We can only hope to emulate the excellent standard and the name, which preceded us.

The following is a brief outline of our school:

- Grades in the school: JK 8 and a Reading Recovery Program (.5)
- Total Enrolment: 460 as of September 2008
- Our school facilities include a shared gymnasium, computer lab and a shared library. While we have our own full sized gym, we have the option of utilizing a double gym for special events and performances.
- We are handicapped accessible and the school has two elevators one leading to the second floor and one to the stage in the gym.
- In addition to the principal, we have a teaching staff of 19 including 3 French teachers, 2 Educational Resource Teachers and a English as a Second Language Teacher. We are fortunate to have a teacher assigned to the Reading Recovery Program. Our staff complement also includes a secretary, ten and half educational assistants, a library technician, and 1 part-time Child and Youth Worker. We also have an Itinerant Music Teacher who runs the instrumental music program & she is at our school 3 days out of a 5 day cycle.
- Roots of Empathy & Learning Through the Arts Programs.

What We Stand for

The Loretto School community is committed to the notion of helping persons less fortunate than ourselves and promoting worthwhile causes. To this end, we will participate in the following endeavours:

- Food Drives for Project Share at Thanksgiving and Easter
- Canadian Tire Coupon Drive to purchase toys, gifts and games for children at Christmas time
- Soliciting donations for the needy
- Support of the Niagara Peninsula Children's Centre through the "Kids Helping Kids" campaign.
- Sending gift boxes to Third World countries at Christmas.
- Volunteer on a weekly basis at the local community kitchen.
- Raising funds for various causes including: Terry Fox Foundation, the Holy Childhood Association, Wells of Hope, The United Way, the Niagara Peninsula Children's Centre and the Alzheimer's Society.

In May and June of 2009, the EQAO Primary and Junior Assessments of Reading, Writing and Mathematics were administered. The results of these provincial assessments were released in September 2009. Students who have achieved a Level 3 or 4 on an EQAO Assessment have achieved the Provincial Standard as established by the Ontario Government.

The Niagara Catholic District School Board is celebrating the achievement of students in Grades 3 and 6 for exceeding the provincial averages in the EQAO Assessments of Reading, Writing and Mathematics. Our commitment to quality Catholic Education, and to the achievement of each individual child, has been demonstrated by the participation of 99% of all Grade 3 and Grade 6 students in the EQAO Primary and Junior Assessments.

The Niagara Catholic District School Board continues to facilitate Student Achievement on the EQAO Assessments through the dedicated and coordinated efforts of its staff through continuous School and Board Improvement Planning initiatives.

EQAO Background Information

The Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) tests students' skills in reading, writing and mathematics at key points in their elementary-school education. Students are tested twice:

- at the end of Grade 3, to assess what they've learned throughout the Primary Division (Grades 1–3)
- at the end of Grade 6, to assess what they've learned throughout the Junior Division (Grades 4–6).

Why does Ontario conduct province-wide tests of reading, writing and mathematics? In 1995, Ontario's Royal Commission on Learning recommended such tests for Ontario students. The Commission made this recommendation after consulting with parents, educators, students and others who wanted greater accountability and assurances of quality in the publicly funded education system.


What do EQAO results tell me about my child?


EQAO test results provide a snapshot of your child's achievement in relation to the provincial standard. Students meeting or exceeding the standard (Levels 3 and 4) have demonstrated most or all of the required reading, writing and mathematics knowledge and skills expected at this stage in their education. However, no single test can offer a complete or definitive picture of what your child has learned. In the end, no one better understands the true measure of your child's abilities and knowledge—or is in a better position to assess them—than his or her classroom teacher. When used together, the results of EQAO and classroom tests provide a more complete picture of your child's knowledge.



