and end at a minimum, a few weeks before school beings in order that the teachers can organize their classrooms.

Conclusion

In conclusion, it is clear that the families of Our Lady of Mount Carmel will not allow their children to be affected negatively as a result of the addition of the primary students. Our current students deserve not to have things taken away from them, but to be granted new and better offerings with the inclusion of the students from their sister primary school.

The senior staff recommendation is the 2nd worst outcome for St Mary next to closing it completely. Revising the boundary would result in removing 52 St Mary students from a potential growth area (ie. Burdette-Cropp) and leaving an already saturated area with no growth potential.

The current boundary has been supported for 50 years with at least ¾ capacity. We suspect St Mary is on the ARC because of location. According to graphs supplied by school board, we are projected to have constant enrolment until 2023. Changing the boundary will result in retuning to an "ARC" situation within a few years, probably before 5 years

The 52 St Mary children would be moved to a school and parish that is served by Our Lady of Scapular, that already has a total of four schools (approx 1800 students) leaving only approximately 350 for St Pat's parish.

According to appendix 'J' of the senior staff recommendations, money will be spent to accommodate students from St Mary at Notre Dame with an addition. How much will this cost? What is the extra cost of bussing these 52 children?

While "ARC" was deliberating on merits of the six schools in the ARC, Notre Dame was added in the last few meetings – not from the start. Was Notre Dame not on the ARC because it had been visited during the prior St Vincent DePaul boundary review? The NCDSB web site is confusing and not clear and transparent to users of the site. Maps of the suggested boundaries are not given street names or timeline. Most people are unaware of the situation. Wording from Senior Staff Report Recommendations is different than ARC Recommendations – this leads to confusion of 2009/2010 or 2010/2011 school year.

Clarify – is the closure of St Joe's and the boundary change effective September 2009? Where is the study that shows students from St Joe's will even go to St Mary? St Patrick and Father Hennepin have room for all of St Joe's students, leaving our school to be monitored for the next two years. Since a city-wide boundary review is going to be done by 2011, why can't St Mary's boundary be left alone. St Joe's population could be split between St Pat's and Father Hennepin so that only two schools are used – which will be better for the children.

What happens to the out of bounds kids that have been in our school? Are they in or out?

We would like a grandfather clause for children that wish to stay at St Mary, realizing that bussing isn't a transportation option. New admissions would have to adhere to policy.

OTHER QUESTIONS

Warren Woods is still on the table for the new subdivision. Has property been purchased by the school board or serviced by a developer.

St Joe's has received money in the form of grants from the Ontario government – What happens to that money?

When does Niagara Falls Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review Committee meet? The whole city should have been included. Has there not been a City Wide Review before?

Part of St Joe's recommended boundary is now in St Paul's secondary school boundary. For children living in Coronation Park Area, will they be forced to leave St Mike's?

The City of Niagara Falls has requested the Region expand the urban boundary for the North West area, making St Vincent DePaul within that boundary of an already crowded school.

Is the trend toward BIG BOX schools? We live in an area where this isn't necessary, due to population numbers

Dear Director of Education, Mr. Crocco, Superintendents of Education, Trustees and members of audience.

My name is Shawn Gratton. I am a parent of two daughters currently attending Father Hennepin Catholic School and I represent the Delegation from Father Hennepin. As the elected Chair of this delegation I come before this panel to represent the voice of the children and their parents, guardians, family and friends regarding the matter before you tonight. Our purpose tonight is three fold: to render our input on the Senior Staff recommendation, to strengthen and secure the long term viability of our school to the Niagara Catholic District School Board and to encourage its consideration in the future deliberations.

As one of the six schools selected in the Accommodation Review Committee process, we wish to thank all the members of the committee involved in the process as their recommendation report to the Director of Education was a difficult one to agree upon. It is import to stress throughout this process, it was extremely important to minimize the over all impact it would have on the students, our children. We also understand the fiscal challenges the school board must face operating these schools as enrolment decreases over time within the province of Ontario. It is fortunate for everyone in attendance, we live in a city with economic growth due to its major source of employment; tourist industry.

Future Development

Father Hennepin's school motto is "A School With a Vision...Seeing Above and Bevond". The school lies within the heart of the economic area of Niagara Falls; the Fallsview Tourist Area. The city of Niagara Falls continues to see this area as a major source of job creation. The City of Niagara Falls has approved projects like the building of hotels, the Convention Centre, attractions and encouraging investment and re development in areas such as Downtown and Drummondville; all within a few kilometres of our school. A need for housing and schooling comes with job creation. It is extremely difficult to predict the impact of such job creation on the needs of our school. Could it increase our enrolment? Definitely. Could the school handle it? Absolutely. The proximity of these endeavours and the location of our school allows us flexibility in accommodating the possible influx of students by either placing portables on site or building an addition(s). Why? Of the six schools involved in the original ARC, we have the greatest amount of land. Father Hennepin currently sits on 3.17 hectares of land. At the time of the ARC, Father Hennipen had 3 vacant classrooms. As of January 2009, the school introduced the Early Years program occupying one of these classrooms. Under the current Senior Staff recommendation, those students coming from St. Joseph, in addition to our current enrolment, would occupy the remaining two classrooms.

Contribution to the School and the Community

It is important to recognize some achievements and successes Father Hennepin has accomplished with a dedicated student body, faculty and parental involvement (like our CSC members). We have taken the Eco School philosophy and ran with it. We raised funds, applied for and received grants from companies like Toyota and TD to increase the number of trees on property to its current number of 21, students have grown, from seeds, plants for our flower beds. We have obtained a Silver rating. We wish to continue this process by achieving our next goal which is a community Vegetable Garden and a Gold rating.

Our fundraising efforts for community needs are amazing. Two consecutive years of \$4000.00 plus to Holy Childhood Walkathon and \$2000.00 plus to Project Share was donated by our students and school. Many more listed in the package provided to the Committee.

We have forged great partnerships with many of the local businesses and charitable organizations within the school community. Without their support, many of our schools goals and endeavours would not have been realized. We wish to continue this wonderful relationship in the future.

Recommendations by the Accommodation Review Committee and Senior Staff

Our delegation has reviewed both recommendations brought forward to the Director of Education and the Board of Trustees. It is difficult to predict the pace in which Warren Woods and Thundering Waters will develop. The current time frame for these developments maybe a few years away as the economic slowdown may have an effect. With new projects like the Convention Centre likely to commence within this year, interest in our area will sure be realized. Our proximity of less than 1 kilometre will attract potential workers to housing within our school's area. We felt the recommendation made by the Accommodation Review Committee would be drastic and sudden and would have created, in some cases, 3 school changes in a short period of time for some students. It was refreshing to see a different approach from Senior Staff in regards to the matter. Under this recommendation, the impact is minimized and it allows for reviews as situations change within the City of Niagara Falls. In Father Hennepin's case, it would increase our enrolment, make use of our surplus space, and ensure our viability in the short and long term. In return, it strengthens our involvement in our community and with our Church, Our Lady of Peace. It also supports our economic partners and maintains our return in investments like our homes and businesses.

We would like to see, when the time comes, an entire review of the boundaries for all of Niagara Falls' Catholic Schools. As some schools have surplus space others are growing beyond their capacity. Building new schools in areas of need may be more beneficial than building in areas that may or may not develop.

We, the Father Hennepin Delegation, endorse the Senior Staff recommendation and we will welcome, with open arms, those students and parents from St. Joseph Catholic School to our proud and wonderful school community.

3. St. Mary Catholic Elementary School, Niagara Falls

Melissa Hesse, Community Representative, made a presentation on behalf of St. Mary Catholic Elementary School regarding the Pupil Accommodation Review.

The presentation is hereby attached and forms part of the minutes.

Chairperson Burtnik asked Director Crocco to clarify the following issues and questions raised within Ms. Hesse's presentation which resulted in the following responses:

Warren Woods is still on the table for the new subdivision. Has property been purchased by the School Board or serviced by a developer?

 The School Board has not purchased property in the Warren Woods Subdivision, and it currently is being serviced by a developer.

St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School in Niagara Falls received money in the form of grants from the Ontario Government. What happens to that money if St. Joseph closes?

 The approximately \$250,000 in Ministry of Education grants received by St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School in Niagara Falls purchased resources for students, books, professional development for staff etc. If St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School closes the resources would be shared amongst other schools.

When does the Niagara Falls Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review meet? The whole city should have been included. Has there not been a city wide review before?

 The Niagara Falls Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review Committee held it's last major review in the 2003-2004 school year and reviewed boundaries for 11 elementary schools. An Ad Hoc Attendance Area Review Committee could be formed as a result of the Pupil Accommodation Review recommendations to begin in September 2009.

Part of St. Joseph Catholic Elementary School's recommend boundary is now within the Saint Paul Catholic Secondary School boundary. For children living in Coronation Park Area, will they be forced to leave Saint Michael Catholic High School?

 The potential change in boundaries may result in a shift within population of the schools and a decision will be made based on complete information at the time. The City of Niagara Falls has requested that Region expand the urban boundary for the north west area, making St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Elementary School within that boundary of an already crowded school. Is the trend toward Big Box Schools? We live in an area where this isn't necessary, due to population numbers.

 We have been informed that the Region denied the City's request. The Niagara Catholic District School Board has most recently approved two new smaller elementary schools in Grimsby. St. Joseph and Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Elementary Schools of approximately 230 and 350 students rather than one school of 500 plus students.

I am a life long resident of St. Catharines and a firm believer in the importance of Catholic Education.

I have resided within the boundaries of St. Nicholas School for my entire life. My formal education began in St. Nicholas and my five children attended St. Nicholas.

I even had the privilege of being principal of this wonderful school.

When I started my teaching career with the St. Catharines Catholic School Board at Christ the King School on Glenridge Ave., there were 6 more Catholic schools in full operation with the 8th one being built. (St. Mary's, St. Nicholas, St. Catherine, St. John, St. Denis, St. Joseph,) Basically these schools were between the QE highway and the train tracks on Glenridge. Ave.

