

REPORT TO THE BOARD MAY 23, 2023

BOARD IMPROVEMENT AND EQUITY PLAN (BIEP) 2023

The Niagara Catholic District School Board is continuing to develop the Board Improvement and Equity Plan (BIEP) using the framework provided by the Ministry of Education in the fall of 2021. The BIEP framework includes provincial priorities, goals and performance indicators under four priority areas, including achievement, human rights and equity, mental health, well-being and engagement, and transitions and pathways. The BIEP framework is designed to help school boards to identify local goals, strategies and monitoring activities in support of improved learning, achievement and well-being for all students.

The Niagara Catholic District School Board continues to work to create safe and accepting classrooms and school communities for all students, where each student can thrive in an asset-based, culturally relevant and responsive teaching and learning environment. The Board is committed to improving educational outcomes for all students through ongoing work to reduce and eliminate systemic barriers for Indigenous, Black, and racialized students, students from low-income households, students with disabilities and students with special education needs.

The BIEP process is predicated on improving our understanding of groups of students who may be underserved so we can more accurately plan for actions to address inequities. Voluntary demographic data that is being collected this spring through the student census will better inform the development of strategies in the BIEP that can focus on the initiatives and interventions to support specific groups of students that may be underserved.

Throughout the 2022-2023 school year, the Niagara Catholic District School Board has engaged in activities to inform the ongoing development of the BIEP, including:

- School visits by Family of Schools' Superintendents to monitor alignment of school improvement and equity plans with the BIEP goals, Strategic Directions in the Board's Multi-Year Strategic Plan and the System Priorities Action Plan;
- Updates to baseline data related to the BIEP indicators; and,
- The spring administration of the voluntary student census.

The BIEP Framework is included with this report and will be posted on the Niagara Catholic District School Board website for public viewing. The ongoing development of the BIEP Working Document will continue to guide the system into the 2023-2024 school year.

All students will have the skills, knowledge, and confidence they need to succeed in the future, as they transition from elementary to secondary school and to their postsecondary pathway: apprenticeship, college, community living, university or the workplace.

B. PRESENTATIONS

1. Information Technology: Grant Frost, Chief Information Officer and Jeff Maxwell, TELTc Consultant

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells welcomed Director of Education Camillo Cipriano, Chair of the Board Danny Di Lorenzo, and Superintendent of Business and Financial Services Giancarlo Vetrone to the NCPIC meeting.

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells stated that as a follow-up to the new business item from the January 12, 2023 NCPIC meeting, and the request from Trustee Bruzzese to investigate the concern, that she was pleased to welcome and introduce Grant Frost, Niagara Catholic's Chief Information Officer and Jeff Maxwell, e-Learning Consultant to make a presentation on Information Technology.

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells also thanked the NCPIC members who submitted questions about Information Technology as the questions were reviewed and used as a guide for the presentation.

Grant Frost provided a presentation on Niagara Catholic Technology and Cyber-Security and Jeff Maxwell provided a presentation on the Niagara Catholic Virtual Learning Platform. A question-and-answer period followed the presentations.

2. Institute for Catholic Education (ICE): Presentation to Parents-Family Life Education Hope Expectations-Lee Ann Forsyth-Sells

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells shared that the Institute for Catholic Education is undergoing a renewal of the Family Life Education program, *Fully Alive*. Every Ontario Catholic school board has been asked to gather feedback from their Catholic Parent Involvement Committee about their hope expectations for the Family Life Education program, *Fully Alive*. Superintendent Forsyth-Sells presented the PowerPoint presentation provided by the Institute for Catholic Education which was included in the agenda package sent to all members before the meeting.

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells reviewed the questions at the end of the PowerPoint. NCPIC parent members were provided with a feedback template that included the three questions. Parent members were invited to share their feedback and/or submit their responses to Yvonne Anderson, no later than March 20, 2023. The feedback received will be submitted to the Institute for Catholic Education on behalf of the NCPIC.

The three questions are:

- 1. How would you express your deepest hope for your children in Family Life Education in their Catholic school?
- 2. Is there anything about the current program that you especially like?
- 3. Is there anything about *Fully Alive* that you would want to see in new program?