EQAO Primary Assessments of Reading, Writing and Mathematics Results



VISION 2020 STRATEGIC PLAN FACILITATOR SELECTION

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In the fall of 2008, the Director of Education presented to the Board a four stage strategy to design an inaugural strategic plan for the Niagara Catholic District School Board. Entitled "Niagara Catholic Vision 2020 Strategic Plan", the four stages and timelines encompass the following;

- ✓ Stage 1 Niagara Catholic Staff Consultation September 2008 to May 2009
- ✓ Stage 2 Data Analysis April 2009 to August 2009
- ✓ Stage 3 Strategic Plan Development September 2009 to Spring 2010
- ✓ Stage 4 Vision 2020 Strategic Plan Implementation Spring 2010 to Spring 2020

Regular updates and feedback were provided to Trustees throughout the first two stages of the design. In June 2009, Trustees approved the request for proposal process to select a facilitator for Stage 3 of the design of the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan and funding was approved in the 2009-2010 Niagara Catholic Annual Budget.

Throughout the spring of 2009, the Director of Education continued his consultation with various individuals seeking recommendations for companies with prior experience facilitating the design of strategic plans with Catholic organizations. Over the summer of 2009, the Director contacted the recommended companies and dialogued, either in person or through telephone conversations, extending an invitation to present a request for proposal to Senior Staff to facilitate the design of Niagara Catholic's Vision 2020 Strategic Plan.

While all companies congratulated Niagara Catholic for designing a strategic plan, the process and the invitation to participate, some of the companies had prior commitments which negated their availability to facilitate or present a proposal. Four companies, however, did accept the invitation to present a request for proposal, three on August 31st, 2009 and one on September 14th, 2009.

Following the four presentations, Senior Staff discussed each presentation according to a predesigned appraisal format. While each company presented unique processes in facilitating the design of a strategic plan, the recommendation of Senior Staff is Maria Sanchez-Keane of the Centre for Organizational Effectiveness. The projected cost to facilitate Niagara Catholic's strategic plan is \$20,000 to \$30,000 as approved in the 2009-2010 Annual Board Budget.

With the confirmation of the selected firm, a contract will be signed which will specify the timelines and process to facilitate the design of a strategic plan for our Board.

If the timelines and the process are achieved, a Niagara Catholic Vision 2020 Strategic Plan will be presented to the Committee of the Whole in the spring of 2010.

H1N1 Flu Virus School and Child Care Staff

This year is a different flu season. In the fall and winter there will be two types of flu viruses circulating – seasonal flu viruses and the new H1N1 flu virus.

Children are at high risk for catching and passing on respiratory viruses, and depending on their age, many are not able to follow hygiene practices (washing hands, covering their cough). The school/child care setting may make the spread of such viruses easier due to the number of children close together.

As another school year has begun, Niagara Region Public Health (NRPH) would like to slow the spread of germs in schools and child care facilities.

The majority of confirmed H1N1 flu virus cases in Niagara to date have been mild, and only a few individuals required hospitalization. Niagara Region Public Health recommends the following basic steps to reduce the spread of the virus.

Monitoring for flu-like symptoms

- When children and/or staff show flu-like symptoms of fever and cough plus one or more of the following: sore throat, muscle aches, tiredness, headache, and possibly vomiting or diarrhea, they should stay home and not attend school or other events until the fever is gone for 24 hours, without the use of fever-reducing medication.
- Children or staff that become ill during the day should be sent home. If it is not possible to send the individual home, he or she should be separated from other students/staff.

Reporting absenteeism

- Elementary and high schools are asked to report daily student absenteeism numbers to NRPH through our online form. This allows us to track flu activity in our community. The online form can be found on our website at:

 http://www.niagararegion.ca/living/health_wellness/professionals/school-absenteeism-surveillance-program.aspx. We ask that you bookmark this page for ongoing convenience. As well, the online form can be found on the A-Z index of the Niagara Region website under 'A' for 'absenteeism school reporting' OR 'S' for 'school absenteeism reporting'.
- Child care facilities are asked to report higher than usual absenteeism to NRPH by calling 905-688-8248 or toll free 1-888-505-6074 ext. 7330.

Prevention

Children and adults working with children can take these simple steps to help reduce the spread of illness:

- 1. **Wash your hands:** Encourage regular hand cleaning with either soap and water for at least 15 seconds, or an alcohol-based hand rub and rub until hands are dry. Be sure to set a good example by doing this yourself. Supervise children when they are using an alcohol-based hand rub.
- 2. Stay home if you are ill.