Today Christ the King is an orthodox church, St. Mary's has been torn down to make way for a housing development. St. John's and St. Thomas house adult education, St. Catherine's is a parking lot, and St. Joseph's closed. St. Denis still exists but St. Nicholas is the only Catholic School in the downtown. This beacon of Catholic Education has been shining brightly for over 150 years.

We would not be here tonight if downtown St. Catharines had not been sliding into a coma for the past 30 years. Unfortunately the city councils of the past saw no need to invest in their downtown and as a result, people moved out. Naturally their children went with them and the businesses followed.

However, in 2008 it began to show signs of waking up. The prognosis is that downtown will fully waken and become a very vibrant destination over the next few years.

Projects are under way which will provide housing in the core of the city. Presently, older commercial buildings are being converted to residences as seen on King St. in the former handball facility. New construction of 40-45 townhouses is taking place on the parking lot of the former Hotel Dieu Hospital. When the new hospital is complete the former Hotel Dieu site will be transformed into hundreds of residential units. People living in an area bring life, vitality and children with them. New businesses have already sprung up in anticipation of this renewal.

Over the past few years we have seen downtown transforming into an Arts Centre with several theatre groups as well as a number of visual arts establishments. Some of these venues not only display art but provide studio space for artists.

Brock University is moving its School of Fine and Performing Arts to downtown. There are over 500 students in that program and it is growing. In conjunction with the school, a Performing Arts center will be constructed adjacent to the school. It will host music, dance, film, photography, dramatic displays and performances. It will also double as a convention center.

It was reported in; the St. Catharines Standard on Dec. 20, 2008 that "Catholic School Board Staff recommended closing the downtown's only faith based school if it doesn't gain 100 more students by 2011

THAT STATEMENT SCARED ME! If I was a parent of school age children I would be looking now for another school. Kids and parents have enough stresses in their lives without the added threat of their school closing.

I would therefore request that the board state loudly and clearly that St. Nicholas School **will Not** close in 2011 but will be reviewed again in 5 years. This would provide immediate security for the current parents and students as well as giving the staff time to work on my next suggestions.

I would also ask the board to direct the staff to find ways to keep Catholic Education alive in downtown St. Catharines and I will now speak to this possibility.

As a result of working together, I learned that when Mr. Crocco was given a task to do, he did it with enthusiasm, with focus, with energy and, if it was meant to be, with success. If given the challenge, and, if it is meant to be, Mr. Crocco will find a way to keep St. Nicholas School open,

To that end, I also have a couple of suggestions.

A) The board has been running a pilot program in Intensive French. Perhaps a program in Intensive French could be started in St. Catharines and housed at St. Nicholas. Proximity to Immaculate Conception could be a bonus.

B) Make St. Nicholas a centre for Special Interest Programs in the Arts. Programs could be developed for students in grades 6,7 & 8 to have a more in depth exposure to the arts than they can receive in the regular school setting.

For example: Bring to St. Nicholas the students from the various schools for a half day a week for a semester. Creative, energetic and talented teachers will provide innovative programs that will enrich the current arts curriculum.

The McGuinty government says, and I quote, "Arts education is critical to our kid's intellectual, physical and emotional growth. By studying dance, drama, media arts, music and visual arts, students learn to think more creatively and critically, and further develop the ability to work with others."

C) Enter into a partnership or co-operative arrangement with Brock's School of Fine and Performing Arts, the Niagara Artists Centre (NAC) and other theatre groups such as the Carousel Players which would be extremely enriching and rewarding experiences for our students

D) The downtown location of St. Nicholas with its proximity to the Cathedral, library, police station, city hall, market, etc. provides many alternate learning opportunities.

I am asking the board to seriously consider my proposal which will result in more of our students selecting art courses in our high schools. This in turn will result in more of our high school students selecting arts at Brock and all of this will provide employment opportunities that will allow our youth to stay in the area.

To briefly summarize, I have two requests.

Do not close St. Nicholas in 2011,

Direct the staff to find a creative viable solution to this problem.

This would confirm that the Catholic School board of Niagara has the courage and creative energy to be innovative Catholic leaders who can look to the future needs of their community.

McGuinty Government Boosts Arts Education

Ontario Students Will Benefit From Investments In New Resources Including Musical Instruments And Art Supplies

TORONTO, Jan. 18 /CNW/ - Students in Grades 1 through 12 will benefit from new arts education resources and professional development for teachers, thanks to nearly \$5 million in provincial funding, Education Minister Kathleen Wynne announced today.

"Arts education is critical to our kids' intellectual, physical and emotional growth," said Wynne. "By studying dance, drama, media arts, music and visual arts, students learn to think more creatively and critically, and further develop the ability to work with others."

Public school boards across Ontario will receive more than \$4 million to buy musical instruments, art supplies and other resources to support dance, drama, music and media arts in elementary and high schools. In addition, arts education associations and community organizations will share almost \$800,000 to develop resources and host artists, performances and workshops in schools.

The outcomes of arts education - creativity, imagination, innovation and originality - are among the most important resources for economic prosperity in the 21st century. Ontario's entertainment and creative industries contribute nearly \$9.9 billion to the provincial economy and generate approximately 185,000 jobs. Over the next two decades, job growth in this sector is expected to surpass most of Ontario's other thriving employment sectors.

The investment is part of the McGuinty government's commitment to improving Ontario's public education system. Students are already benefitting from government initiatives intended to help more students succeed, including:

TEACHING THE ARTS IN ONTARIO

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The McGuinty government has invested nearly \$30 million in arts education across the province, including almost \$5 million announced today for new resources.

Arts education contributes to student success across the curriculum, supports higher academic achievement, and improves student motivation and attendance. It enhances student engagement, fosters tolerance and respect for diversity, and builds self-confidence. Arts education has been shown to be a particular benefit to at-risk youth and hard to reach learners.

At the secondary school level, students must earn one arts credit and may add a second one toward their compulsory credit requirements.

In addition, through the Specialist High Skills Major announced in December, students will now be able to complete a minimum bundle of courses in specific high skills areas, such as the arts.

The government has provided funding for school boards to hire an additional 1,300 teachers to support high school students, as well as funding to hire 1,600 elementary specialist teachers in areas such as music, the arts, as well as phys-ed.

To support the Grade 1-12 arts curriculum, public school boards across Ontario will receive more than \$4 million to buy musical instruments and other supplies and resources, and provide professional development opportunities for teachers.

Good evening Mr. Crocco, Secretary/Treasurer, Mrs. Kathy Burtnik, Chair, Mr. Frank Fera, Vice-Chair, Trustees of the Niagara Catholic, Parents, Prinipals and Guests, Hello my name is Leslie Landolt and I am a member of the St. Nicholas Parent Council. Presently, I have two children in attendance at St. Nicks, in grade three and five respectively. I had the duty as past chair of our council to participate as a member on the Accommodation Review Committee. The process required dedication, care and concern from all members, not just for individual schools but for the benefit of Catholic education in Niagara. Often the process was full of emotion, yet due to the structure outlined by the Ministry of Education we were forced to clearly look at the health of our system as a whole. On a personal note, I came into the review thinking about cost, numbers and logical steps that needed to be taken in order for a bottom line to be maintained. By the end of the entire process I began to view the outcome in a totally different way.

I began to ponder what being a Catholic was.

I pondered what living in a community was all about. I pondered the entire concept of Christian Ministry, fellowship within a community of Catholic families and how that influences the parents and children who are unfamiliar with Catholicism.

In the transient life that makes up any downtown, the tiny heartbeat of all that Catholic education strives for is evident in St. Nicholas School. Yes, it is a tiny speck of a school in the center of a downtown struggling to revitalize itself. Let us all remember that it is the only school that serves the residence of downtown. We all know that our School Board's mandate does not include downtown revitalization, yet I hope that it does include values of Christian ministry to the most vulnerable among us. By and large St. Nicholas is made up of inner city kids whose stability depends upon the safe haven of a historical community that for 150 plus years has always served them.

As past Chair of our council, I had the extreme pleasure of attending our Catholic Conferences put on by our board. They are both wonderful and inspiring. They clearly affirm the devotion of this board to promote the concept of Triad: School, Church and Home.

The Triad is both visible and spiritual. I am reminded of it every time my children walk home from school and attend Mass at the Cathedral on Sundays. As a parent, the concept of "Triad" was brought to life because of the core values explained to me through the Niagara Catholic District School Board. In the case of St. Nicholas, where stability within a community is needed, why is the Board ready to dismantle the connection between the Cathedral, School and Home? Yes, you can, as you have, make the recommendation to send our St. Nicholas children to many different schools and be content with a Cathedral that no longer has the life blood of children. But how does this truly fit with the Board's proclaimed concept of "TRIAD"? I will leave this question for everyone here to ponder: Is it our responsibility to care for the communities that we serve no matter how transient or vulnerable? Is it our business to treat our school communities that are vulnerable and weak as centers of Catholic Ministry? Personally, I feel that this is what our faith calls us to do.

Please consider this fundamental and spirit filled reason to keep a 152 year old school community open.

My name is Yvonne Wowk and I am a parent at St. Nicholas Catholic School. Tonight I would like to make a few comments and suggestions and to ask some important questions concerning the possible closure of St. Nicholas Catholic Elementary.

First, our student enrolment has gone from 130 students up to 145 students since the Accommodation Review Committee survey was done in 2007. According to the Senior Staff Recommendations from Dec. 2, 2008, St. Nicholas School could stay open if a minimum of 230 students are registered by Sept. 2011. I received information from our School Superintendent stating that there are 87 students who are within our school boundary, who could be going to St. Nicholas, but are allowed to go to other schools for various reasons. 87 students!!! That is a very high number of out of boundary students for a school that is struggling to remain open. Almost half of our student population!! Why are so many students allowed to leave? If you do the math, 145 students plus 87 students equals 232. My question is: why the number 230, when there are other schools allowed to remain open with lower enrolment? I feel that our school is being targeted. A comment made during an Accommodation Review Working Committee Meeting re-affirms my thoughts on this. It was suggested to take a brick from St. Nicholas and to place it in the library of St. Denis Catholic Elementary School as a remembrance of the school. This gives me the impression that the decision about our school has already been made before the community input has been presented.