E. CO-CHAIRS REPORT

A Ministry of Education meeting with PIC Chairs/Co-Chairs and Board Leads was held on February 21, 2023. Co-Chair Vernelli reported that she was unable to attend this meeting and that Co-Chair Annen was delayed therefore, Superintendent Forsyth-Sells provided a brief report.

- Superintendent Forsyth-Sells shared that the Ministry of Education continues to host virtual meetings with PIC Chairs/Co-Chairs and Board Leads to support parent engagement. The meeting of February 21, 2023 focused on student mental health and well-being, as good mental health is fundamental to a student's ability to learn and to succeed at the school and in life. The Ministry also hosted breakout sessions for parents and for Board Leads to discuss best practices and resources to continue to support student mental health and well-being. The Niagara Catholic Mental Health Team, with the Mental Health Lead, Social Workers, Child and Youth Workers, School Mental Health Champions, and the Board Mental Health Leadership Team continues to focus on the importance of mental health and well-being for all students using the resources provided by the Ministry of Education through School Mental Health Ontario.
- Co-Chair Annen also shared that in the breakout session for parents the Ministry reported that they are currently collecting data on bullying and that the data will be shared with parents.

F. OAPCE REPORT

Ian Woods sent regrets but provided the report below.

- OAPCE had their first Board of Directors Meeting of the new year at the beginning of February.
 OAPCE was pleased to welcome Bishop Most Rev. Yvan Mathieu and Dr. Anne Jamieson who joined the meeting virtually. The focus of the meeting was to discuss strategies to further connect the OAPCE Directors with and regional representatives.
- OAPCE is pleased to announce that Denice Garell-Teti from Halton Catholic is the new Chair and Sarah Tjin-a-joe from York Catholic is the new Executive Communications Secretary. Their many years of service and expertise will enhance OAPCE presentations, newsletters and online resources.
- OAPCE continues to create a new series of resources for "Parents4Parents Press" to provide parents with simple strategies for parent engagement focusing on "re-engaging and re-claiming parent engagement" and different ways to bring parents back into the schools.
- The OAPCE March Newsletter includes a new section "Family Zone" which offers tips for families to engage in Lenten reflections. These reflections are available on the OAPCE website, YouTube Channel, Daily TV Mass App and OAPCE Podcast.
- OAPCE has increased their presences on Twitter by creating more themed posts like #motiviationMonday, #Wednesdaywisdom, etc. Parents are encouraged to re-tweet posts.
- The 84th OAPCE Annual Conference will be held on April 22, 2023 in Kingston, ON. The theme this year is "Deepening Our Faith as Engaged Parents". Guest Speakers include Dr. Josephine Lombardi, Coach Martinez and Theresa Kennedy. A vendor mall will also be on site. Registration opens on Monday, April 6, 2023 and all parents are encouraged to attend. Travel bursaries are available through OAPCE. Further details can be found on the OAPCE website.
- OACPE will host a joint regional meeting with Algonquin, Halton, Niagara, Waterloo and York Catholic School Boards on March 27, 2023.
- Institute for Catholic Education (ICE) will host Provincial Symposium-Adult Faith Formation in Catholic Education on Tuesday, May 9 and Wednesday, May 10, 2023 at the Delta Hotel by Marriott Toronto Airport and Conference Center. Approximately, 700 participants are currently registered for this event.

G. REPORT FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESIGNATE SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION

1. March Break: March 13-17, 2023

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells shared that March Break is scheduled for March 13-17, 2023. Schools will be closed, but the Catholic Education Centre will be open.

2. Director's Annual Report 2022

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells reported that the Director's Annual Report 2022 has been provided in the meeting package to all NCPIC members for information. The annual report highlights achievement and accomplishments during the 2022 school year. The report has been submitted to the Ministry of Education and is posted on the Board website.

3. 2023-2024 Elementary and Secondary School Year Calendars

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells shared that based on the feedback from the consultation process, discussions with the School Year Calendar Committee, Senior Administrative Council and our

coterminous board, the 2023-2024 Elementary and Secondary School Year Calendars were presented at the February 14, 2023 Committee of the Whole Meeting and approved at the Board Meeting of February 28, 2023. The calendars have been submitted to the Ministry of Education for final approval.

4. NCPIC Financial Report

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells reported on the finances of the NCPIC.