- 3. **Cough or sneeze into your sleeve:** Encourage children to cover their mouth and nose with a tissue when they cough or sneeze, or cough or sneeze into the upper sleeve, NOT the hands.
- 4. Plan ahead to ensure enough soap and/or alcohol-based hand rub is available within the school/child care facility.
- 5. Avoid close contact with ill people.
- 6. Discourage touching the eyes, nose or mouth, as germs spread this way.

Cleaning premises

Please ensure that all areas and items that are more likely to have frequent hand contact such as desks, tables, change tables, toys, bathrooms, railings, computer keyboards, sports equipment, working surfaces and various personal items are cleaned. Use the cleaning agents that are usually used. It is not necessary to conduct disinfection of the above mentioned surfaces beyond routine cleaning. Frequently Asked Questions for Staff:

Will schools and child care centres be closed to help stop the spread of the H1N1 flu virus?

At this stage, there is no plan to close schools or child care centre as a control measure for the H1N1 flu virus. If this recommendation changes, NRPH will notify schools/child care centres and parents, and work closely together with the administrators of the school/child care centre.

Will Public Health inform us if there is a case of H1N1 flu virus in our school or child care centre?

No. At this time, NRPH does not plan on informing schools, school boards or child care centres if there is a case(s) of H1N1 flu virus in their school or child care centre. As with seasonal flu, once the virus is present in the area it can be acquired anywhere in the community. Therefore, reporting cases in individual schools or child care centres is not necessary. The best way people can protect themselves from seasonal and H1N1 flu is to be diligent about taking infection control precautions such as washing their hands, covering their cough, and staying home when sick. As with seasonal flu, schools will be reporting absenteeism rates to NRPH and NRPH will respond to outbreaks as necessary.

Ontario Announces Flu Shot Rollout For Seasonal And H1N1 Vaccines

September 24, 2009

Ontario will provide seasonal flu shots to people aged 65 and over and residents of long-term care homes in October, followed by the H1N1 flu vaccination program for all Ontarians. Seasonal flu vaccine will be available to the rest of the province following the H1N1 flu vaccination program.

Evidence shows the H1N1 flu virus will be the main flu strain in circulation this fall in Ontario. It is important to protect those most at risk for complications from catching the flu this year. Seniors are most at risk for complications from seasonal flu while younger people are more at risk for complications from H1N1 flu.

By targeting those most at risk for complications from either of the flu strains, the province is effectively delivering the vaccine people need most to stay healthy and reduce the spread of flu.

Some studies in Canada show a potential association between prior seasonal flu vaccination and the risk of getting an infection with the H1N1 virus. Ontario is taking a cautious approach and is phasing in two flu vaccine programs:

- In October, the seasonal flu vaccine will be offered to Ontarians 65 years and over and residents of long-term care homes
- · H1N1 vaccine will be offered to the general population in November
- The universal seasonal influenza immunization program will be offered to all other residents six months of age and older.

REPORT TO THE BOARD MEETING SEPTEMBER 29, 2009

EDUCATION QUALITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY OFFICE (EQAO) PRIMARY AND JUNIOR PROVINCIAL ASSESSMENTS OF READING, WRITING AND MATHEMATICS AND GRADE 9 ASSESSMENT OF MATHEMATICS, 2008-2009

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On September 17th, 2009 Ontario's Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) released the school and Board level results of the 2008-2009 Assessments of Reading, Writing and Mathematics, Primary Division (Grades 1 to 3) and Junior Division (Grades 4 to 6), and the Grade 9 Assessment of Mathematics. The provincial level results show a steady improvement over the past five years with specific increases in Grade 6 Reading and Grade 9 Applied Mathematics.

The school and Board level results of the 2008-2009 Assessments enable the Catholic Elementary and Secondary Schools in the Niagara Catholic District School Board to review the progress of their students and the progress of Ontario schools. In addition, the analysis of school and Board level results of student achievement from the provincial assessments, as one form of data, allows parents, teachers, school administrators and Board staff to work collaboratively to improve student achievement in the Niagara Catholic District School Board.