According to Senior Staff Recommendations once again, it is stated that if the school is closed, the St. Nicholas students would be relocated to either Mother Theresa, which has by the way, minus 26 student spaces available, or to St. Anthony's, which has minus 9 student spaces available, or to St. Christopher's, which has minus 24 student spaces available or to St. Denis which has only 64 available student spaces but with a proposed renewal need cost of \$863,608.00. Right now there is a proposal from the school board to build a minimum of 4 additional classrooms to St. Anthony's with the project cost to be announced. Why spend the money on these additions and upgrades when we already have a school right here to accommodate not just some, but all of our students? How much money will the school board actually save by closing the school? If each student generates approximately, \$8,000.00 the real question is: what is the potential loss of revenue if all of the current students at St. Nicholas opted to attend Memorial Public School or Alexander Public School, two public schools within walking distance of St. Nicholas?

This question was to put to me personally: "If you can get your numbers up to 230 students, not including the out of boundary students, then we can see about getting funding for a new downtown elementary school." Why is it up to the parents to increase enrolment? We already have our jobs, family responsibilities, kids in sports, volunteering on school councils and the many other school activities we provide for our students. This is your job, your responsibility. What has Senior Staff done to meet their recommendation that there WILL be 230 students registered at St. Nicholas by 2011 and that we WILL receive funding for a new school? The school board has the resources, the tools and options to make St. Nicholas more attractive and viable. Why doesn't the board:

- 1. restrict the out of boundary attendance
- 2. change the attendance area boundaries by redistributing student enrolment across the city to eliminate the need for additions.
- 3. establish a day care centre at St. Nicholas to accommodate the families who need child care after school. This would eliminate the need to go to an alternate school because day care if offered there.
- 4. regain and return ownership of St. Nicholas school property back to the English Catholic School Board, ie. Niagara Catholic, or to obtain permission from the French Catholic School Board to do renovations or additions as needed to improve St. Nicholas if/when funding becomes available.

For those present this evening, St. Nicholas and Immaculate Conception School's buildings and sites were both lost to the Catholic French Board in the 1998 amalgamation of the District School Boards.

All of these options will benefit our school and would avoid the travesty of closing the oldest catholic school in the Niagara Region and the only english speaking catholic elementary school that serves the downtown community of St. Catharines.

History of St. Nicholas

St. Nicholas has a 150 year old history. Our first Catholic School was opened in 1857 in downtown St. Catharines. The reason the school opened was to meet the needs of new immigrants to the area. That need is still present in the downtown. We were there for the early newcomers to our city and we must be here for the newcomers today. Our immigrant families still need accessible Catholic education. Downtowns tend to be gathering points for newcomers; they arrive here and live here. Without St. Nicholas, new families in the area may resort to sending their children to one of the two public schools located near by, rather than sending their children by bus to a Catholic school further away. St. Nicholas has a positive impact on the surrounding community.

My personal history at St. Nicholas is one that is very close to my heart.

My husband Leo Bonomi attended St. Nicholas as did all of our 4 children. Our children received an excellent education at St. Nicholas that prepared them for High School at Denis Morris as well as post-secondary education. Our eldest is a graduate of University of Western Ontario, our 2nd daughter is in 3rd year at Western and our two youngest are still attending Denis Morris. We truly believe that the education our children received at St. Nicholas exceeded the academic requirement. It prepared them for the real world. The unique blend of staff and students form a cross-section of backgrounds at St. Nicholas school. The diversity that makes up St. Nicholas school is not available elsewhere. Students become exposed to different cultures, ethnic backgrounds, and socio-economic conditions. This has proved to be invaluable to my children in making sound judgements that affected their lives in a very real way.

If you close St. Nicholas School you will never be able to build downtown again, as there is no available land. Although urban sprawl has affected all city centres, it is still extremely important to have a Catholic elementary school in our downtown for our downtown residents. It is important for these young people to have a school in *their* neighbourhood. This school is one that they can call their own, and that is a privilege that all students deserve.

Presentation Re: Consideration of Closure of St. Nicholas School St. Catharines

The St. Catharines Downtown Development and Revitalization Committee (DDRC) was established by St. Catharines City Council to advise on matters related to the revitalization of the downtown area. On November 27th, 2008, the DDRC received a presentation by a concerned resident about the possible closure of St. Nicholas School.

As you know, Downtown St. Catharines has been designated by the Provincial Government as the only Urban Growth Centre in the Niagara Region through the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe. This designation requires a minimum density of 150 residents/jobs per acre for all new development in this area. City Council has adopted the proposed Growth Centre boundaries to include the area south of Welland Avenue to the Highway 406, to Ontario Street on the west, and out to the intersection of Queenston Street and Church Street to the east (see map attached). The site where the current school is located is within this area. Within this area over the next 20 years, it is anticipated that over 2,000 new residential units will be constructed. The future of the downtown is based on a combination of concentrated commercial core with residential development to the east in and around the existing school site.

A school is an important component of any residential area. It is an important facility that particularly younger families look for in making housing choice. As such, the continuation of the presence of an elementary school is considered very important in helping the City to achieve the longer term provincial targets.

The DDRC recognizes that school boards are faced with difficult decisions concerning school capacity based on changing demographics. DDRC requests that Board give serious consideration to all options that would allow the continuation of a school presence within the Urban Growth Centre designation including partnering with different community groups and other public agencies to keep the school open before making a decision to close this school.





The following Guidelines describe the public meeting process.

Delegation Application Process

The public meeting will follow the By-law of the Board for public delegations in modified form, as set out below. The modifications are intended to facilitate public participation.

- (a) Written application requesting the opportunity to appear as a delegation must be submitted to the Director of Education no later than 4:00 p.m. on February 10th, 2009.
- (b) The following information should be included with this application:
 - (i) The name of the organization/individuals(s) or party(ies) who will be making the presentation;
 - (ii) Their authority/title/position with the organization (if applicable);
 - (iii) A complete mailing address;
 - (iv) A day time telephone number;
 - (v) A number where they can be reached after business hours;
 - (vi) A fax number (if available);
 - (vii) An e-mail address (if available);
 - (viii) The complete presentation in written format

(c) Delegations are encouraged to send the Presentation in as soon as possible so that it can be provided to and reviewed by Trustees prior to the meeting. Presentations that are received on a timely basis will be considered and addressed in the Director's follow-up report to the Board required by the Pupil Accommodation Review Policy in which the Director will report on and respond to the presentations made by the public. A presentation that is submitted late may not be addressed in the Director's follow-up report although it will be made available to the Trustees.

Delegation Presentation

Minutes of the Special Board Meetings including references to the presentations will be posted on the Board's website.

- (a) The identified spokespersons will address the Trustees from the podium.
- (b) The spokespersons are expected to provide comments that are relevant to the subject matter of the meeting. If a previous delegation has already addressed the matter and the delegate is being repetitive, the Chairperson of the Board may request the delegate to express support for an earlier presentation and may reduce the following speaking times available to the delegate accordingly.
- (c) The time for each public delegation to speak, excluding the question and answer period, is not to exceed fifteen (15) minutes, with normally a five (5) minute question period following.
- (d) Delegates who have a similar perspective are encouraged to co-operate in appointing spokespersons in addressing the Board.
- (e) Delegations from the same school community on the same point of view shall be limited to a combined total of fifteen (15) minutes.
- (f) Delegations who are unrelated to a particular school community but who are speaking on a common issue shall be limited to a combined total of fifteen (15) minutes.
- (g) Trustees may ask questions of the delegation for clarification only, for a period of time which shall be at the discretion of the Chairperson.
- (h) The Chairperson will apply the normal Board practices in respect of decorum and order at the meeting.
- (i) The Board will not permit delegations respecting the Pupil Accommodation Review Policy at other Board meetings.
- (j) In accordance with Board By-law 7.5 the Board shall not remain in session later than 11:00 p.m. unless so determined by a 2/3 majority of the members present.





REPORT ON THE FUNDING OF CAPITAL PROJECTS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In 1998, under the New Funding Model, the funding of capital projects was simplified from the inefficient Capital Expenditures Forecast Model to a more dynamic and effective New Pupil Places Program (NPP) and Facility Renewal Program (FRP).

Under the NPP Model, school boards were given a greater amount of responsibility and accountability regarding the planning and implementation of capital projects. Based on the projections of total enrolment and total school capacity, school boards were able to project the capital funding receivable from the Ministry of Education and they were able to plan and implement capital projects without the formal approval of the Ministry of Education.

On June 12, 2006 the Ministry of Education informed School Boards that a new approach was planned regarding the funding of capital projects effective August 31, 2006 and that a number of new capital funding initiatives would be announced in the new future. Since then, over a two year period the Ministry of Education has unveiled a number of capital funding initiatives, which are very prescriptive and which require an extensive number of reviews and approvals by the Ministry of Education. The new capital funding approach included the following capital programs:

- Facility Renewal Capital Projects
- New Pupil Places Capital Projects
- Good Places to Learn Capital Projects
- Primary Class Size Capital Projects
- Prohibitive-to-Repair Capital Projects
- Local Growth Schools Capital Projects
- Funding for Full Day Learning for 4-and-5 Year Olds Capital Projects

Under the new approach, school boards were informed that they were required to obtain approval from the Ministry of Education before entering into any new capital financial commitments. Boards that failed to comply with this requirement would be held responsible for all costs related to the dissolution of contracts.

