The vision of life that Advent gives us is twofold; it looks back to the first coming of Christ at Bethlehem, and it looks to the future when Christ will come again. In the interval between these two events we find meaning for our life as a Christian.

First we celebrate Christ becoming human. We view His life and experience his presence as a human being in our history. Christ came to show us what life can and should be. He gave us true and valid principles by which we can live true and valid lives. But Jesus knew that the human heart could not live in isolation. He formed the Church around the concept of a people held together by love. In that community we discover unlimited possibilities and meaning. Alone we can do nothing. Together we find real meaning. WINTER WEATHER AND WINTER RULES

Parents should be advised that going out for recess during the winter season will be a normal thing each day. In extreme weather cases, children will remain indoors. Proper attire must be worn, i.e., boots, gloves, hats, scarf, etc. As is always the case, it is imperative that we all emphasize the dangers of throwing snow in any form. Please make sure your children are aware of the possible dangers of throwing snow at school. No one wants anyone seriously hurt. Your cooperation in this matter is greatly appreciated. Please remember that snow is fun to be around, but should be left on the ground.

HEAD LICE

Head lice crawl from person to person by direct head to head contact. They do not spread disease. Anyone can get them. They are more common in children as their heads frequently touch when they play together or share hats, combs or brushes. Itching is the main complaint. Parents are asked to check their children's hair weekly for head lice. Check more often if your child has close contact with someone who has head lice. Please do not send a child with head lice to school until he or she has had the first of the two required treatments. If one person in the family has head lice, it is possible that other family members will also have them. We appreciate letting the school know if your child has head lice. We can then send out letters informing the class so other parents can be notified to check their children's hair. An untreated source among close contacts is a common reason for getting head lice again. You are always welcome to call Public Health should you require more information.

SCHOOL BUS RULES – All Elementary

At the Stop Be 5 to 10 minutes early, and stand on the inside of the sidewalk/

shoulder away from the roadway.

When the Bus Arrives Line up in a straight line, wait for the bus to come to a complete stop

and the doors to open, and never touch the outside of the bus.

Getting on the Bus Get on the bus one at a time, hold the handrail as you climb the stairs,

and go directly to your seat and get settled.

Riding on the Bus Sit with your back to back of the seat and your bottom to the bottom of

your seat with your school bag on your lap, and use your quiet speaking

voice so that the bus driver can concentrate on driving.

Getting off the Bus Stay in your seat until the bus comes to a complete stop, only get off the

bus at your school or at your bus stop, look for your parent/ guardian before you get off the bus if that is your routine, and always tell the bus driver if you do not see your parent/ guardian at the bus stop waiting for

you if that is your routine or if you missed the stop.

Crossing in Front of the Bus Watch and wait for the bus driver to signal to you to cross the

road once it is safe to do so.

Schools may contact their NSTS Transportation Coordinator for support addressing student transportation safety and behaviour concerns. NSTS can provide seating plan or letter templates to support school administrators experiencing bus issues.

Holiday Expectations

The holidays may be a difficult time for your child. A change in routine and different holiday expectations can be stressful and isolating. Here are some tips and resources to share with your child throughout the holiday season:

- 1. **Validate Feelings:** Let your child know it's okay not to feel happy during the holidays. Their thoughts and emotions are valid. Encourage open conversations about any concerns.
 - 2. **Find Quiet Relief:** When things get overwhelming, suggest to your child that they find a quiet place to take a break. This can help alleviate anxious feelings.
 - 3. **Explore Support**: Help your child discover available support services and guide them in accessing what they believe will be most beneficial. Use this time to prepare them for post-high school life and independence.