As stated by Marguerite Jackson, EQAO's Chief Executive Officer, "The true value emerges when the information is thoroughly integrated into planning at the local levels to support effective teaching and learning. While EQAO is only one part of the assessment picture, it is an important one and ultimately, it is the student that is at the centre of this picture," (www.eqao.com).

The Catholic Elementary and Secondary schools in the Niagara Catholic District School Board continue to celebrate student success on provincial assessments. Through ongoing Board and School Improvement Planning initiatives, along with Board, school, and classroom curriculum based assessments, Principals, Vice-Principals, teaching and support staff, work cooperatively with the Student Achievement and the Research, Assessment and Evaluation Departments to ensure that the needs of each student in the Niagara Catholic District are being met in the classroom.

School Improvement Planning at the school level with School Teams led by the Principal of the school will continue focusing on the Niagara Catholic District School Board's System Priorities and each school's Smart Goals for 2009-2010. The focus on the improvement of student achievement for all students is captured in the System Priority of: "Improving Student Achievement" with the following indicators:

- To reduce the gap in student achievement by focusing on increasing Niagara Catholic's "16 by 16" achievement 3% and the Board graduation rate an average of 2% by June 2010.
- To improve student achievement by focusing on increasing Niagara Catholic's EQAO scores and the OSSLT achievement average of 2% by June 2010.
- To develop a Niagara Catholic Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting K-12 Document that will complement and comply with the Ministry of Education Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting Policy by June 2010.
- To sustain literacy and numeracy initiatives and implement programs to improve student achievement and pathway success, Kindergarten to Graduation, as outlined in Board and School Improvement Plans.

This report to the Board on EQAO Primary and Junior Assessments and the Grade 9 Mathematics Assessment provides the following information about achievement of students at or above the Provincial Standard (Levels 3 and 4):

- **Primary:** Grade 3 Highlights in Reading, Writing and Mathematics, 2007-2008, 2008-2009, and over five years from 2004-2009.
- **Junior:** Grade 6 Highlights in Reading, Writing and Mathematics, 2007-2008, 2008-2009 and over five years from 2004-2009.
- **Grade 9 Mathematics Highlights:** Applied and Academic Programs, 2007-2008, 2008-2009 and over five years from 2004-2009.
- Exemption Rates for Primary and Junior Assessments and Grade 9 Mathematics: Applied and Academic.
- Gender Analysis.

The focus on the improvement of student achievement will continue by tracking the progress of student cohorts with the Grade 3 results in 2006 and the Junior Assessment in 2009. Schools will also review the results of students on the Mathematics component from the Junior Assessment of 2006 and the results on the Grade 9 Assessment of Mathematics in 2009. This tracking will assist classroom teachers with program planning and assessment strategies based on the individual learning needs of students.

Students who participated in the provincial assessments will be receiving an Individual Student Report (ISR) indicating achievement in relation to the Provincial Standard. The ISR for students who wrote the Junior Assessment will also show their results from the Primary Assessment in 2006. The Individual Student Reports provide parents/guardians with a summary of School, Board and Provincial results. Classroom teachers will also be reviewing Individual Student Reports to support the improvement of student achievement in their classrooms. The Research, Assessment and Evaluation Department will be updating the Catholic School Profiles for each school to distribute to parents, Catholic School Councils and staff. The Catholic School Profiles contain the Provincial, Board and School results and reflect specific priorities for the improvement of student achievement at the school and Board level.

Finally, the Research, Assessment and Evaluation Department will continue to analyze the results of the EQAO Primary and Junior Assessments in Reading, Writing and Mathematics, and the Grade 9 Applied and Academic Mathematics Assessment for contextual information in the areas of gender, language, and special needs, in order to support the improvement of student achievement for all students in the Niagara Catholic District School Board.

Dear Mr. Crocco and Board of Trustees:

This month, Carousel Players has been recognized for its 2009 Niagara Artists in the Classroom program with a City of St. Catharines Trillium Award for "Innovation in the Arts."

We want to convey our special thanks to consultant Jayne Evans from the Niagara Catholic District School Board for the role she has played in supporting the Niagara Artists in the Classroom program since its inception in 2007, and in helping to improve and expand its delivery in NCDSB schools.