In order to access the capital funding available under the each capital program, school boards must submit a business case for each project and they must meet a specific set of eligibility criteria and conditions. In addition, schools boards are required to obtain approval for three milestones from the beginning to the end of the each capital project, as follows:

- Milestone 1 Project Scope Cost and Timeline
 - Ministry approval is required to transfer funds from reserves (before issuing Tenders)
- Milestone 2 Results of Tendering Process
 - Ministry approval is required before awarding of Tenders
- Milestone 3 Report on Project Completion
 - Ministry approval is required after the formal approval of the Board

The Ministry of Education emphasized that capital funding provided under a particular capital program could not be transferred to other capital programs. In addition, any expenditure over the approved funding in any capital program would have to be covered by the board.

Projects Completed Prior to August 31, 2006

In order to reconcile the old funding approach with the methodology of the new funding initiatives, the Ministry of Education reviewed the capital liquidity of all school boards, using a Capital Liquidity Template (CLT) for all projects completed prior to August 31, 2006 and planned after August 31, 2006, as noted in Appendix A.

The Capital Liquidity Template confirmed the following information:

- 1. Niagara Catholic completed 21 Capital Projects prior to August 31, 2006 for a total cost of \$81,397,897, including 17 Capital Projects eligible for New Pupil Places (NPP) Grants for a total cost of \$74,352,471 and 4 Capital Projects eligible for Facility Renewal Program (FRP) Grants for a total cost of \$7,045,426, as noted in Appendix B.
- 2. Niagara Catholic had accumulated a balance of \$16,255,567 in the Pupil Accommodation Debt Reserve (PADR) at August 31, 2008, in order to fund future debenture payments. The balance of \$16,255,567 represented an accumulation of unspent NPP Grants amounting to \$7,780,884 and unspent FRP Grants amounting to \$8,474,683, as noted in Appendix C.
- 3. Niagara Catholic had accumulated a balance of \$4,603,202 in the Proceeds of Disposition Reserve (PODR) at August 31, 2008, a portion of which was to be used to fund future debenture payments, as noted in Appendix C. The PODR balance was accumulated from the sale of the old St. Vincent de Paul School and Saint Michael High School.
- 4. Niagara Catholic would continue to receive annual NPP Grants, which will be based on the projections of total enrolment and total school capacity. The Ministry of Education has estimated that these annual NPP Grants, together with the above mentioned reserves (PADR & PODR), will be sufficient to cover the debenture payments related to NPP Capital Projects completed prior to August 31, 2006, as noted in Appendix D.
- 5. Niagara Catholic had made a long term commitment to set aside FRP Grants in the amount of \$1,000,000 per year until the year 2029-30, in order to meet future debenture payments. However, at this time, based on the updated enrolment projections, the Board would be required to set aside only \$329,193 per year until the year 2029-30, in order to support the debentures that related strictly to Capital Projects eligible for FRP Projects (See Appendix E).

Based on the foregoing information and based on updated enrolment data, the Ministry of Education has requested that the board take the following actions:

- 1. **THAT** the Niagara Catholic District School Board approve a resolution to protect the FRP Grants accumulated in the Pupil Accommodation Debt Reserve at August 31, 2008 in the amount of \$8,474,683 and to ensure that these funds are used to pay down the capital debt when the debentures come up for renewal.
- 2. **THAT** Niagara Catholic District School Board approve a resolution to protect a portion of the funds accumulated in the Proceeds of Disposition Reserve (PODR) at August 31, 2008 in the amount of \$3,240,000, and to ensure that these funds are used to pay down the capital debt when the debentures come up for renewal.

Projects Planned After August 31, 2006

In June 2008 the board submitted a Capital Liquidity Template (CLT), which requested funding for 20 capital projects for a total cost of \$71,550,000.

After many meetings and telephone conversations, the Ministry of Education approved the funding for 9 capital projects for a total cost of \$22,550,000, including \$10,250,000 for capital projects eligible for Primary Class Size (PCS) funding and \$12,300,000 for capital projects eligible for Prohibitive to Repair (PTR) funding, as noted in Appendix F.

The Plant Department is now in the process of preparing tender documents for these projects, in order to obtain Milestone 2 Approval from the Ministry of Education.

The Ministry of Education considered the need to fund 5 additional PTR and Growth Schools Projects, which were requested by the Board for a cost of \$29,500,000 (\$4,000,000 for PTR Projects and \$24,500,000 for Growth Schools Projects), as noted in Appendix F.

These projects will be considered for funding during the next few months under the Capital Priorities Template (CPT) Program. The members of Senior Staff will continue to collaborate with Ministry staff, in order to maximize the capital funding under the CPT Program.

The Ministry of Education deferred the funding of 6 additional capital projects related to the Accommodation Review Committee (ARC) Process and Other Capital Projects, which were requested by the Board for a cost of \$19,500,000 (\$11,500,000 for ARC Related Projects and \$8,000,000 for Other Capital Projects), as noted in Appendix F.

These capital projects will be deferred until the Board will be able to identify the appropriate funding sources to support these projects. The members of Senior Staff will continue to collaborate with ministry staff, in order to identify additional sources of capital funding to support the construction of these capital projects.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Committee of the Whole recommend that the Niagara Catholic District School Board approve the following resolutions:

- 1. **THAT** the Niagara Catholic District School Board direct Senior Staff to protect the FRP Grants accumulated in the Pupil Accommodation Debt Reserve (PADR) at August 31, 2008 in the amount of \$8,474,683 and to encumber these funds so that they are used only to pay down the capital debt when the debentures come up for renewal.
- 2. **THAT** Niagara Catholic District School Board direct Senior Staff to protect a portion of the funds accumulated in the Proceeds of Disposition Reserve (PODR) at August 31, 2008 in the amount of \$3,240,000, and to encumber these funds so that they are used only to pay down the capital debt when the debentures come up for renewal.
- 3. **THAT** Niagara Catholic District School Board direct Senior Staff to continue to limit the annual Facility Renewal Program Expenditures, so the annual unspent amount of \$1,000,000 of the Facility Renewal Program Grants can be deposited in the Pupil Accommodation Debt Reserve (PADR-FRP) until the year 2029-30, in order to fund future debenture payments, including \$327,922 for Facility Renewal Projects completed prior to August 31, 2006, and to fund additional Facility Renewal Program capital projects, as approved by the Board in the future.

The Ministry has reviewed your board's capital liquidity template in respect of all capital projects pre- and post-August 31, 2006. We appreciate the cooperation of your staff during the course of this exercise.

Projects Pre-August 31, 2006:

According to our analysis of the board's capital liquidity template, the board currently has a capital debt of \$74.3 million in projects that were tendered pre-August 31, 2006. The Ministry estimates that approximately \$8.6M is not supported by the board's current revenue projections. Based on the information provided in the board's template and discussions with board staff, the board is not eligible for capital debt commitment support. The board was aware of this funding shortfall and had a plan to place approximately \$1 million from its annual renewal grant each year into its renewal reserve in order to cover these costs.

As a result, the Ministry is requiring that the board protect the \$8.47 million currently in its renewal reserve as well as \$3.24 million in its proceeds of disposition reserve to ensure that these funds are available to cover any future shortfall. The Ministry estimates that these reserves will be sufficient to cover the board's current capital debt over the next 25 years. The Ministry is requesting that the board pass a motion to encumber the \$11.71 million to support its pre-August 31, 2006 capital debt.

The Ministry also recommends that the board take the opportunity to use these protected capital reserves to pay down the capital debt when its debentures come up for renewal rather than refinancing.

Projects post-August 31, 2006:

Based on our assessment of your board's projected capital revenues and reserves, including Primary Class Size (PCS) and Prohibitive-to-Repair (PTR), the Ministry confirms that your board has the financial ability to support the costs of all projects in the table below.

The Ministry approves your board's transfer from reserves in the amount of \$22,550,000 million to support the above projects.

However, based on the Ministry's analysis of its capital liquidity template, the board has no means to support future capital projects, other than those projects for which it receives new capital funding from the Ministry or has future proceeds of disposition.

The Growth Schools and Prohibitive-to-Repair projects which are currently listed in the board's capital liquidity template will be considered through the Capital Priority Program. The other planned projects in your board's capital liquidity template are being deferred at this time until the board can identify the funding source(s) to support these projects.

While this letter effectively gives approval for the Our Lady of Fatima ES and St. Joseph ES Prohibitive-to-Repair projects, the Ministry would like to remind the board that there are reporting milestones for prohibitive-to-repair projects that require Ministry approval. Please refer to the Memo SB 5: 2008 for details.

The Ministry also notes that the board has allocated substantial Primary Class Size funding to the projects listed above. We would like to remind the board that this funding can only be used to address Primary Class Space needs.



ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL YEAR CALENDARS - 2009-2010

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The *Education Act, Regulation 304 - School Year Calendar, Professional Activity Days* outlines the requirements and timelines for preparing and submission of school year calendars to the Ministry of Education for approval.

The 2009-2010 school year is a very unique calendar. From September 1st, 2009-June 30th, 2010 there a total of 196 possible school days. This coming September 2009, Labour Day falls on Monday, September 7th which ends up with a total number of school days between September 8th and June 30th, 2010 equaling 192 school days.

Within this total, elementary and secondary schools must have a minimum of 194 school days of which two (2) days must be designated as professional activity days to focus on provincial education priorities and up to four (4) extra days that may be designated by the Board as professional activity days. Secondary schools may have a maximum of ten (10) instructional days as examination days.

This upcoming School Year Calendar therefore requires the school year to begin prior to Labour Day. The consultation process, received comments on all aspects of the 2009-2010 school year calendar.

Consultation Process

The 2009-2010 School Year Calendar Committee met on January 29th, 2009 to discuss and review draft calendars and the consultation process. The School Year Calendar Committee met again on February 19th, 2009 to review feedback resulting from a comprehensive system consultation process and provided recommendations for the Elementary and Secondary 2009-2010 School Year Calendar to Administrative Council.