5. 2023 Distinguished Alumni Award

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells shared that the Distinguished Alumni Award is presented annually to graduates from a Niagara Catholic secondary school. The individual must be described by the nominee as extraordinary, notable or acclaimed and has achieved distinguished success in their adult life. The nominee must have achieved and reflect the characteristics described by the Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations. Nominations may be submitted by staff and/or members of the school communities. The nomination form has been provided in the meeting package. Nominations must be submitted to Linda Marconi, no later than April 3, 2023.

H. BISHOP/DIOCSEAN REPORT

Fr. Paul MacNeil reported that:

- as a result of the Synod 2023 consultation process, progress is still being made on the leadership model for the diocese. A new deanery structure has been implemented and all parishes are expected to be working in the formation of a pastoral council.
- for over 35 years, the Diocese of St. Catharines has published the Vineyard with a circulation of 10,000. The Vineyard is now available electronically at http://www.saintcd.com/diocesan-directory/the-vineyard. All members were encouraged to review the Vineyard as it contains a wealth of information about the diocese.
- in addition to individual reconciliation times at individual parishes, the sacrament of penance will be available to all parishioners at all parishes on Saturday, March 25, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.
- this year's Development and Peace Share Lent Campaign is entitled "Stand for the Land" and this supports the broader 5-year campaign "Create Hope". All members were encouraged to give generously to this worthy cause. Further information may be found at www.devp.org.

- Assumption University is offering a graduate diploma in Catholic Studies. The application form
 is available at www.assumptionu.ca/diploma-in-catholic-studies. The application deadline is May
 3, 2023.
- all members are invited to journey through the 40 days of Lent with the National Catholic Broadcasting Council at www.dailytvmass.com. Participants include Bishop Bergie, Cardinal Collins, Fr. Michael Coutts, Sr. Ann Immaculee, Fr. Obinna Ifeanyi, Fr. John Bertao and Fr. Pat Fitzpatrick.
- the Roman Catholic Church of Canada is committed to raising 30 million dollars over the next five years to support the Indigenous communities. The funds will be administered by a National Indigenous Fund Committee consisting of Bishops, clergy and members of the Indigenous community. Each diocese is expected to form its own committee to bring forth local initiatives that will enhance the relationship between our cultures, bring about reconciliation and foster a positive mission moving forward. Volunteers from the Indigenous communities are encouraged to participate.
- The Niagara Foundation for Catholic Education Annual Benefit Gala takes place tomorrow evening.

I. STUDENT SENATE REPORT

Co-Chair Vernelli on behalf of Ava Venzon reported that:

- Niagara Catholic Student Senate has partnered with Niagara Nutrition Partners for a fundraiser.
 Each secondary school in the Board has asked for a \$2.00 donation from students to support the
 breakfast program. Each student who makes a donation will receive and apply on March 7, and
 will gather to participate in the "Big Crunch" when all students will take a bite of their apple at
 the same time.
- Members of Student Senate were invited to review the Niagara Catholic Multi-Year Strategic Plan 2021-2026 for resiliency, mental health, and positivity.
- Mental Health Week and Catholic Education Week will collaborate on activities to support faith and mental health during the week of May 8-12, 2023.
- The "Time to Shine" SEAC/Student Senate Formal is well underway. This event will take place on April 18, 2023 at Saint Paul Catholic High School.

J. SEAC REPORT

Alexandria Attree reported:

- SEAC was pleased to welcome two new members to the committee, Community Representative, Krystine Donato and from Bethesda Services, Alyson Wilson.
- SEAC would like to welcome a representative from the Indigenous Community to the committee.
- Nick Smith, Niagara Support Service (NSS) presented information on Niagara Training and Employment Agency (NTEC) Regional Respite Program.
- Kids Helping Kids was celebrated in Niagara Catholic schools from February 13 to 24, with fun filled activities for our students (i.e., creative hair day, funky sock day, PJ Day, Western Day, etc.).
- Ontario Autism Program (OAP) shared information with families at the transition to school event hosted by Niagara Children's Centre. Principals share how families can access OAP from the Niagara Catholic ABA Team.