Through the 2007 Niagara Artist in the Classroom program, eight Niagara artists visited over 217 classrooms, reaching 5,425 children in 27 Niagara schools (NCDSB & DSBN) in Beamsville, Fenwick, Fonthill, Grimsby, Niagara Falls, Port Colborne, Queenston, St. Catharines, Smithville, Stevensville, Thorold, Wainfleet and Welland.

Aggressive fundraising by Carousel Players allowed us to reach a \$30,000 goal to deliver an expanded program in 2008. In that year, we worked with a roster of 16 Niagara artists to deliver 517 workshops in 68 schools for 11,704 children in April, May, September, and October over a period of 50 days.

Jayne's leadership in our educational community helps Carousel Players maintain a partnership with NCDSB schools to present plays and teacher-artist workshops that entertain, challenge, and inspire creativity in young audiences. Attached are highlights from our 2009-10 season. If we reach our funding goal, we will once again offer Niagara Artists in the Classroom workshops that link to our two touring productions. We look forward to another great year with NCDSB.

Director rolls out goals for 2009-10 school year

Niagara Catholic Director of Education John Crocco laid out plans for the 2009-2010 school year during the first Committee of the Whole meeting of the new school year.

Mr. Crocco began his presentation by congratulating new Principals at Niagara Catholic, and announcing new staff appointments at the Catholic Education Centre.

Mr. Crocco spoke about the promises presented by new opportunities. In particular, he identified continued growth in faith formation and student achievement.

Guiding these opportunities is the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan. Mr. Crocco presented Senior Staff's recommendation for a facilitator to guide the process. It is anticipated the Board will select the facilitator during the September 29 meeting.

Key objectives for the 2009-2010 school year include:

- Reducing the gap in student achievement through the "16 by 16" (16 credits by age 16) initiative and;
- Increasing student improvement on EQAO and OSSLT testing and high school graduation rates by 2 per cent by June.

Niagara Catholic initiatives are fully aligned with the Ministry's student achievement objectives.

Promoting our distinctive Catholic education is also a priority this year, as we launch a "Distinguished Alumni" campaign. In addition to mainstream media, we will also reach out to our Niagara Catholic family and the Niagara community through social networking such as Facebook and Twitter.

School Construction Projects Well Under Way



This summer, construction projects began at St. Joseph and Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Elementary Schools in Grimsby and Cardinal Newman Catholic Elementary School in Niagara Falls. Excavation for the foundation is nearly completed at St. Joseph while the foundation and footings at Our Lady of Fatima is now finished. Interior alterations were completed at Cardinal Newman, as was the bus loop. Most of the construction will take place at all three schools throughout the year and will be completed by the start of the 2010-2011 school year. Blessed Trinity Catholic Secondary School in Grimsby and Our Lady of Victory School Catholic Elementary School in Fort Erie will also get much-needed additions. Our Lady of Victory's two schools will be merged into one by January, 2011, while Blessed Trinity will receive a 23-classroom addition in time for the 2011-2012 school year.

Annual Accessibility Report Presented at Meeting

In compliance with the Ontarians with Disabilities Act, Niagara Catholic's Accessibility Working Group has prepared its seventh annual accessibility plan.

Niagara Catholic's Accessibility Working Group is comprised of staff, administrators, Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) members and community members. The goal of the group is to monitor and improve the objectives of Niagara Catholic's Annual Accessibility Plan.

The 2009-2010 plan focuses on removing barriers from education and Niagara Catholic facilities. By 2015, all Niagara Catholic facilities will be fully accessible to people with physical disabilities and sensory rooms will be installed in all Niagara Catholic schools.

To eliminate challenges for people with communicative disabilities, additional lighting will be installed at entrances to buildings and classrooms will be wired for communication devices.

Niagara Catholic has ongoing professional development opportunities to assist staff in understanding ways to effectively communicate with people who live with disabilities. At the classroom level, teachers provide peer awareness counselling to students who have classmates with special needs. Through this counselling, students learn how to better understand and to help their classmates.

Current Niagara Catholic Policies, Practices and Protocols are also under review to ensure that they are inclusive toward individuals with disabilities.