The consultation process, which began on February 3rd, 2009 provided copies of the elementary and secondary draft calendars to all Elementary and Secondary Principals, Vice-Principals, Catholic School Council Chairs, Regional Catholic School Council, OECTA Elementary and Secondary Presidents, CUPE President, Student Support Services, Program Departments and the Student Senate for feedback by February 19th, 2009.

Feedback from the consultation process resulted in approximately a 40% rate of response. Feedback was wide ranging throughout the system with most of the dialogue focusing on the start up to the school year, the use of Professional Activity Days and the end of the school year. In addition to the School Year Calendar Committee reviewing feedback received by February 19th, 2009, Administrative Council also reviewed the feedback along with the 2009-2010 School Year Calendar Committee recommendations for a Niagara Catholic Elementary and Secondary School Year Calendar for 2009-2010.

In the final analysis, the Administrative Council considered all feedback and is recommending a school year calendar which would best meet the needs of our students and their achievement and one which is closely aligned for all students throughout the Niagara Region.

REPORT TO THE BOARD FEBRUARY 24, 2009

REPORT ON LONG TERM FINANCING OF APPROVED CAPITAL PROJECTS COMPLETED PRIOR TO AUGUST 31, 2008

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

During the last three years, the Niagara Catholic District School Board received the following funding allocations for the upgrading of schools under the Good Places to Learn Capital Program:

- \$17,271,466 under the Good Places to Learn Program (Stage 1)
- \$7,079,291 under the Good Places to Learn Program (Stage 2)
- \$5,987,964 under the Good Places to Learn Program (Stage 3).

The Ministry of Education requested that school boards use short-term financing to fund their GPL Projects and Other Capital Projects, until the related financial commitments could be consolidated into a long-term financing vehicle.

In November 2006, all schools boards were informed that the Ministry of Education ("Ministry"), along with the Ontario Financing Authority ("OFA") and the Ontario Infrastructure Projects Corporation ("OIPC") were going to assist school boards in converting the short-term financing for GPL Projects into long-term financing for all school boards. The OFA is a Crown Agency established under the Capital Investment Plan Act, 1993. The OIPC is also a Crown Agency, which will be assisting the OFA in the administration of the long-term financing.

Under this initiative, The OFA will make 25-year amortizing term financing available to all school boards for GPL Projects and Other Capital Projects approved under a prescribed Capital Program. The maximum principal amount of the long term financing will be the total amount of funding allocated to the Board under a prescribed Capital Program. Standard documentation will be prepared by the OFA for the use of all school boards and individual financing terms will not be negotiated. The Ministry will require all school boards to participate in this long-term financing arrangement.

It is important to note that all school boards will receive the appropriate annual capital grants from the Ministry of Education, in order to cover all interest and principal payments associated with this long-term financing. In November 2006 the Niagara Catholic District School Board participated in the first issue of the GPL financing for a total of \$14,000,000 for GPL Projects, which were completed up to August 31, 2006. This issue of long term financing was amortized over 25 years at a rate of 4.56% and was repayable in semi-annual payments of \$472,147.16.

In February 2008 the Niagara Catholic District School Board participated in the second issue of the GPL financing for a total of \$\$10,350,737 (\$3,371,446 for Stage 1 and \$7,079,291 for Stage 2) for GPL Projects, which were completed up to August 31, 2007. This issue of long term financing will be amortized over 25 years at a rate of 4.90% and will be repayable in semi-annual payments of \$362,839.61.

In March 2009 the Niagara Catholic District School Board will be participating in the third issue of the GPL financing for a total of \$4,683,110 for GPL Projects (Stage 3), which were completed up to August 31, 2008. This issue of long term financing will be amortized over 25 years at a rate of 5.062% and will be repayable in semi-annual payments of \$166,736.12.

3. Prior to the Board's passage of the By-law, I calculated the relevant updated debt and financial obligation and liability limits in accordance with the Regulation and determined that the annual amount payable in respect of the borrowing under the Loan Agreement will not cause the Board to reach or to exceed its relevant updated debt and financial obligation and liability limits and I have also determined that as at the date hereof the Board has not reached or exceeded the relevant updated debt and financial obligation and liability limits;

4. In updating the relevant debt and financial obligation and liability limits the estimated annual amount payable as described in subsection 4(2) of the Regulation was determined based on current interest rates and appropriate amortization periods which do not, except in the case of permanent improvements that are subject to a loan with the Ontario Financing Authority, if applicable, exceed the respective lifetime of any of the Eligible Projects of the Board described in such subsection, all in accordance with generally accepted accounting

principles or in accordance with the recommendations of the Public Sector Accounting Board, as appropriate.

BY-LAW NUMBER 2009-A1

A by-law to authorize a loan from the Ontario Financing Authority in the principal amount of \$4,683,110 pursuant to a loan agreement under section 12 of Ontario Regulation 466/97

WHEREAS subsection 247 (1) of the *Education Act* R.S.O. 1990, c. E.2, as amended (the "*Education Act*") and the regulations made thereunder, provides that, subject to any other provision of the *Education Act* and, specifically, the regulations made under subsections 242 (1) and 247 (3) of the *Education Act*, a district school board may by by-law borrow money or incur debt for permanent improvements and may issue debentures or issue or execute any instrument prescribed under clause 247 (3) (f) of the *Education Act* in respect of the money borrowed or the debt incurred;

AND WHEREAS section 12 of Ontario Regulation 466/97, as amended by Ontario Regulation 462/06 (the "**Regulation**"), provides that (1) a board may by by-law borrow money for permanent improvements by way of a loan from the Ontario Financing Authority with an initial maturity of more than one year and that (2) a board that obtains a loan mentioned in subsection 12 (1) shall ensure that the proceeds of it are used for permanent improvements;

AND WHEREAS the Niagara Catholic District School Board (the "Board"), which under the *Education Act* constitutes a district school board, has undertaken urgent and high priority renewal projects at schools of the Board listed in any one or more of: (i) Appendix B of the document entitled "Good Places to Learn: Stage 1 Funding Allocation"; (ii) Appendix C of the document entitled "Good Places to Learn: Stage 2 Funding Allocation"; and (iii) Appendix B of the document entitled "Good Places to Learn: Stage 3 Funding Allocation"; some of which projects are described in Schedule "A" attached to the Loan Agreement, as hereinafter defined (individually a "GPL Eligible Project", collectively the "GPL Eligible Projects") and pursuant to Ontario Regulation 85/08, each GPL Eligible Project constitutes a "permanent improvement" as defined in subsection 1(1) of the *Education Act*. In the event that the Board will borrow the principal amount specified in paragraph 2.1 under the Loan Agreement in respect of a single GPL Eligible Project, the term "GPL Eligible Projects" means that GPL Eligible Project;

AND WHEREAS the GPL Eligible Projects are collectively referred to as the "Eligible Projects". In the event that the Board will borrow the principal amount specified in paragraph 2.1 under the Loan Agreement in respect of a single Eligible Project, the term "Eligible Projects" means that Eligible Project;

AND WHEREAS before the Board authorized each of the Eligible Projects and before authorizing additional cost amounts in respect of the Eligible Projects (if any), the Treasurer of the Board updated the Board's most recent annual debt and financial obligation and liability limits as determined in accordance with the provisions of Ontario Regulation 472/98 and determined that the estimated annual amount payable by the Board in respect of each Eligible Project and each such additional cost amount (if any), would not cause the Board to reach or exceed its updated limits, with the result that the Board authorized each Eligible Project and each such additional cost amount (if any) without the prior approval of the Minister of Education "B" to the Loan Agreement; but such amount shall be paid out of the Board's general revenue only to the extent required after taking into account funds available from other sources.

6. Any amounts payable by the Board in respect of the Loan including interest on overdue principal and interest in respect of the Loan together with fees and other amounts payable by the Board under the Loan Agreement, if applicable, shall be paid out of the Board's general revenue or any other available funds.

7. The proceeds of the Loan, shall be used to finance the Eligible Expenditures, as defined in the Loan Agreement, in respect of the Eligible Projects on a long-term basis and for no other purpose except as permitted by the *Education Act* and the regulations made thereunder.

This Loan Agreement made in duplicate dated and effective as of the 13th day of March, 2009.

BETWEEN:

ONTARIO FINANCING AUTHORITY, a corporation established under the *Capital Investment Plan Act, 1993*, (hereinafter the "OFA")

OF THE FIRST PART

NIAGARA CATHOLIC DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD, a district school board continued under the *Education Act* (hereinafter the "Board")

OF THE SECOND PART

WHEREAS:

- (a) the Board has participated in a program referred to as the Good Places to Learn Program (the "GPL Program") involving urgent and high priority renewal projects at schools of the Board listed in any one or more of: (i) Appendix B of the document entitled "Good Places to Learn: Stage 1 Funding Allocation"; (ii) Appendix C of the document entitled "Good Places to Learn: Stage 2 Funding Allocation"; and (iii) Appendix B of the document entitled "Good Places to Learn: Stage 3 Funding Allocation", some of which projects are described in Schedule "A" attached hereto (individually a "GPL Eligible Project", collectively the "GPL Eligible Projects") and pursuant to Ontario Regulation 85/08, each GPL Eligible Project constitutes a "permanent improvement" as defined in subsection 1(1) of the Education Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.E2, as amended (the "Education Act"). In the event that the Board will borrow the principal amount specified in paragraph 2.1 under this Agreement in respect of a single GPL Eligible Project, the term "GPL Eligible Projects" means that GPL Eligible Project;
- (b) the GPL Eligible Projects are collectively referred to as the "Eligible Projects". In the event that the Board will borrow the principal amount specified in paragraph 2.1 under this Agreement in respect of a single Eligible Project, the term "Eligible Projects" means that Eligible Project. The GPL Program IS referred to as the "Program". In the event that the Board will borrow the principal amount specified in paragraph 2.1 under

this Agreement in respect of a single Program, the term "Program" means that Program;

- (c) the Board has financed the Eligible Projects by way of temporary borrowing from a financial institution or from a reserve account and is entitled to receive grants in respect of the Eligible Projects from the Minister of Education pursuant to various regulations under the *Education Act*, as applicable, for the Board's fiscal year 2008-2009 for the payment of interest;
- (d) the Board has requested and the OFA has agreed to lend the aggregate principal amount specified in paragraph 2.1 to the Board for the purpose of financing the Eligible Projects under the specified Programs on a long-term basis which will include the repayment of temporary borrowing, if any, and the repayment of a reserve account of the Board, if any;
- (e) the Board is authorized to borrow money for permanent improvements from the Ontario Financing Authority by way of a loan pursuant to Ontario Regulation 466/97 and is authorized to receive grants for the repayment of such a loan from the Minister of Education pursuant to Ontario Regulation 85/08; and
- (f) the Board has agreed to enter into this Agreement to evidence its indebtedness and provide for the repayment of the loan to the OFA on the terms and conditions set forth herein.

NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH that in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained in it and subject to the terms and conditions set out in it, the parties agree as follows:

1.0 **DEFINITIONS**

In this Loan Agreement, unless the context or the subject matter otherwise requires:

- (a) "Advance Date" means March 13, 2009;
- (b) "Agreement" means this Agreement as it may be amended or extended from time to time by the parties in writing, including all schedules hereto and any document which the parties may at a future time mutually designate as a schedule to this Agreement, by so marking such document in writing as a schedule hereto and part hereof;

- (d) "business day" means any day that is not a Saturday or Sunday and that, in the City of Toronto, is not a day on which banking institutions are generally authorized or obligated by law or executive order to close;
- (e) "dollars" or "\$" means Canadian dollars;
- (f) "Material Adverse Change" means any change or event which (i) materially impairs the ability of the Board to timely and fully perform its obligations under this Agreement, or (ii) could materially impair the ability of the OFA to enforce its rights and remedies under this Agreement; or (iii) has a material adverse effect on the operations, properties, assets, liabilities or financial condition of the Board;
- (g) "Program" means a program undertaken by the Board that is specified in paragraph 2.1 of this Agreement;
- (h) "Program Principal Amount" means the total principal amount of monies to be advanced to the Board for Eligible Projects undertaken in connection with a Program pursuant to paragraph 2.1 of this Agreement;
- (i) "Rate" means 5.062% per annum, including an administrative fee of 0.05% per annum; and
- (j) "Repayment Date" means March 13, 2034.

2.0 PRINCIPAL AMOUNT

2.1 The OFA agrees to lend to the Board and the Board agrees to borrow from the OFA the respective total principal amount specified below for each of the Programs in lawful money of Canada with interest thereon at the Rate on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement:

- 2.2 The Board acknowledges that the Rate includes an administrative fee payable to the OFA in the amount of 0.05% of the Aggregate Principal Amount outstanding per annum as specified in paragraph 1(i).
- 2.3 Except as otherwise agreed in writing between the Board and the OFA, the monies to be advanced by the OFA shall be advanced by the OFA to the Board by electronic funds transfer directly into the bank account designated by the Board.
- 2.4 The Board authorizes the OFA to open and maintain records evidencing the Board's obligations under this Agreement and to record therein all advances, interest rates, accrued interest, payments of principal and interest and the aggregate principal and accrued interest outstanding from time to time under this Agreement. The Board agrees that the records kept by the OFA, in the absence of manifest error, shall be prima facie evidence of the indebtedness of the Board and the matters recorded provided that the failure of the OFA to record or correctly record any amount or date shall not affect the obligation of the Board to repay the Aggregate Principal Amount and pay accrued interest thereon owing under this Agreement.

3.0 <u>REPAYMENT</u>

- 3.1 The Board agrees to repay the Aggregate Principal Amount together with interest thereon as follows:
 - (i) the Aggregate Principal Amount and interest thereon at the Rate accrued from and including the Advance Date to but excluding the Repayment

Date shall be paid in instalments of combined (blended) principal and interest over a 25 year amortization period on the specified dates set out in the amortization schedules attached to this Agreement as Schedule "B" with the first interest payment on May 15, 2009 and thereafter semi-annual instalments to November 15, 2033 with the final payment on March 13, 2034; and

- (ii) the loan shall be fully repaid on the Repayment Date.
- If the Board fails to make any payment of principal or interest payable by it under this Agreement on the relevant due date, the overdue amount shall bear interest at the Rate (before as well as after judgment) calculated from the due date until the date of actual payment to the OFA.

- Interest, other than interest in respect of the combined (blended) principal and 3.3 interest instalments, shall be computed under this Agreement on the basis of a year of 365 days and the actual number of days elapsed.
- 3.4 If any day on which a payment is due and payable under this Agreement would otherwise fall on a day that is not a business day, such due date shall instead fall on the next succeeding business day.
- Except as otherwise agreed in writing between the Board and the OFA and without affecting the liability of the Board under this Agreement, the monies to be repaid under this Agreement shall be repaid by the Board in immediately available funds to the OFA on the due date by pre-authorized debit from an account of the Board, such account to be designated to the OFA by the execution and delivery of the Payor Pre-Authorized Debit Agreement in a form satisfactory to the OFA ("PAD Agreement") attached to this Agreement as Schedule C, together with such other authorizations, voided cheques and other documentation as the deposittaking institution and the rules of the Canadian Payments Association may require for such pre-authorized debit. The Board undertakes to notify the OFA and the Ministry of Education, immediately and not later than five business days prior to any instalment date or the Repayment Date, in writing of any changes in its designated account for the purposes of the pre-authorized debits and agrees to execute and deliver a revised PAD Agreement.
- 3.6 The Board is not entitled to prepay the Aggregate Principal Amount and accrued interest thereon outstanding under this Agreement except with the prior written consent of the OFA.

4.0 CONDITIONS PRECEDENT

4.1

The obligation of the OFA to advance the Program Principal Amounts pursuant to paragraph 2.1 of this Agreement is subject to the following conditions being met to the OFA's satisfaction on the Advance Date:

- (a) that the representations and warranties of the Board contained in this Agreement continue to be true and correct as at the Advance Date;
- (b) that there shall, in the reasonable opinion of the OFA, have been no Material Adverse Change with respect to the Board;
- (c) that this Agreement shall have been duly executed and delivered; and
- (d) that the OFA shall have received such other documentation in form and substance satisfactory to the OFA which it has reasonably requested to ensure that the Board is in compliance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement including (i) a certified true copy of the necessary by-law authorizing the borrowing of the Program Principal Amounts and the execution of this Agreement, (ii) a favourable legal opinion from external legal counsel to the Board as to due authorization, execution, validity and enforceability of this Agreement and such other matters as the OFA considers necessary or appropriate, and (iii) a certificate or certificates executed by an authorized officer or officers of the Board as to the continued truth and correctness of the representations and warranties, the due authorization and execution of this Agreement and other documents, compliance with the *Education Act* and regulations made thereunder and such other matters as the OFA may reasonably request.

5.0 **REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES OF BOARD**

- 5.1 The Board represents and warrants to the OFA that:
 - (a) the Board is a district school board under the *Education Act*;
 - (b) each Eligible Project has been duly authorized by the Board at a duly called meeting of the Board at which a quorum was present by a resolution or resolutions passed by the Board (the "Resolutions"). In the event that the Board will borrow the Program Principal Amount under this Agreement in respect of a single Eligible Project and the Board has passed a single resolution in respect of the Eligible Project, the term "Resolutions" means that resolution. No application has been made or action brought to quash, set aside or declare invalid the Resolutions nor have the Resolutions been repealed, altered and amended and the

Resolutions are in full force and effect;

- (c) copies of the resolution(s) mentioned in paragraph 5.1(b) have been forwarded to the Capital Programs Branch of the Ministry of Education, if applicable;
- (d) each of the GPL Eligible Projects constitutes an eligible project under the relevant Program and has been undertaken at a school of the Board (which school may constitute a shared facility) or involves the construction of a new school for the Board;
- (e) each Eligible Project constitutes a permanent improvement within the meaning of subsection 1(1) of the *Education Act*; and the Board has obtained all necessary approvals to authorize the carrying out of the Eligible Projects by the Board and the long-term financing thereof;
- (f) the status of each Eligible Project as at August 31, 2008 is accurately set out in paragraph 2.1, the Board has incurred expenditures in respect of the relevant Programs for the Eligible Projects (the "Eligible Expenditures") and the total amount of the Eligible Expenditures in respect of the Eligible Projects undertaken at an individual school of the Board does not exceed the respective aggregate amount of expenditures authorized by the Board in respect of such school of the Board nor does such total amount exceed the expenditures authorized by the Board pursuant to the authorizations referred to in paragraph 5.1(b);
- (g) The Program Principal Amount to be borrowed by the Board under this Agreement in respect of each Program will be borrowed by the Board in respect of the Eligible Projects undertaken by the Board pursuant to that specified Program and will not be borrowed by the Board in respect of any Eligible Projects undertaken pursuant to any other Program;
- (h) the information provided by the Board to the OFA or Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario, to the extent that it relates to the Board or the Eligible Projects is true and correct in all material respects when provided and remains true and correct as of the Advance Date;
- the borrowing of the Aggregate Principal Amount to be advanced under this Agreement and the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement are within the powers and capacities of the Board and have been duly authorized by all necessary legal action and proper proceedings, including a by-law passed by the Board;
- (j) the borrowing of the Aggregate Principal Amount to be advanced under this Agreement, the execution and delivery of this Agreement, and the compliance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement will not

conflict with or result in a breach of any of the terms or provisions of the by-laws of the Board, laws of Ontario, including laws of Canada applicable therein, applicable to the Board or any contractual or other obligation binding on the Board and does not require the consent or approval of any person;