- The transition to school process continues as coordinators and student support teams complete observations and review student information provided by community partners. In the coming months transition meetings will begin to support students entering Kindergarten in September 2023 and to foster a successful transition.
- In support of Lexia-Phase 2 Elementary, the Program Resource Teacher Team is meeting with elementary school staff to review student progress. The additional licenses are being assigned to elementary schools to further increase access to Lexia.
- In support of Lexia-Phase 1 Secondary, meetings have been held with all secondary schools to implement Lexia. Models will vary based on school sites for Semester 2.
- Bethesda is offering a 4-week session for parents of children (ages 2-12) with Down Syndrome with Linda Moroz beginning in February. Principals of identified schools will be notified and an invitation will be extended to parents for participation.
- the Behaviour Resource Teacher Team continues to deliver their social-emotional learning framework presentations entitled "I Am A Child of God" throughout the system. Over 100 classrooms have benefited from this program and self-regulation tool for students.
- with the support of SEAC, the Student Support Services Department will be reviewing and updating the Special Education Plan.
- The Niagara Catholic Accessibility Planning Committee will host an *All Access Event* for students on Tuesday, April 18, 2023 at the Holiday Inn, St. Catharines. Further details to follow. An *All Access Event* for parents will also take place at a later date. Further details to follow.
- Parents are encouraged to attend or livestream the SEAC meetings as the highlights are extremely informative and highlighting Niagara Catholic community partners.

K. STAFF REPORTS

Joe Tornabuono, Elementary Principal shared that:

- Ash Wednesday marked the beginning of the very important season of Lent. Lent is a time for "Spring Cleaning", a cleaning of our hearts and our minds, as we continue our spiritual journey and grow closer to God. Lent is a time of going beyond ourselves and doing things that will make a difference for others. Our students are challenged to make Lenten promises of doing good deeds and helping others. During these days of Lent, we strive to be even better Merchants of Hope for those around us. This is transparent in the daily operations of our schools. With the season of Lent upon us, many of our schools are finding ways to demonstrate our Catholic faith, such as:
 - Mass celebrations (in-person and virtually)
 - o Rosary Prayer
 - Holy Week Activities: Stations of the Cross/Last Supper
 - o Mini-retreats with Niagara Catholic Elementary Chaplains
 - Lenten Food Drives
- Students in grade 2 are preparing for first Reconciliation and first Holy Communion and Grade 8 students are preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation.

- Students received the Ontario Provincial Report Card and where applicable their Individual Education Plan (IEP) in February. Parents are encouraged to review the report card with their child and to contact the classroom teacher to discuss next steps. Teachers have also been working with students to set goals for Term 2.
- Elementary schools hosted a Kindergarten Open House and are preparing staffing for the new school year.
- Students participated in the Kids Helping Kids Campaign. Funds will be collected and distributed to the Niagara Children's Centre and the Niagara Foundation for Catholic Education.
- As part of the Early Reading Strategy, teacher use a universal screening tool in Kindergarten to
 identify students at risk. Prevention and intervention strategies focusing on phonological
 awareness, phonemic awareness and phonics instruction support student achievement and wellbeing.
- Numeracy continues to be a main focus as we continue to work with students to understand and improve their number sense. This includes mathematical fluency, a focused mathematical lesson and purposeful practice for students. Parents are encouraged to support their children's learning at home by showing interest in what their children learn and discover. Examples include: cooking at home; asking your children to measure ingredients, including your child in calculating/predicting the cost of groceries. This helps students connect mathematical concepts with real life.
- Extra-curricular activities continue throughout the school year.

ALL ACCESS HOME: ACCESSIBILITY CONFERENCE FOR ELEMENTARY STUDENTS ON APRIL 18, 2023 The Niagara Catholic District School Board Accessibility Committee is planning an elementary student conference called ALL ACCESS HOME (Helping to Open Minds Encounter) to support students in becoming accessibility champions in their school communities. Educating youth about accessibility, disability, and inclusion supports Niagara Catholic in removing barriers so that all students can succeed and feel at HOME as themselves, and as part of their school communities.

The conference supports the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) to ensure that all Ontarians have fair and equitable access to programs and services, and improved opportunities for persons with disabilities. The ALL ACCESS HOME conference has been made possible through a successful grant application to the Ministry of Education that was prepared by members of the Accessibility Committee.