- + Congratulations to the staff and students at St. Patrick Catholic Elementary School in Port Colborne. They have started the new school year on a positive note by declaring St. Patrick a "Complaint Free World." Students and staff wear purple wrist bands bearing the slogan and are encouraged to try to go 21 days the length of time it takes most people to break a habit without complaining. Those who succeed will have their name on the school's new Gratitude Wall.
- + Congratulations to Michael Sattin, who graduated from St. Francis Catholic Secondary School in June. Michael's final average of 99.34 per cent was the highest average of any public or Catholic high school graduate in Niagara, Hamilton and Halton. He was featured on CHCH News in early September as one of the "Best and Brightest" graduating students in the station's coverage area. Michael is currently studying Health Sciences in the Scholar's Elective program at the University of Western Ontario and would like to pursue the medical field of Ophthalmology.

The 2010 OCSTA Annual General Meeting will once again offer an opportunity for delegates to consider and vote on all resolutions received from our members.

The resolution process provides member boards with the opportunity to bring important issues, which have provincial implications, to the attention of all trustees in the province.

The processing of member board resolutions is a fundamental responsibility of the Association.

Attached please find guidelines to assist you in the preparation of your resolution(s).

The deadline date for receipt of resolutions in the OCSTA office is

January 15, 2010

Guidelines for Preparing Resolutions

To improve the effectiveness of the resolution process, we ask boards to review the following guidelines.

Resolutions are your opportunity to address problems, solutions or concerns, which affect Catholic education in Ontario. A resolution approved by the membership at the Annual General Meeting calls for priority action by OCSTA and the commitment of OCSTA resources to address the particular issue outlined in the resolution.

A. Criteria for Submitting a Resolution

A resolution should:

- a. Address an area of concern for the province's Catholic school boards.
- b. Concern a matter which requires attention or action.
- c. Be written in language appropriate for province-wide consideration (language contained in resolutions is often incorporated into subsequent communications to the government or other relevant parties).
- d. Be accompanied by substantiated rationale.
- e. Not deal with education funding issues (a separate process has been created to deal with this type of issue).

B. Steps in Preparing a Resolution

- 1. Identify the concern. Be sure the concern is a matter of **province-wide** scope.
- 2. Research and gather sufficient supporting background materials to substantiate the resolution. If the concern has been presented/dealt with in a previous resolution, review the outcome of that process to assess what changes in approach/additional information might be useful.
- 3. Write the resolution in the following proposed format taking care to ensure that:
 - a. Each "Whereas" is accompanied by adequate background material.
 - b. The "Therefore be it Resolved" directs OCSTA to take specific action.

C. Writing A Resolution

Structure

The resolution should be assigned a succinct title that identifies the problem or issue (or its proposed solution). There should be two parts to the resolution: a preamble followed by a resolving clause (or clauses).

1. Preamble

The preamble is a brief statement of background or rationale coming before the resolving clause(s). The purpose of the preamble is to provide information without which the point or the merits of a resolution are likely to be poorly understood.

Each clause in a preamble is written as a separate paragraph, beginning with the word "WHEREAS".

2. Resolving Clauses

A resolving clause indicates what action(s) is to be taken given the "WHEREAS" clause(s) in the preamble. If more than one action is being recommended, the "Therefore be It Resolved" portion should be divided into a), b), c), etc.

3. Submission Statement

Please include the following information in the submission statement.

[Mover's Name] [Seconder's Name] [Board Name] [Topic]

D. Submission Deadline Date

The deadline date for receipt of resolutions in the OCSTA office is **January 15, 2010**. We encourage boards to submit their resolutions by email to Jane Ponte at iponte@ocsta.on.ca. The provincial office will distribute, in the delegate kits, resolutions to be presented from the floor provided a minimum of 225 copies of each resolution (and background material, if applicable) are received in the Provincial Office by **April 1, 2010**.

E. Regulations

OCSTA petition the Ministry of Education to review the section of the *Education Act* which relates to trustee vacancies with a view to extending the timeline by either increasing the number of days or altering the requirement that the process be completed within a designated number of regular school days.