- (k) the Board has not exceeded its updated debt and financial obligation and liability limits calculated in accordance with Ontario Regulation 472/98 under the *Education Act* and has determined that the annual amount payable in respect of the borrowing under this Agreement will not cause the Board to reach or to exceed its updated limits as of the Advance Date;
- (1) this Agreement will, when executed and delivered, constitute a legal, valid and binding obligation of the Board enforceable against it in accordance with its terms;
- (m) the Board is not currently in default under any debentures or other longterm debts of any kind and undertakes to immediately inform the OFA if it is in default under any such long-term financial obligations at any time during the term of this Agreement;
- (n) the obligations of the Board under this Agreement are direct, unsecured and unsubordinated debt obligations and rank concurrently and equally in respect of payment of principal and interest with all other debentures and prescribed debt instruments of the Board, except as to the availability of any sinking fund, retirement fund or other prescribed fund applicable to any issue of debentures or such prescribed debt instruments;
- (o) the Board is not now subject to an order under the *Education Act* vesting in the Ministry of Education control and charge over the administration of the affairs of the Board;
- (p) the Aggregate Principal Amount to be borrowed under this Agreement shall be used only for the Eligible Projects, including the repayment of temporary borrowing for the Eligible Projects from a financial institution, if any, and the repayment of an amount used for the Eligible Projects to a reserve account of the Board, if any, and will not be used for any other purpose except as permitted by the *Education Act* and the regulations made thereunder;
- (q) no litigation or proceedings of any nature are now pending or threatened, attacking or in any way attempting to restrain or enjoin the execution and delivery of this Agreement or in any manner questioning the proceedings and the authority under which this Agreement is authorized, or affecting the validity thereof, or contesting the capacity of the authorized officers of the Board to sign and no authority or proceeding under which the Board is

authorized to execute this Agreement has been repealed, revoked or rescinded in whole or in part; and

- (r) there are no actions, suits or proceedings threatened or pending against the Board in any court except actions, suits or proceedings which would not result in a Material Adverse Change if determined against the Board.
- 5.2 The representations and warranties set out in paragraph 5.1 herein shall survive the execution and delivery of this Agreement, notwithstanding any investigations or examinations which may be made by counsel for the OFA.
- 5.3 For greater certainty, the OFA is not responsible for ensuring that the proceeds advanced to the Board are in fact used in the manner specified in paragraph 5.1(p).

6.0 <u>COVENANTS</u>

- 6.1 The Board will duly and punctually pay or cause to be paid all principal, interest, fees and other amounts payable by it under this Agreement in accordance with the terms and subject to the conditions of this Agreement.
- 6.2 The Board will provide prompt notice to the OFA of the occurrence of any Event of Default, as hereinafter defined, or Material Adverse Change.
- 6.3 The Board will comply at all times with all of the Board's obligations in respect of the debt and financial obligation and liability limits applicable to it under the *Education Act* and the regulations made thereunder.
- 6.4 The Board shall allocate all grants received by it from the Ministry of Education relating to Eligible Expenditures in respect of the Eligible Projects in accordance with the applicable legislation and shall apply such grants to the payment of its obligations under this Agreement.
- 6.5 The Board will obtain all licences, permits, consents, approvals and other authorizations which are necessary or desirable to carry out the Eligible Projects.
- 6.6 The Board will provide to the Ministry of Education reports respecting the status of the Eligible Projects as requested from time to time.

7.0 <u>DEFAULT</u>

7.1 Failure by the Board to pay any principal, interest, fees or other amount payable by it under this Agreement, unless such default is cured within three business days after the date such payment was due, shall constitute an event of default (each, an "Event of Default") and each Event of Default shall be deemed to exist and continue so long as it shall not have been remedied.

8.0 INTERCEPT AND REMEDIES ON THE OCCURRENCE OF DEFAULT

- 10 -

- (a) The Board agrees that the Minister of Finance is entitled to deduct from monies appropriated by the Legislature for payment to the Board amounts equal to any amounts that the Board fails to pay under this Agreement. On the occurrence of an Event of Default, the Minister of Finance and such other Minister of the Crown as appropriate is irrevocably authorized to deduct from money appropriated by the Legislature for payment to the Board amounts equal to any amounts that the Board fails to pay to the OFA in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement and to pay such amounts directly to the OFA (the "Intercept").
 - (b) The Board agrees that any notice from the OFA to the Minister of Finance in relation to this paragraph may be relied upon by such Minister without further inquiry or verification by such Minister and, upon receipt of such notice, an amount equal to the amount that the Board fails to pay to the OFA shall be deducted from money appropriated by the Legislature for payment to the Board and paid to the OFA.
- 8.2 On the occurrence of any Event of Default and at any time thereafter, so long as the same shall be continuing, the OFA may, in addition to any other remedy available to the OFA at law, at its option, by notice to the Board, invoke the Intercept mechanism to require payment of any amount due and payable under this Agreement.
- 8.3 No delay or omission of the OFA to exercise any right or remedy accruing upon any Event of Default shall impair any such right or remedy or constitute a waiver of any such Event of Default or an acquiescence therein. Every right and remedy given by this Agreement or by law to the OFA may be exercised from time to time, and as often as may be deemed expedient by the OFA.
- 8.4 No right or remedy herein conferred upon or reserved to the OFA is intended to be exclusive of any other such right or remedy, and every such right and remedy shall, to the extent permitted by law, be cumulative and in addition to every other right and remedy given hereunder or now or hereafter existing at law or in equity or otherwise. The assertion or employment of any right or remedy hereunder, or otherwise, shall not prevent the concurrent assertion or employment of any other appropriate right or remedy.

9.0 ADMISSIBILITY OF EVIDENCE

9.1 Where communications between the parties are provided on an electronic basis under this Agreement, printouts or other tangible reproductions of any electronic record maintained by a party in relation to such communications shall be considered business records in any legal, administrative or other proceedings that may arise in relation to this Agreement.

10.0 INTEREST ACT DISCLOSURE

10.1 For the purposes of disclosure pursuant to the *Interest Act* (Canada), the yearly rate of interest to which any rate of interest payable under this Agreement that is calculated on any basis other than a full calendar year is equivalent may be determined by multiplying such rate by a fraction, the numerator of which is the actual number of days in the calendar year in which such yearly rate of interest is to be ascertained and the denominator of which is the number of days comprising such other basis.

11.0 <u>NOTICES</u>

12.0 <u>GENERAL</u>

- 12.1 This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of Ontario and the laws of Canada applicable therein.
- 12.2 This Agreement shall be binding on and enure to the benefit of the OFA, and the Board and their respective successors and permitted assigns, except that the Board shall not, without the prior written consent of the OFA assign, pledge or hypothecate any rights or obligations with respect to this Agreement.
- 12.3 If any of the provisions of this Agreement are held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a court or tribunal of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.
- 12.4 A party, by waiving the breach of any provision of this Agreement, does not waive any further breach of the same provision or any breach of any other provision of this Agreement. A waiver is binding on the waiving party only if it is in writing.
- 12.5 Subject to the provisions herein, this Agreement may not be altered or amended, except by the mutual agreement of the parties evidenced in writing.
- 12.6 Time shall in all respects be of the essence of this Agreement.
- 12.7 All references to time in this Agreement are references to Toronto time, unless otherwise indicated.
- 12.8 If any date on which an act is required to be taken under this Agreement is not a business day, such act shall be taken on the next following business day.





Discussion Guide 1:

Modernizing the *Education Act*

Key considerations:

- Legislation is outdated in regard to the duties and powers of school boards and does not address expectations for educational outcomes.
- There is a lack of clarity with regard to the roles of school boards, chairs, individual board members, and directors of education.
- While the legislation identifies and gives powers to a school board as one entity, some individual board members deal directly with supervisory officers and/or other staff members.
- A number of other provinces and boards have recently modernized the governance of their elementary/secondary sector. British Columbia, for example, requires boards to submit an achievement contract annually to the Minister of Education. In Québec, school boards must adopt and make public a strategic plan that includes ways of assessing the achievement of objectives.
- The Director of Education has a significant impact on a board's performance. However, conflicts may arise for a Director from differences between the policy objectives of the board and directives from the Ministry.
- Some have suggested that Directors of Education should have a dual accountability—to the board and to the Minister, as was the case in the past in Ontario.

Discussion guide 1:

- 1) For what should school boards be accountable?
 - student achievement
 - developing discerning believers formed in the Catholic community
 - ensuring that the Boards mission statement is actioned
 - establish policy
 - holding Director of Education accountable for the implementation of local and provincial education policy
 - oversee the Director of Education to ensure effective and efficient operation of the Board and the implementation of the provincial education agenda
 - represent the beliefs and values of our collective communities

- 2) What are the appropriate roles and responsibilities of:
 - a) the board?
 - macro management of the initiatives of the Board
 - addressing the needs of individual communities while balancing the overall interests of the broader communities
 - appointing and holding accountable and supporting the Director of Education who is an authentic Catholic leader in implementing the vision for the Board while delivering the provincial education mandates
 - providing governance and policy inspired by the Catholic faith
 - being open and available to be sounding boards for members of the community.
 - to establish and monitor priorities of the Board
 - b) the Chair?
 - Chair effective meetings
 - with Director of Education be the spokesperson of the Board
 - with Director of Education set Board meeting agendas
 - provide leadership and be a Catholic model for all Trustees
 - c) individual trustees?
 - represent the entire Board
 - make decisions in the best interest of the entire Board while representing individual communities
 - recognizing that each individual trustee has no decision making authority, yet collectively realizing their legal responsibilities as a Board as a decision making body
 - Catholic role models for their communities and the system as a whole
 - advocate for publicly funded Catholic education
 - follow all Board policies and procedures
 - d) the Director of Education?
 - hold staff accountable for student achievement
 - as CEO of the Board the connection between the Board and staff
 - be an exemplary role model for all Catholic educators in the Board
 - provide honest and forthright leadership for the interest of the students
 - delegate trust and authority to subordinates
 - responsible for implementing the Education Act, MOE Policy and Board Policy
 - responsible for the day to day operation of the Board
 - providing clear and relevant information to facilitate the Board making informed decisions
 - representing the best interests of the Board in the media and in the broader community
 - link and liaison with community partners such as the Diocese, coterminous Boards and various levels of government
 - effective communication with the Chair, Vice-Chair and all Trustees
- 3) Should Directors of Education have a dual reporting relationship to the board and to the Minister as was the case not long ago in Ontario? If so, how should any conflicts between the mandates from the Minister and a school board be resolved?
 - currently Director of Educations have dual reporting responsibilities for accountability
 - mediation process through independent body as established in consultation with MOE, Boards, associations
 - Boards cannot supersede the authority of the Education Act / Regulations

