## LARKIN ESTATE UNIVERSITY/COLLEGE ADMISSION AWARDS

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The funding for the Larkin Estate University/College Admission Awards is a bequest from the estate of Maria Eveleen Larkin and Aimee Theresa Larkin. The awards have been administered annually since 1969.

The Larkin Estate University/College Admission Award is a four-year renewable bursary available to Niagara Catholic graduates who are enrolled in post-secondary education at St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, at a school of nursing, or social work, or at a college or university offering such a program.

As of April 30, 2025 the undistributed earnings and the balance of the scholarship fund amounted to \$34,109.36 with projected dividends and interest in the amount of \$6,000.00 to the end of 2026.

- The first installment of the award is predicated upon the receipt of a letter of confirmation of full-time registration in Nursing or Social Work, or proof of full or partial tuition paid.
- Subsequent installments of the award are predicated upon receipt of the following:
  - an official transcript as evidence of successful completion of previous year's courses; and
  - proof of full-time registration in Nursing or Social Work, or proof of full or partial tuition paid.

The Larkin Estate University/College Admission Award will be awarded to eight recipients for the 2024-2025 school year.

Anne Marie Criddle reported:

#### World Down Syndrome Day (WDSD)

The date for WDSD--the 21st day of the 3rd month--was selected to signify the uniqueness of the triplication (trisomy) of the 21st chromosome, which causes Down syndrome. Niagara Catholic schools marked this year's event by beginning the day with a special prayer and participating in the #LotsOfSocks Campaign where students and staff wore colorful, fun socks on Friday, March 21, to help raise awareness of Down syndrome, what it means to have Down syndrome, and how people with Down syndrome play a vital role in our lives and our communities. Staff was also encouraged visit the Canadian Down Syndrome Society website for access free resources and a K-6 teaching plan to incorporate the significance of the day into their teaching.

**Today is World Autism Day**, and Niagara Catholic schools were encouraged to use a series of educator resources provided by Autism Ontario to introduce activities and videos into classrooms that focus on acceptance of diversity and the lived experience of autistic people.

Student Support and the Learning Disabilities Association of Niagara Region (LDANR) have collaborated to offer an In-Person Learning Transition Program for grades seven and eight. The **SOAR Secondary program** will support students focusing on preparation and transition to secondary education. The program begins the week of Monday, April 28, 2025, and will run for six sessions, ending the week of Monday, June 2, 2025.

As well Niagara Catholic and LDANR are collaborating to offer a one-day workshop titled **TIPS for Post-Secondary** to support Grade 11 and 12 students with preparation for a transition to post-secondary education. This workshop will take place on Wednesday, May 14, 2025, at Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School from 9:30 am - 3:00 pm.

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells reported that the *By Your Side* Parent/ Caregiver Learning Hub is an online resource centre designed to meet the needs of Ontario's families. Resources and supports are made available in multiple formats—including web content, PDFs, videos and webinars to ensure families can access information and strategies that promote mental health and well-being at home.

#### Key topics in the Parent/Caregiver Learning Hub include:

- understanding mental health
- promoting mental health at home
- supporting mental health at school
- stress and anxiety management
- substance use prevention
- navigating digital technology use
- reaching out for help

These resources aim to support mental health and well-being by providing accessible, researchinformed, culturally responsive supports tailored to a wide-range of learning preferences. Further resources will be added over time, in response to parent identified needs.

Superintendent Forsyth-Sells introduced Jennifer Pilzecker and reported that Niagara Catholic is pleased to announce that Jennifer Pilzecker has been approved as the Niagara Catholic OAPCE Regional Director and invited Jennifer to provide a brief bio and report.

#### C. ONTARIO ASSOCIATION FOR PARENTS IN CATHOLIC EDUCATION (OAPCE) REPORT

Jennifer Pilzecker provided a brief bio and shared that she was officially sworn in by Bishop Mathieu a the OAPCE Board of Directors meeting on February 1, 2025. Jennifer also shared that she was pleased to be acclaimed as the Niagara Catholic OAPCE Regional Director.

Jennifer reported that she as well as parents/guardians from Niagara Catholic participated in the OAPCE virtual regional representative meeting on February 13, 2025 and provided a subsequent meeting recap for representatives who were unable to attend.

Dr. Josephine Lombardi led an insightful session on the Jubilee Year of Hope, exploring its significance in Catholic faith. She discussed the Virtue of Hope, based on St. Paul's teachings, and the importance of joy in enduring difficult times. Dr. Lombardi explained the origins of the Jubilee Year, from its Jewish roots of reconciliation and forgiveness to its establishment in Catholic tradition by Pope Boniface VIII in 1300. She emphasized the importance of confession, indulgences, and the symbolism of the Holy Door as a pilgrimage act. To participate in the Jubilee Year, Dr. Lombardi recommended spiritual practices like fasting, almsgiving, and visiting sacred sites.