Explanation of Committee Recommendations & Resolution Session Procedures

Resolution sessions will be conducted using "Robert's Rules of Order" and the provisions of the OCSTA Constitution. The chairperson of the session will ensure compliance with their rules.

Explanation of Committee Recommendations

The Conference Committee will study the resolutions and offer recommendations on the best way to meet their intent. The recommendations and their implications are:

i. Approve

The direction given in the "therefore be it resolved" section of the resolution will be carried out.

ii. Approve and refer to the committee for appropriate implementation. The resolution will be forwarded to the designated committee for implementation.

iii. Receive and refer to the committee for study.

The resolution will be forwarded to the designated committee for study. Following the study and receipt of the committee's recommendation, the Board of Directors will determine whether or not the resolution will be implemented.

iv. Not approve

No action will be taken.

v. No action required

The intent of the resolution has been met. No further action will be taken.

vi. No recommendation

The committee is not making any recommendation with respect to the resolution.

Resolution Session Procedures

Delegates wishing to speak to a resolution must go to one of the floor microphones and state their name and the name of the board they represent.

The mover of a resolution will have the opportunity to be the first and last to speak to that resolution. Other trustees may speak **once** to a resolution.

The chairperson may declare a motion out of order giving the reasons for doing so. The chairperson's decision may be challenged by a majority vote of those voting delegates present **at the session** when the vote is called.

Voting will be by a show of hands. Delegates carrying proxies must have and show proper identification - i.e. proxy badge. Ballots will be provided in the event that a vote by ballot is called for.

Note Re Quorum: A quorum for the transaction of business at any general meeting of

Members shall consist of not fewer than forty (40) individuals entitled to

vote, present in person.

Grouped Resolutions

- a. the chair of the session will ask for a mover and seconder to approve the **grouping** of various related resolutions.
- b. the chair of the session will ask for movers and seconders for the committee recommendation for each group.
- c. delegates will vote on the committee recommendation for each group.

Delegates may request that any resolution(s) be removed from a "group" to be handled individually. These will be addressed when the group from which they have been removed has been dealt with.

Resolutions Handled Individually

These will include resolutions removed from the groups, resolutions for which the committee has not made any recommendation and resolutions from the floor.

A. Resolutions with committee recommendations

- 1. The chair of the session will announce the resolution number and the name of the sponsoring board:
 - the chair will call for the sponsoring board to move and second the committee recommendation;
 - delegates will speak to the committee recommendation;
 - delegates will vote on the committee recommendation.
- 2. If the sponsoring board does not move the committee recommendation from the floor:
 - u the chair will call for the sponsoring board to move their **original resolution**:
 - delegates will speak to the resolution;
 - delegates will vote on the resolution.
- 3. If the original resolution is not moved by the sponsoring board, the resolution will be withdrawn.

B. Resolutions without committee recommendations

- 1. These resolutions will be handled as follows:
 - □ the chair will call for the sponsoring board to move their **original resolution**;
 - delegates will speak to the resolution;
 - delegates will vote on the resolution.
- 2. If the original resolution is not moved by the sponsoring board, the resolution will be withdrawn.

C. Amendments from the Floor

Amendments made on the floor relate to the "therefore be it resolved" section of the resolution and <u>must be written out</u> and handed to the chairperson. The chairperson will consider the amendment and, if necessary, discuss it with the parliamentarian or others to ensure that it is clearly understood.

- □ the chair will **read** the amendment;
- delegates will speak to the amendment;
- delegates will vote on the amendment;
- delegates will vote on the resolution as amended.

If the amendment is defeated:

- □ delegates will be asked to speak to the original resolution;
- delegates will vote on the original resolution.

D. Resolutions Presented from the Floor

After resolutions presented by the committee have been dealt with, other resolutions may be presented from the floor. The following rules apply:

- 2/3 of the voting delegates present at the session must consent to consider the resolution:
- sufficient copies of the resolution (and background material) must be provided for all those present at the resolution session;
- u these resolutions will be handled as outlined above.

The provincial office will distribute, in the delegate kits, resolutions to be presented from the floor provided a minimum of 225 copies of each resolution (and background material, if applicable) are received in the Provincial Office by **April 1, 2010.**