Discussion Guide 2: Identifying Effective Governance Practices

Key considerations:

- Effective governance is essential for school boards as public bodies responsible to their communities and to government.
- A number of boards have made significant changes in their governance models and practices in recent years, but there remains a need for sector wide discussion about what constitutes effective governance and relevant indicators of effectiveness.
- Transparency, accountability and public confidence are enhanced by some boards through clear public communication (such as posting board meeting minutes on their websites in a timely fashion, communicating procedures and opportunities for public presentations, and communicating effectively with the broader community).
- Many jurisdictions have focused on the need for an enforceable Code of Ethics and/or Code of Conduct for school board members. Boards in Québec, for example, are required under legislation to establish a Code of Ethics and to designate persons who will enforce the code. Legislation also requires boards to publish their code of ethics policy in their annual report, state the number of cases dealt with, the breaches of the policy and the penalties imposed. Nova Scotia has recently passed legislation that will require boards to adopt a standardized, enforceable code of ethics as well as procedural by-laws for the conduct of meetings. In August 2008, the Halifax Regional School Board released a discussion paper entitled "Good Governance" in order to gather public input and inform the next elected board about public expectations in this regard. Legislation in Newfoundland & Labrador, Saskatchewan, and Alberta includes provisions for the removal of individual board members for specified conduct or breaches of duty.
- A number of education experts propose that in order to be effective and function well, school boards must focus on student achievement and have few distractions from that primary focus.

Discussion guide 2:

- 1) What is effective governance by elected school boards?
 - establishing clear By-Laws that guide the actions of the Board
 - to establish clear and effective policies that guide the actions of the Director of Education
 - focus on student achievement, oversight and accountability
 - the primary role as elected Trustee officials is to be accountable first and foremost to students and the local electorate / community
- 2) What would enhance the ability of boards to address local needs within the context of provincially mandated priorities?
 - provide a local priority funding model
 - enhance relationship and financial partnering between all Ministry's to support local educational initiatives and issues related to student achievement

- 3) What governance practices have you seen that work well?
 - utilize the Carver model
 - clearly defined roles and responsibilities at the Senior Staff level
 - respect an understanding for the various roles within a Board
 - self evaluation of a Board's responsibilities
 - information workshops for Trustees
 - frequent review of by-laws, policies and administrative guidelines
 - comprehensive annual performance review of the Director of Education
- 4) What practices and policies support effective governance?
 - access to the appropriate information to make timely and effective decisions
 - access to the resources of Senior Staff
 - Policy on Complaint Procedures leads to effective governance
- 5) Should there be a provincial code of conduct/ethics for school board members or should such a code be developed locally? How should codes of conduct/ethics be enforced?
 - provide a provincial code of conduct with the ability to augment for local Catholic Trustees to conduct socially, morally respecting the integrity and individuality of the collective Board
 - conflict of interest that speaks to the role of Trustees rather than within a municipal framework
- 6) Should boards be required to establish and implement specific policies and procedures to enhance good governance? What would these be?
 - Yes specific policies
 - Director of Education, as the CEO, with full authority to implement Board policy to ensure compliance
 - Board monitors implementation, not directs implementation

Key considerations:

- In *Energizing Ontario Education*, the government committed to ensuring that board members have the supports they need to make sound decisions to further student achievement, reduce gaps in achievement, and increase confidence in publicly funded education.
- Although trustee organizations and some individual school boards provide professional development for trustees, participation is generally voluntary. Some board members or chairs report that they feel ill-equipped to act effectively and are unclear about their roles and responsibilities.
- While supports are available to help board members develop their capacities there is no consistent, long-term graduated approach to board capacity-building.
- A number of U.S. states have mandatory training programs for school trustees (e.g. Kentucky, South Carolina, and New York). Other public sectors have modernized board capacity building; The Ontario Hospitals Association, for example, has established a Governance Centre of Excellence and offers certificate courses to board members appropriate to their level of experience.

Discussion guide 3:

1) What type of training might be offered to school board members?

- a one or two day course at the beginning of each term should be offered by OCSTA with Ministry content. Could include overview of education on Ontario, meeting procedures / Roberts rules of order etc., budget process, who's-who, code of conduct, legal responsibilities, etc. etc.

- local Boards should follow this up with a one day course that covers an overview of the local board, current policies, staff overview, facilities overview, etc.

- the Ministry should support a training program at the start of each elected term which should be offered in conjunction with OCSTA and should cover a broad range of topics including the provincial budget process and curriculum expectations. This training could be offered in a conference/ workshop setting held over the course of a few days.

2) Should training be mandatory?

- Yes. A few days invested at the beginning of each term would ensure all trustees start with an equal understanding, would save much board staff time as trustees "learn as they go" and would also provide team building opportunities.

- Training is necessary to ensure that each Trustee has at least a general understanding of the role he /she plays and it would also serve to expedite the meetings in a quicker fashion as the learning curve for new trustees would hopefully be lessened.

- 3) What type of ongoing support can be offered to enable board members and Chairs to continue to build the capacity of elected boards? How could this support be delivered?
 - other seminars and training can be offered thru provincial associations (OCSTA) much like what is currently done.
 - through OCSTA and the ministry ongoing workshops of particular relevance to an issue should be made available to all trustees.
- 4) What supports should be offered to Directors of Education to assist the in providing effective leadership for governance functions?

- Director of Education must receive the same training as Trustees

- Director of Education requires in-service on new approaches to governance and reporting

Discussion Guide 4:

Strengthening School Board Accountability

Key considerations:

- The current legislative framework is not specific about school boards' mandate in relation to the government's three key priorities: improving student outcomes, closing gaps in achievement, and increasing confidence in our publicly funded education system.
- While the government has goals concerning student achievement, the "standards" to which boards should be held accountable have not been discussed. Legislation (Section 11.1 of the *Act*) provides the government with the ability to set standards by regulation, and the Minister with authority to intervene if there is evidence those standards are not being achieved. As yet, no regulations have been made regarding what those standards would be, what circumstances would trigger government intervention or in what stages.

Discussion guide 4:

- 1) To what standards should boards be held accountable in the areas of literacy and numeracy, and graduation rates?
 - there are already many accountabilities in place. Trustees only need to hold the Director of Education accountable to ensure they are met.
 - difficult to answer the remaining questions for a Board that is performing well as Boards are already held accountable.
 - Boards are already held accountable in these areas and the Director of Education is primarily responsible for ensuring the Board standards are upheld.
- 2) What other student outcomes and implementation measures should be specified in regulation in order to ensure quality of education?
 - all provincially mandated priorities
 - goals / strategic plans in place to specifically address strategies to reach goals
 - focus on student achievement
- 3) How should school boards demonstrate accountability for student outcomes?
 - annual reporting to communities
 - revised Director's Annual report a step forward
 - feedback from Parent Involvement Committee and Catholic School Councils

- 4) Should the Minister intervene if a board is systematically underperforming and failing to meet a provincial standard? At what points and in what manner should intervention occur? What stages should be involved and what supports should be made available to a board in such a situation?
 - the government has a role to play with respect to intervention should the results of a board prove to be glaringly below provincial standards however I would hope that preventative measures would have been implemented long before the Ministry needed to step in.
 - examination of best practices in other boards should be used to assist boards that are not meeting Ministry objectives.
- 5) Are there mitigating factors that should be considered in contexts where standards are not met?
 - demographics of a particular area would need to be examined as they can play a role in levels of achievement

St. Kevin Student Takes The Helm: Extends Recess, Cancels Homework, All For Kids Helping Kids



Greg Foran, a Grade 8 student St. Kevin Catholic Elementary School, became Principal for a Day, February 9, as the winner of a draw held in support of the 11th annual Kids Helping Kids campaign, which took place at Niagara Catholic schools February 9-12. To date, Niagara Catholic's Kids Helping Kids Campaigns have raised more than \$410,000 for the Niagara Peninsula Children's Centre, which helps about 3,000 students each year with communicative problems.

Proposed School Year Calendar 2009-2010

Parents, guardians, teachers and students may have a new experience at the end of August and the first week in September 2009.

Between September 1, 2009 and June 30, 2010, there are a possible 196 school days. However, with Labour Day falling on September 8, the number of possible school days is reduced to 192.

The Ministry of Education requires a school year to include a minimum of 194 days, including two professional activity days dedicated to provincial educational priorities and four which focus on the Board's priorities. As well, a maximum of ten instructional days must be set aside for secondary school examinations.

The 2009-2010 School Year Calendar Committee met in January to review options to ensure students receive the required amount of instructional time in the new school year.

Although a final decision on how the 2009-2010 school year will look has yet to be determined, there is the potential that the 2009-2010 school year may start earlier than usual, prior to Labour Day. A number of possible options are currently being discussed.

The School Year Calendar Committee will meet again on February 19 to review feedback received on the draft calendar from stakeholders across Niagara Catholic.

The Ministry of Education requires all Boards in Ontario to submit Board-approved modified school year calendars by March 1, 2009. The 2009-2010 School Year Calendar, once approved, will be posted at www.niagaracatholic.ca and communicated to all families.