#### **OAPCE 86<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference**

Jennifer reported that OAPCE was pleased to announce that they will be hosting the OAPCE 86<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference in Niagara this year at Saint Michael Catholic High School on Saturday, May 24, 2025. All parents/guardians are invited to attend. This is an incredible opportunity to connect with Catholic parent leaders, educators, and community members as we explore important topics in education, faith, and advocacy. There is no cost to Niagara Catholic, Catholic School Council OAPCE Representatives and a minimal registration fee will apply to participants. Further details will be forthcoming.

• Chair Thomas proposed that the Niagara Catholic Parent Involvement Committee cover the fees associated with the community use of schools for the OAPCE Conference held on May 24, 2025 at Saint Michael Catholic High School not to exceed \$2500.00 through parent engagement funding.

• Trustee Bruzzese also stated that as a previous Director of OAPCE the conference is an incredible event. #### D. SECONDARY STUDENT SENATE REPRESENTATIVE REPORT-Ella Colaneri Cheis Therme anguided a magnitude for Ella

Chair Thomas provided a report on behalf of Ella:

- Niagara Catholic elementary and secondary schools are preparing for the Lenten season. Staff and students will not be participating in any fundraisers or big activities for the next 40 days to hold space for Jesus and to maintain a humble tone through Lent.
- During Catholic Education Week, secondary schools will be promoting Luce, an animated character who is almost a mascot for the jubilee year, showing the pilgrimage journey for the year. The schools have creative freedom with what they want to do with the concept of Luce, but most are using her to hold a scavenger hunt or a version of "Elf on the Shelf" with Luce rather than an elf.
- Grade 8 students will have a final visit to their feeder secondary schools after Lent and before secondary exams in June. The students may be participating in fun pep rallies or activities to cultivate school spirit and preparation for the transition into summer and then, grade 9. Most grade 8 students have finalized courses at their respective elementary schools and are starting to prepare for confirmation and graduation.
- The Niagara Catholic Student Senate is meticulously planning their annual symposium conference, which is a leadership conference with all the school councils and senate. At this event, a guest speaker will talk about the importance of confidence and leadership, school student councils can communicate and share ideas. The elementary school senate election will also be held, and the secondary student senate trustee will be elected for the 2025-2026 school year. This conference is an opportunity for all schools to incorporate new creative activities into their schools, and to meet like-minded peers.

#### E. BISHOP/DIOCESAN REPORT-Fr. Paul MacNeil

Fr. Paul reported that:

- Parishes across the diocese celebrated Ash Wednesday on March 5, 2025 marking the beginning of Lent.
- March also heralds the beginning of Spring. This season is often associated with cleaning. After
  a long winter our homes can be musty, cluttered, and dusty. A good 'spring cleaning' is usually
  in order. Jesus reminds us that the same is true in the spiritual life. The season of Lent is a
  wonderful time to focus on the interior life and do a little 'spring cleaning'. We need to look at
  what is in our hearts and get rid of the bad and embrace the good. As Jesus reminds us in the
  Gospel, we need to overcome our spiritual blindness, hypocrisy, and pride. We say no to our
  sinful inclinations, wants and desires, and yes to God and to the needs of our brothers and sisters.
  This is achieved through the traditional pillars of Lent prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Going
  to confession also helps when we humbly admit we are sinners in need of God's mercy.
  Committing ourselves to forty days of spiritual renewal is not easy; however, the words of Sirach
  can help: "Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immoveable, always excelling in the work of the
  Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labour is not in vain."
- 2025 is a Jubilee year. A year in which Pope Francis invites us to "forgive the debts of countries that will never be able to repay them." (Spes non confundit, 16).
- Development and Peace Caritas Canada is responding to this call through the global Turn Debt into Hope ShareLent campaign. A mini-magazine to is available to use during Lent describes the teaching of debt forgiveness in a jubilee year, as well as some information on some of the 79 projects supported by Development and Peace in 34 countries throughout the world. Inside there is also a solidarity calendar to use as part of your Lenten journey.
- Thursday, March 27 Niagara Foundation for Catholic Education Annual Benefit Gala 6:00 p.m. at Club Roma. Tickets are \$100.00 per person payment due by March 18<sup>th</sup>.
- Saturday, April 5-Confession is available in all of our parishes from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.
- A note on the meaning of fast and abstinence:
  - Can.1251 Abstinence from meat, or from some other food as determined by the Episcopal Conference, is to be observed on all Fridays, unless a solemnity should fall on a Friday. Abstinence and fasting are to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
  - Can.1252 The law of abstinence binds those who have completed their fourteenth year. The law of fasting binds those who have attained their majority (age 18 C.97), until the beginning of their sixtieth year. Pastors of souls and parents are to ensure that even those who by reason of their age are not bound by the law of fasting and abstinence, are taught the true meaning of penance. The law of abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, the products of milk or condiments made of animal fat.

- The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops' 2025 Journey through Lent video series, which includes reflections on the readings for Ash Wednesday and each Sunday in Lent including Palm Sunday, is now available on the CCCB website: English: http://www.cccb.ca/lent and in French: http://www.cecc.ca/careme.