Five students from grades 5 to 8 will be selected by the school Principal from each elementary school to participate in the conference at the Holiday Inn & Suites Parkway Conference Centre on Ontario Street in St. Catharines on Tuesday, April 18, 2023.

The conference will include a keynote address by Unstoppable Tracy and interactive workshops, along with refreshments, lunch and transportation by bus to and from the home schools. Student participants will share their learning in their home school communities following the conference.

2. **TIPS** - Niagara Catholic's Student Support and the Learning Disabilities Association of Niagara Region (LDANR) have collaborated to offer a one-day workshop titled TIPS for Post-Secondary to support grade eleven and twelve students who meet the eligibility criteria below with a focus on preparation and transition to post-secondary education.

Trustee Marino - There were some very positive programs and services that will benefit both students and staff alike that were presented and discussed at last night's (Tuesday, April 11, 2023) meeting of the Niagara Catholic District School Board's Committee of the Whole. All presentations were excellently done, very informative and generated a great deal of discussion and questions. One presentation in particular that really "jumped out" for me personally demonstrated the desire for leadership skills that many of the board's staff are striving to further develop through the Niagara Catholic Aspiring Leaders Program.

The program is available to all board employees interested in developing and furthering leadership roles in a variety of opportunities such as consultants, administrative assistants, coordinators and school administration. The initial first session enrollment had 85 participants, and predictions are that the course will become so popular that it will eventually blossom into gigantic epidemic proportions. That fact in my mind speaks volumes about the high quality of dedicated and vibrant employees at all organizational levels that the board is blessed to possess.

Various spring and fall workshops will deal with instruction on dealing with tension, moving beyond mediocrity to highly effective leadership, building team trust, workforce change and innovation, and developing skills of healthy communication. All of these factors should assist participants to achieve a high sense of personal wellbeing and the ability to become an outstanding, faith-inspired leader. Such remarkable achievements will not only benefit successful staff course participants, but also Niagara Catholic District School Board students in their efforts to achieve a rewarding education.

G. NCPIC REPORT

- 1. At the NCPIC Meeting of March 2, Grant Frost, Chief Information Officer and Jeff Maxwell, TELTC Consultant provided a presentation on Niagara Catholic Technology, Cyber-Security and the Niagara Catholic Virtual Learning Platform.
- 2. Superintendent Forsyth-Sells shared that the Institute for Catholic Education is undergoing a renewal of the Family Life Education program, Fully Alive. Every Ontario Catholic school board was asked to gather feedback from their Catholic Parent Involvement Committee about their hope expectations for the Family Life Education program, Fully Alive. and reviewed the three questions. Parent members were invited to provide feedback. Feedback received will be submitted to the Institute for Catholic Education on behalf of the NCPIC. The three questions are:

- 2. Is there anything about the current program that you especially like?
- 3. Is there anything about Fully Alive that you would want to see in new program?
- 3. The Ministry of Education continues to host virtual meetings with PIC Chairs/Co-Chairs and Board Leads to support parent engagement. The meeting of February 21, 2023 focused on student mental health and well-being, as good mental health is fundamental to a student's ability to learn and to succeed at the school and in life. The Ministry also hosted breakout sessions for parents and for Board Leads to discuss best practices and resources to continue to support student mental health and well-being. The Niagara Catholic Mental Health Team, with the Mental Health Lead, Social Workers, Child and Youth Workers, School Mental Health Champions, and the Board Mental Health Leadership Team continues to focus on the importance of mental health and well-being for all students using the resources provided by the Ministry of Education through School Mental Health Ontario.
- 4. The 84th Ontario Association of Parents in Catholic Education (OAPCE) Annual Conference will be held on April 22, 2023 in Kingston, ON. The theme this year is "Deepening Our Faith as Engaged Parents". Guest Speakers include Dr. Josephine Lombardi, Coach Martinez and Theresa Kennedy. A vendor mall will also be on site. Registration opens on Monday, April 6, 2023 and all parents are encouraged to attend. Travel bursaries are available through OAPCE. - 5. On May 3, 2023 the NCPIC will host a Faith Formation/Parent Engagement Event with the theme a "Cultural Approach to Catholic Education" featuring guest speaker Fr. Tony Ricard, followed by Parent Workshops at Denis Morris Catholic High School from 5:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.
